Last Call for Help for June 15 Picnic for Veterans

Our fourth annual Picnic for Veterans will be held starting at 11:00 am (note new earlier start time) on this Saturday, June 15, at Old National Pike Park (12406 Old National Pike, Mt. Airy, MD 21771). Past Faithful Navigator (PFN) Mike Bir is chairing the picnic again this year. We expect 25 veterans from the Perry Point VA Center (mostly mobile) to attend, and potentially other veterans from the local area.

We have reached out to local businesses for donations. Wegman's in Frederick is donating a variety of items, including chicken thighs, chicken wings, chicken breasts, Italian sausage, pork, ground beef, beef franks, cheese slices, hamburger and hot dog rolls, ketchup, mustard, relish and mayonnaise. Mission BBQ in Columbia is donating a large pan of macaroni and cheese, and Giant Food and Food Lion have provided gift cards to purchase additional food items, such as salads.

We are still seeking donations of fruit and desserts, and the loan of outdoor games, from members of our Assembly. VA rules state that we can only provide desserts that are commercially prepared, but we can provide fresh fruits.

Highlights of Secret Service Facility Tour on June 5

On June 5, Sir Knights from our Assembly and Brothers from Resurrection Council 11341 attended a tour of the United States Secret Service training facility, the James J. Rawley Training Center, in Beltsville, Maryland. About 25 Knights and several wives were able to tour the secret facility to learn what skills are taught to selected new agents appointed to the Secret Service. Unfortunately, no photos from inside the facility can be published. The tour started at 10:00 am and lasted until about 1:30 in the afternoon. During our tour, we were afforded the opportunity to receive briefings from the vast weapons library, to participate

actively in "virtual" shooting ranges, and to observe the Secret Service driving center, where agents are trained who, in the future, may be required to drive Secret Service protectees, and even the President. During the tour, we were also pleased to identify other Brother Knights working at the facility from other local Councils.

The Secret Service is one of the oldest federal law enforcement agencies in the United States. It was started in 1865, to combat the counterfeiting of our currency. It was also signed into law the day before President Abraham Lincoln was killed by an assassin. At the time, it was thought that at least 1/3 of all currency in our country was counterfeit. The two main missions of the Secret Service are Protection & Investigations. When foreign officials visit the United States, the Secret Service is required to protect a country's head of government or head of state. Past protectees have included the Queen of England and her Prime Minister, the Pope, and many others.

Only about one in 100 people who apply to become a Secret Service agent are selected. Following the selection process, an agent attends a criminal investigative school in Glynco, Georgia, where they are provided training in law, firearms, search and seizure, surveillance, and many other aspects of law enforcement. This training runs about twelve weeks. Upon their

return, the new agents attend the Secret Service Training Center for about eight weeks, where agents learn the specifics of the Secret Service mission.

A good time was had by all, and there were plenty of smiles. There was also an appreciation for the effort, job, and capability of the men and women who protect our nation's leaders. The tour was arranged by Faithful Navigator-Elect Steve Mason, who is a former Deputy Assistant Director of the US Secret Service for Investigations.

Patriotic Rosary at Church of the Resurrection on Tuesday, June 25

The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops has declared the week of June 22-29 to be "Religious Freedom Week," in which we pray, reflect, and take action on religious liberty, both here in this country and abroad.
