Editor's Editorial of the New Color Corps Regalia



With Supreme's sudden directive to change the Color Corps' regalia there has been much uproar and rightly so. I immediately emailed my concerns to Supreme and will share them here. I hesitated to contact Supreme but with Fourth Degree being a Patriotic Degree the First Amendment guarantees the Freedom of Speech I chose to go ahead. The Knights of Columbus parallels the company I work for. Both were leaders in their fields for many years but both are now failing.

My company has been in business for almost fifty years but is now having to stave off bankruptcy. Recently I was a given a promotion with much more responsibility. (I thought I would cruise to retirement.) I'm sure it wasn't for my abilities buts because the older more capable engineers retired and the younger ones quit. The company hired a firm to investigate the company's employees' views. Word spread you better not say anything negative or you were sure to be laid off. I told these alarmists if the company doesn't want me to speak the truth I don't want to be a part of it anyway and I feel the same about the K of C. Last month we were told that Michigan Knights were down 6000 members from the last count and that less than 20% of these Knights are Fourth Degree Knights. I know the State Deputy is all about membership and rightfully so that's the way the organization can only survive.

My own journey with the K of C started in 1991 in Plymouth. My Dad was life member joining in 1963. Over the years money was sometimes tight but my Father and Mother knew the K of C was a worthwhile organization and sent in the membership dues in each year.

I wasn't very active in the Plymouth council and when I moved to Brighton we joined the Holy Spirit parish and found they had recently started up a new a council. I chose to go through the first Degree again in 1997 but still kept my old membership number. Things moved quickly from then. At my first meeting I was elected an officer. I went through the Second and Third Degrees in 1999 and it was a bad experience, if you know what I mean and vowed to never join the Fourth Degree until PFN John Farren convinced me to. I figured I've come this far as I might as well finish. Finally in 2007 I asked long time "money man" SK Bob Ryan how much it would it cost and was shocked by the figure. Shopping for a tuxedo Judy convinced me to buy the best one I could afford and bought one for \$500 (2007 dollars). I figured I would wear it about 50 times to get my money out of it, but over the past ten years I estimate I've worn it about 250 times and it is still in good condition.

Soon after joining the Fourth Degree PFN John Farren asked me to join the Color Corps. I asked then CC the late PFN Mike Pitlanish how much it would cost and he quoted me another a figure I was hesitant but decided to join because I figured this was something I planned to do for next thirty years. I didn't like the quality of \$100 swords Lynch & Kelly sold and bought slick a slick silver plated vintage 1948 sword on Ebay for \$61.00. Being over six feet tall I had to order the extra long cape another added expense I didn't plan on. The regalia seems to run on the small side making it tough for us larger fellows. (I'm talking to you Doc.) Ordering the sword baldric it was a bit small so I ordered another one and Judy cut them apart, added a piece and sawed them together but it still didn't look right. PFN Dave Russell was kind of enough to give me an extra long sword baldric that finally looked good.

When I became Faithful Navigator there was another added expense of buying another long white cape and was told to buy a new white handled sword. I said "I'll just paint the handle white" I was told that was bad idea because some had tried it and it came out terrible. I have a friend who paints hot rods and had him paint my sword and PFN Don Sucher's swords and both came out superb.

When I first joined the color corps I was more motivated and kept detailed records of participation and the number of callups per year. In my first year there was thirteen and as the years went by that number dramatically climbed until this year CC PFN Dave Russell declared we do over 40 call ups this year.

Color corps member have to be dedicated. I've seen many color corps members come and go. In the beginning I rarely missed a call up, but with job responsibilities and other interests my attendance has been spotty over the last few years. The members that were here before I joined still rarely miss a call up and this is truly remarkable. I'm talking about SK Dave Russell, SK Don Sucher and SK John Lafleur these men deserve our admiration for their commitment

Wearing the regalia is not always comfortable. I remember one hot Flag Day in Williamston standing at attention in the hot sun for fifteen minutes while little girls sang patriotic songs. Recently at the last officers installation when I went to pull out the kneeler at St. Mary Magdalen my cape stuck got stuck in the chair causing me to fall on my bad football knee on the tile floor.

Not only are these call ups taxing to our free time they came be expensive when we have to drive several miles to site of the call-up. PFN John Farren told me in Florida the CC requests \$100 from the family for the color corps to show up at wakes. The CC distributes this money to color corps member who show up to help pay for their gas. The old regalia being around since 1940 is probably indeed dated. As far the new regalia I like it but what I don't like is how it's being instituted. We're told to buy the new regalia for \$510.00 plus \$35.10 for shipping and another estimated \$25.00 for a tailor to hem the pants. So we color members are asked to spend \$570.10 we thought we wouldn't had to and that's not including the purchase of a good white shirt if we don't already have one. I reminded Supreme that many Color Corps members are on fixed incomes. Even with 25% discount Supreme decided to give us to till the end of September I'm not sure if I'll continue in the Color Corps. My decision is not just for the money, I'm suspicious, the two established K of C suppliers, The English Company and Lynch & Kelly are shutout from supplying the new regalia essentially putting them out of business with a new company being the sole supplier. My suggestions to Supreme told them if I was charge of this new directive I would institute the two following suggestions for a smooth roll out:

- 1. Let old color members continue to use their old regalia for as long they wish or the regalia is in good shape. (Yes, but only till 5/30/18.)
- 2. Give the old color corps members a discount if they wish to purchase the new regalia.(Which they did but only for a short time.)

Supreme decided to rescind on the decision of the removal of the sword but leave it up to the Parish Priest. We all know the sword will soon really disappear and I'm not surprised. There was the old pastor at St. Agnes who didn't like want the sword used during Mass. My own experience was a couple years ago at St. Mary Magdalen when I went to get a drink at water fountain when this lady walked up to me and said the church is part of the school and the school has a "zero tolerance" for weapons. I thought she was kidding but she tried to block my path and I told her, "Lady, this sword wouldn't cut butter." With this new PC for swords many people forget their history. The Knights of the Crusades. The pommel on their swords form the Cross and story of Peter cutting

off the ear of a Roman soldier with a sword when he came for Jesus at **Gethsemane**, garden

Then there's the problem of having a new CC manual covering the new regalia hasn't been written yet. When a company launches a new change their supporting documentation is covered but some reason the K of C is different.

If you read between the lines of the Master's press release, tuxedos are the next to go because new candidates can wear a dark business suit for the exemp or a tuxedo. The release further states tuxedos will continue to be used until they "exhaust their supply of social baldrics", translation: when we have noting further to sell we don't care what you wear. I know a lot of Sir Knights plan on being buried in their tuxedos maybe in future that's all be all they're good for.

The biggest problem I have with this new regalia changeover is Supreme's kicking to the curb its old loyal Sir Knights for the sake of attracting new younger members because their "experts" probably said this only way to ensure the survival of the K of C in the future but I totally disagree.
