American Pride on Display at this Year's

National Wreaths Across America Day Event

More than 2.7 million Sponsored Veterans' Wreaths were Placed by Volunteers at 3,702 Participating Locations Across the Country including at Veterans Memorial Cemeteries in Bear, and Millsboro Delaware.

COLUMBIA FALLS, ME and Bear, Delaware— Dec. 17, 2022 — National Wreaths Across America Day took place Dec.17, 2020 at participating locations across the country. Our nation's heroes were remembered as each name was said aloud and honored as over two million volunteers, a third of whom were children, helped place more than 2.7 million veterans' wreaths on headstones of our fallen across the country. At the Bear and Millsboro Veterans Cemeteries specifically, over 6000 veterans' wreaths were placed by more than 200 volunteers.

Wreaths Across America would like to thank the community, dedicated volunteers, generous sponsors, essential truck drivers, area officials, and members of the media for coming together in unity and supporting those who have protected our freedom. Each person has played an important part in the mission to Remember the fallen, To Honor those that serve and their families, and To Teach the next generation the value of freedom.

Each live, balsam veteran's wreath was a gift of respect and appreciation, sponsored by an individual or organization and placed on a headstone by volunteers as a small gesture of gratitude for the freedoms Americans enjoy. For centuries, fresh evergreens have been used as a symbol of honor and have served as a living tribute renewed annually. Wreaths Across America believes the tradition represents a living memorial that honors veterans, active-duty military, and their families. When each wreath is placed the servicemember's name is said out loud, ensuring their memory lives on.



Pages 9,10,& 11 are EDITORIAL "INTRUSIONS", and are relative to US military actions of over 100 years ago, and specifically the Spanish-American War.

Ugo Domini, Ph.D., was one of my history professors as I entered the Baccalaureate Program at LaSalle College [now University] in 1958. He is deceased. He was the Aide-De-Camp or Flagship Administrator to Commodore George Dewey, the CO of the ship & fleet. Ugo conveyed to the class his personal notes and memories of the Manila Incident and your Newsletter Editor rummaged about to uncover some of this history and to intertwine it with my knowledge of naval history.


The rank of Commodore is conferred during the time of war and falls between Captain and Rear Admiral. Dewey became Admiral of the Fleet in 1903 and that was made retroactive to 1899.


USS Olympia—A "protected class" heavy cruiser. [CV-6] Commissioned 1892>De-Commissioned 1899>recalled to active service in 1902 and was finally removed from duty in 1922. It was powered by coal fuel and vertical 3 cylinder triple expansion steam engines generating 7,000 hp to each of 2 drive shafts.

The Battle of Manila Bay or called The Battle of Cavite; occurred May 1,1898 and the battle lasted 6 hours. The fighting involved US personnel suffering 7 superficial injuries. There were no casualties reported on the Olympia, however one yeoman had a heart attack.

The chart above represents the shoulder Epaulettes as conferred upon Naval officers in the late 1800's and early 1900's and were applicable at the time Commodore / Admiral Dewey served.

The following is a transcript submitted by Commodore George Dewey, Commander of the U.S. Naval Force on Asiatic Station, which includes the Manila Bay encounter.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following report of the operations of the squadron under my command:

The squadron left Mirs Bay on April 27, immediately on the arrival of Mr. 0. F. Williams, United States consul at Manila, who brought important information and who accompanies the squadron.

Arrived off Bolinao on the morning of April 30 and, finding no vessels there, proceeded down the coast and arrived off the entrance to Manila Bay on the same afternoon.

The *Boston* and *Concord* were sent to reconnoiter Port Subic, I having been informed that the enemy intended to take position there. A thorough search of the port was made by the Boston and *Concord*, but the Spanish fleet was not found, although, from a letter afterwards found in the arsenal (enclosed with translation), it appears that it had been their intention to go there.

Entered the Boca Grande, or south channel, at 11.30 p. m., steaming in column at distance at 8 knots. After half the squadron had passed, a battery on the south side of the channel opened fire, none of the shots taking effect. The *Boston* and *McCulloch* returned the fire. The squadron proceeded across the bay at slow speed, and arrived off Manila at daybreak, and was fired upon at 5.15 a. m. by three batteries at Manila and two at Cavite and by the Spanish fleet anchored in an approximately east and west line across the mouth of Bakor Bay, with their left in shoal water in Canacao Bay.

The squadron then proceeded to the attack, the flagship *Olympia*, under my personal direction, leading, followed at distance by the *Baltimore*, *Raleigh*, *Petrel*, *Concord*, and *Boston*, in the order named, which formation was maintained throughout the action. The squadron opened fire at 5.41 a. m. While advancing to the attack, two mines were exploded ahead of the flagship, too far to be effective. The squadron maintained a continuous and precise fire at ranges varying from 5,000 to 2,000 yards, countermarching in a line approximately parallel to that of the Spanish fleet. The enemy=s fire was vigorous, but generally ineffective.

Early in the engagement two launches put out toward the *Olympia* with the apparent intention of using torpedoes. One was sunk and the other disabled by our fire and beached before an opportunity occurred to fire torpedoes. At 7 a. m. the Spanish flagship *Reina*

Christina made a desperate attempt to leave the line and come out to engage at short range, but was received with such galling fire, the entire battery of the Olympia being concentrated upon her, that she was barely able to return to the shelter of the point. The fires started in her by our shell at this time were not extinguished until she sank.

At 7.35 a. m., it having been erroneously reported to me that only 15 rounds per gun remained for the 5-inch rapid-fire battery, I ceased firing and withdrew the squadron for consultation and a redistribution of ammunition, if necessary.

The three batteries at Manila had kept up a continuous fire from the beginning of the engagement, which fire was not returned by this squadron. The first of these batteries was situated on the south mole head at the entrance to the Pasig River, the second on the south bastion of the walled city of Manila, and the third at Malate, about one-half mile father south. At this point I sent a message to the Governor-General to the effect that if the batteries did not cease firing ,the city would be shelled. This had the effect of silencing them. At 11.16 a.m., finding that the report of scarcity of ammunition was incorrect, I returned with the squadron to the attack. By this time the flagship and almost the entire Spanish fleet were in flames, and at 12.30 p. m. the squadron ceased firing, the batteries being silenced and the ships sunk, burnt, and deserted.

At 12.40 p. m. the squadron returned and anchored off Manila, the *Petrel* being left behind to complete the destruction of the smaller gunboats which were behind the point of Cavite. This duty was performed by Commander E. P. Wood in the most expeditious and complete manner possible.

The Spanish lost the following vessels:

Sunk---Reina Christina, Castilla, Don Antonio de Ulloa.

Burnt---Don Juan de Austria, Isla de Luzon, Isla de Cuba, General Lezo, Marques del Duero, El Correo, Velasco, and Isla de Mindanao (transport).

Captured---Rapido and Hercules (tugs) and several small launches.

I am unable to obtain complete accounts of the enemy=s killed and wounded, but believe their loss to be very heavy. The *Reina*

Christina alone had 150 killed, including the captain, and 90 wounded.

I am happy to report that the damage done to the squadron under my command was inconsiderable. There were none killed and only 7 men in the squadron very slightly wounded. As will be seen by the reports of the commanding officers which are herewith inclosed, several of the vessels were struck and even penetrated, but the damage was of the slightest, and the squadron is in as good condition now as before the battle.

I beg to state to the Department that I doubt if any commander in chief, under similar circumstances, was ever served by more loyal, efficient, and gallant captains that those of the squadron now under my command. Capt. Frank Wildes, commanding the *Boston*, volunteered to remain in command of his vessel, although his relief arrived before leaving Hongkong.

Asst. Surg. C. P. Kindleberger, of the *Olympia*, and Gunner J. C. Evans, of the *Boston*, also volunteered to remain after orders detaching them had arrived.

The conduct of my personal staff was excellent Commander B.P. Lamberton, chief of staff, was a volunteer for that position and gave me most efficient aid. Lieut. T. M. Brumby, flag lieutenant, and Ensign W. P. Scott, aid, performed their duties as signal officers in a highly creditable manner. The *Olympia* being short of officers to the battery, Ensign H. H. Caldwell, flag secretary, volunteered for and was assigned to a subdivision of the 5-inch battery.

Mr. J. L. Stickney, formerly an officer in the United States Navy, and now correspondent for the New York Herald, volunteered for duty as my aid, and rendered valuable service.

While leaving to the commanding officers to comment on the conduct of the officers and men under their commands, I desire especially to mention the coolness of Lieut. C. G. Calkins, the navigator of the *Olympia*, who came under my personal observation, being on the bridge with me throughout the entire action, and give the range of the guns with an accuracy that was proven by the excellence of the firing. On May 2, the day following the engagement, squadron again went to Cavite, where it remains. A landing party was sent to destroy the guns and magazines of the batteries there. The first battery, near the end of Sangley Point, was composed of two modern Trubia B.L. rifles of 15 CM caliber. The second was 1 mile further down the beach and consisted of a modern Canet 12 CM B.L. rifle behind improvised earthworks.

On the 3rd of May, the military forces evacuated the Cavite Arsenal, which was taken possession of by the landing party. On the same day the Raleigh and Baltimore secured the surrender of the batteries on Corregidor Island, paroling the garrison and destroying the guns. On the morning of May 4, the Transport Manila, which had been aground in Bakor Bay, was towed off and seized.

In closing, I want to wish you all a very Healthy & Prosperous New Year! Fraternally,



A call to the Bear Cemetery gave us the time and Date- Nov 4 at 8am. Sir knights have been looking for a real, physical activity as we have exited Covid. Picture arriving at the Bear Veterans memorial cemetery, and you notice over 30 Verizon crew trucks and many cars. They were there to assist by clearing the dirt out of the preset holes in the memorial grave markers. Including both cemeteries, over 20000 graves were flagged in one hour with all honor and respect.

In this case, the volunteers did their task, trucks and cars cleared the field of honor and a sea of flags honoring our veterans were present.
