CHAPLAIN’S REPORT

Father David McGuigan

I received a precious gift from my father on the day that I professed final vows as a religious in the Society of Mary, on October 12, 1996, and it remains a treasured personal possession. It is a gold medallion bearing the inscription, “God Love You,” on both sides. On one side, there is an image of the cross of Our Lord superimposed on the globe, and on the other an image of the Blessed Mother. Inscribed around the edge of the medallion are the names of my six brothers and sisters. My parents received it as a gift from an uncle of mine sometime after the birth of my brother, Jim, in 1954, to help them celebrate and give thanks for their family. When I was born, in 1960, there was no more room on the edge of the medallion to inscribe my name, and for good reason: with six children in the house and middle-aged, my parents were not expecting to increase the family. Surprise! I was conceived in November 1959 (Whew, just made it!). The question remained, where to squeeze in my name on the God Love You medallion: “David” appears on one face between the “G” and the “O” of God—the baby of the family always gets special treatment.

While I am sharing something that is personal and particular to me, the placing of my name on my parents’ medallion says something that is uniquely true and beautiful about all human beings. Human life is a sacred gift of

God and we are all held and sustained in being by God, who is love. The month of October accounts for 31 days of the Church’s annual 40 Days for Life vigil in thanksgiving for and defense of the gift of human life from the moment of conception to natural death, and so October is, fittingly, Respect Life month. The theme of this year’s Respect Life program is “Moved by Mercy.” That theme gets right to the heart of the matter. In support of God’s gift of life, we recognize that hearts and minds need to be moved, and we call upon God’s mercy to transform lives including our own. What would that mercy movement look like in real terms, in people’s lives, in our society? For me, it means we would see changed behavior. Unwanted pregnancies would disappear because the one behavior that causes pregnancy would be

shared only in the context of the loving commitment between man and woman called marriage. This means that the behaviors associated with virginity, chastity and virtue would be rightly regarded as proper to both sexes. It means we would see an increase in behavior associated with living faith—loving God with all your heart, mind and strength and your neighbor as yourself—and good will towards all.

Locally, we are aware that God's mercy moves among us, at Tender Care Pregnancy Center, in Westminster, through Project Rachel, the Church's pastoral outreach to women who have chosen abortion, through the efforts of our own Fulton J. Sheen Council, like the baby bottle drive, spearheaded for the past several years by our brother, Al Grasley, through the diligent effort of Kathy Reid, pastoral associate for Service, Justice and Life at SJCC, and many parishioners who pray and support, inconspicuously, not letting their left hand know what their right hand is doing, as Jesus said. Of course, I get to share all of this because my parents were open to my arrival, in 1960, even though they had not been planning on it. The medallion my dad gave me will always help me to be in touch with their love, and be grateful. God bless you, brother Knights.

Brother Knights and Families,

With the upcoming Ministry Fair at SJCC on Oct. 2nd, I wanted to talk about service. In my research for my column I came upon this article that I wanted to share.

To Serve...Not to be Served

Service is a hallmark of our faith. The founder of our faith (Hebrews 12:2) said of his own life that he came not to be served but to serve (Mark 10:45). His life was a daily reminder that he surrendered

the glories of heaven to come here and serve mankind. He did not seek his own will but that of his Father who sent him (John 5:30). His apostles, from Peter to Paul, were servants. The example of Jesus, his apostles and early disciples was one of service.

Service comes naturally to Christians once they begin to appreciate all that has been done for them. As our love for the Christ grows deeper our desire to serve him rises too. It is a natural maturing of our faith that we seek to imitate our Lord in all ways. As he loved and served so we love and serve; we do things that put others first even at discomfort and inconvenience to ourselves.

The example of the original church in Acts 2 was of service. They served one another by selling what they owned and giving to the needy (Acts 2:42-47). This unselfish attitude continued beyond the first days (Acts 4:32-37) and became an identifying mark of the disciples. By Acts 6 their work had taken on greater organization and men were appointed as leaders of the care of the widows (Acts 6:2-4). As years passed and the church grew the members were always encouraged to serve (Romans 12:11; Galatians 5:13; Hebrews 12:28; 1 Peter 4:10).

It is useful for every Christian to occasionally consider their service record and ask whether there is more that can be done. By its very nature, service is sacrificial. It costs something to serve others. An honest evaluation might mean more sacrifice. It might mean pushing ourselves more to serve the one who saves us.

An honest questioner might ask: "What does Jesus expect of me?" An honest answer is just as forthright: "Everything – hold nothing back."

We are familiar with Jesus own words when he calls us to seek the kingdom of God first (Matthew 6:33). We remember his call to the young rich man to sell everything and come and follow him (Mark 10:17-22) and the implication that even family must take a distant second place to the service of the Lord (Mark 10:29-31; Luke 14:26). His call is uncomfortable. It interferes with our own tightly scheduled life. We reason that we must have time to ourselves. We figure it is too much to ask to ask a man to do even more. We have convinced ourselves that attendance at Bible study and church worship services is sufficient when in reality we are only beginning to scratch the surface of our service.

Serving Christ is far more important than rest or recreation. Duty to God comes before homework and overtime. We are his servants, owned through his blood which redeemed us from the grip of sin and the power of darkness (Colossians 1:13). We are bought with a price (1 Corinthians 6:20; 1 Corinthians 7:23) and that price his blood (Acts 20:28). Our goal is to be a “profitable servant” (Matthew 25:21) which the Lord will reward (2 Timothy 4:6-8).

We will never be able to repay the price of our redemption. A thousand years of serving will not reduce the debt we owe. It cannot be repaid and we cannot, by our own goodness, earn salvation. Let us instead find satisfaction and comfort in serving every day to the best of our abilities. We will not be disappointed.

So, what more can you do? Who can you ask to join you? As Knights of Columbus we are the lowest of servants to the church, and in turn I, as your Grand Knight, am the lowest member of our Council, as I am here to serve you, and we

are here to serve and support our parish. Be a *fisher of men* and bring in more Brothers.

How many of-age sons do you have? Have you talked with them about joining the KofC? Why not? Have you reached out to those sitting next to you at Mass, or afterwards at your table eating donuts in the Faith & Fellowship Hall? Your Catholic neighbors? Your extended family? Why not? Do you not want to share Knighthood with all Catholic Men? Do their families not need the protections offered by our fraternal benefits? While you’re at it, ask your wives and of-age daughters to consider joining our auxiliary, the **Sheen’s Colleens**. Our Colleens are our partners in Charity and we need their organization to thrive as well.

From time-to-time perform an inventory of your service. I strongly encourage you to use the tool in our membership directory on the Council website to enter and track your volunteer hours. As a bonus, it will help you complete the Fraternal Survey at the end of the year.

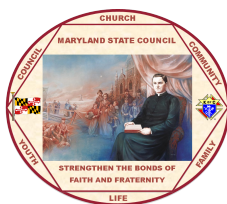

In July Archbishop Cardinal Sheen Council 7612 kicked off its 2016 fundraising association with M&T Stadium and the Baltimore RAVENS. Our council members look forward to taking part in this activity every year. All of the events are LOUD, FAST and EXCITING and everyone works hard and has a great time.



The year started with a BEYONCE concert on the night of July 10th. We ran two of our assigned concession stands on the club level. Our main stand was the GREEN TURTLE, where 12 volunteers prepared and served; cheese burger and pulled pork sliders, Buffalo and Barbequed boneless chicken wings, French fries, hot dogs, pretzels, popcorn, peanuts, cracker jacks, water, soda and a lot of beer. We also ran a 4-person stand where we sold: Chicken Tenders, French fries, soda and beer. We had a great night we sold over \$6500 of food and drink at the GREEN Turtle and \$4000 at the chicken tender stand. We earned \$ 800 for our council's charity activities

In August, we started RAVENS football with two pre-season games on Thursday night August 11th the Ravens hosted The Carolina Panthers and on Saturday August 27th, the Detroit Lions came to Baltimore. For these two events and the entire RAVENS football season we ran and will be running 3 concession stands, The GREEN TURTLE and Chicken Tenders stand mention above plus 2 of our Knights will be manning the cash registers for the main CLUB LEVEL FOOD Court.



For the Carolina game, we had 16 volunteers (8 Knights and 8 friends and family members) to run the 3 stands we sold over \$15, 000 worth of food and drinks. While for the Detroit lions game we had 18 volunteers (10 Knights and 8 non-council helpers) and again sold over \$15, 000 of product. Between the two preseason games, we earned ~ \$ 3,000.00 for our council (and the RAVENS won both games)

Sept. 11th, Opening home game, Ravens vs. the Buffalo Bills, we had a great day. We had 18 volunteers, and we sold over \$21,000.00 worth of food and beverage. We earned \$1650.00 for our Charities and Council.

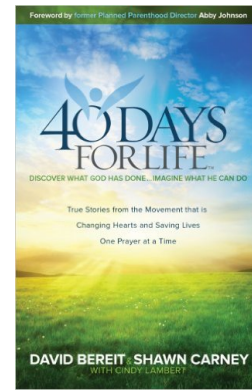
