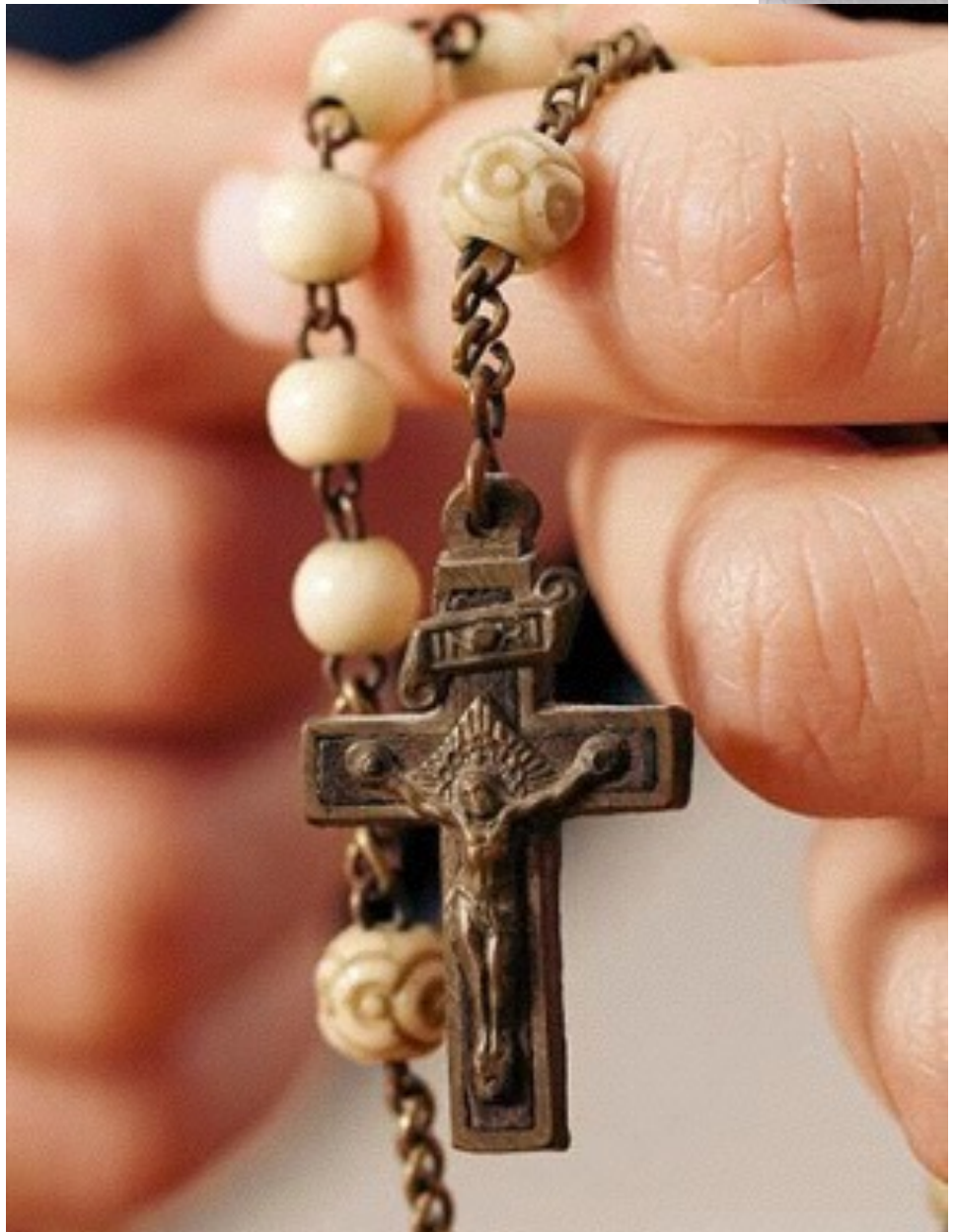

GRAND KNIGHT NOTES

Grand Knight's Message Ernie Rodriguez



Worthy Brothers, as your Grand Knight, I recently asked myself, "Why did I accept this position? Did I not know what I was getting into?" Was I crazy? Then I went back to 1981 when I went through my 1st Degree. You can imagine I did not know what I was getting into then also. I recalled helping out at spaghetti dinners and bingo nights and doing charity work. As I move forward to 2019, I now ask myself, what have I learned for the past 38 years as a Knight? I recall the 4 principles that I promised that I would practice as a Knight (Charity, Unity, Fraternity and Patriotism). Then I noticed that when I go to Mass, meetings and Knights events, I always display the Emblem of our Order. I asked myself, do I recall what the Emblem of the Order of the Knights of Columbus signifies? It's not only a sign or a patch that displays K of C, but every piece of the Emblem has a meaning. So as a Knight of Columbus, let us remember what our emblem signifies.

The Emblem of the Order of the Knights of Columbus



The Emblem of the Order dates from the Second Supreme meeting, May 12, 1883, when it was designed by James T. Mullen, who was then the first Supreme Knight. A quick glance at the Emblem indicates a shield mounted upon a cross similar to a Maltese cross, turned sideways. The shield is that associated with a medieval Knight. The cross of Malta is the representation, in a traditionally artistic design, of the Cross of Christ

through which all graces of redemption were procured for mankind. This, then, represents the Catholic spirit of the Order.

Mounted on the shield are three objects; a mace standing vertically, and crossed behind it, and anchor and a dagger or short sword. The mace from Roman days of authority, which must exist in any tightly-bonded and efficiently operating organization. The anchor is the mariner's symbol for Columbus, patron of the Order, while the short sword or dagger was the weapon of the Knight when engaged upon an errand of mercy.

Thus the shield expresses Catholic Knighthood in organized merciful action, and with the letters K of C., it proclaims this specific form of activity. The red, white, and blue in the background of the shield and the foreground of the Cross of Malta are the colors of our beloved country. As such, red is the color of stout-hearted courage, of pulsing activity and a full measure of devotion. Blue is the symbol of hope, of calm tranquility under God, and of confidence in the protection of our country, established under God. White is the symbol of nobility of purpose, of purity of aim, and of crucible-tried ideals to be carried out.

FAITH, HOPE, CHARITY

But there is another symbolism of color in red, white, and blue. This is the ecclesiastical symbolism in which red becomes the reflection of the drops of Christ's redemptive blood, shed upon Calvary, and of the Martyr's bloodshed in defense of the faith. Red, then, is the symbol of Faith, of belief in Christ, in the Redemption, and in the mission of every man to spread knowledge and love of Christ.

White is the color of the Eucharist Host, pledge of God's Eucharistic presence among men, of the infinite love God had for man, and of the overwhelming affection which the God-man had for each individual. White then is the symbol of Christ-like Charity.

Blue is the color of Our Lady's mantle, in which she draped her beloved Son, through Whom salvation came to a sinful world. Blue is then the symbol of Hope.

Brothers, be thus edified of the meaning of this, the noble Emblem of our Order. Always wear it with Pride, Dignity, and Honor, and be inspired to live the virtues it proclaims.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier Guard

On my way to work one morning, I was listening to the radio show *Catholic Connection*, with Teresa Tomeo on 1120AM. She was talking with a Bishop from Florida that has produced some videos regarding the real presence of the body and blood of Christ. Teresa mentioned about a recent trip to Cedar Rapids, IA where she heard a priest give a homily regarding the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. I wanted to share my version of that homily with you.

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier is guarded 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, and in any weather by Tomb Guard sentinels. Sentinels, all volunteers, are considered to be the best of the elite 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment (The Old Guard), headquartered at Fort Myer, Virginia.

After members of the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment become ceremonially qualified, they are eligible to volunteer for duty as sentinels at the Tomb. If accepted, they are assigned to Company E of The Old Guard. Each soldier must be in superb physical condition, possess an unblemished military record and be between 5 feet, 10 inches and 6 feet, 4 inches tall for males or 5 feet, 8 inches and 6 feet, 2 inches tall for females with a proportionate weight and build. An interview and a two-week trial to determine a volunteer's capability to train as a tomb guard is required.

During the trial phase, would-be sentinels memorize seven pages of Arlington National Cemetery history. This information must be recited verbatim in order to earn a "walk." A walk occurs between guard changes. A daytime walk is one-half hour in the summer and one hour in the winter. All night walks are one hour.

If a soldier passes the first training phase, "new-soldier" training begins. New sentinels learn the history of Arlington National Cemetery and the grave locations of nearly 300 veterans. They learn the guard-change ceremony and the manual of arms that takes place during the inspection portion of the Changing of the Guard. Sentinels learn to keep their uniforms and weapons in immaculate condition.

The sentinels will be tested to earn the privilege of wearing the silver Tomb Guard Identification Badge after several months of serving. First, they are tested on their manual of arms, uniform preparation and their walks. Then, the Badge Test is given. The test is 100 randomly selected questions of the 300 items memorized during training on the history of Arlington National Cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The would-be badge holder must get more than 95 percent correct to succeed.

The Tomb Guard Identification Badge is a temporary award until the badge-holding sentinel has honorably served at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier for nine months. At that time, the award can be made a permanent badge, which may then be worn for the rest of a military career. The silver badge is an upside-down, laurel-leaf wreath surrounding a depiction of the front face of the Tomb. Peace, Victory and Valor are portrayed as Greek figures. The words "Honor Guard" are shown below the Tomb on the badge.

The Guards of Honor at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier are highly motivated and are proud to honor all American service members who are "Known But to God."

To sum up what it takes to be a Tomb Guard... one must have utmost respect for their position and their duty, be dedicated to every aspect of their job and be able to accept the sacrifice it takes to reach the required level of this respect and dedication.

So what does this have to do with anything? It has to do with Eucharistic Adoration. Recently Father Michael came to a Council meeting and answered the question of what Council 9993 could do for him and the parish. His answer... Eucharistic Adoration. He wants the Knights of Columbus to help with Eucharistic Adoration by participating in and bringing others to "the contemplation of the Mystery of Christ truly present before us."



We need to take this same level of respect, dedication, and sacrifice to Jesus in the form of Eucharistic Adoration! As Luke 10: 38-42 states: *"As they continued their journey he entered a village where a woman whose name was Martha welcomed him. She had a sister named Mary [who] sat beside the Lord at his feet listening to him speak. Martha, burdened with much serving, came to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me by myself to do the serving? Tell her to help me." The Lord said to her in reply, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about*

many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her."

Jesus tells Martha that she needn't worry about the busyness of her life and the chores at hand. The only thing she needs to do is spend time with Jesus; adoring him. Unfortunately we can't spend time with Jesus like Mary and Martha did, but we do have the full body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus present to us in the Eucharist and he is calling us to adore him.

Do you have the proper respect and reverence towards the Eucharist? Do you have the dedication to spend time with Him on a regular basis? Are you willing to sacrifice your "busy" time to spend time with the "better part?" Consider the following Sentinels Creed from those that guard the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and as you read it, consider how it could apply to us Knights and the Eucharistic Adoration.

The Sentinel's Creed

*My dedication to this sacred duty
is total and whole-hearted.*

*In the responsibility bestowed on me
never will I falter.*

*And with dignity and perseverance
my standard will remain perfection.
Through the years of diligence and praise
and the discomfort of the elements,
I will walk my tour in humble reverence
to the best of my ability.*

*It is he who commands the respect I protect,
his bravery that made us so proud.*

*Surrounded by well meaning crowds by day,
alone in the thoughtful peace of night,
this soldier will in honored glory rest
under my eternal vigilance.*

Life Corner

Ever Listen to EWTN radio or watch Catholic videos on YouTube? You can find some wonderful information and/or inspiration there. For example, I just heard part of a talk by Bishop Barron that indicated a key problem with our culture. I would call it the "idolatry of the self." He said that our current culture has defined personal freedom to a great extreme. People now feel they have the freedom to redefine marriage, change one's gender or "gender identity", choose whether to live or die, or choose whether to have or abort their child. In other words, they no longer choose a Christ-centered path based on God's laws, but a path based on their own will being supreme. This culture of putting self above all is very hard to overcome.

Also, we recently had the gospel parable of Lazarus and the rich man (Luke 16:19-31). The rich man ignored needy Lazarus and lived in luxury. He was an example of one who cared only for himself, taking care of "Number One", and you can see how that worked for him. As Knights, we know that Charity, loving one's neighbor as oneself, is the second greatest commandment. We ARE "our brother's keeper."

This was reemphasized at the last meeting of InfernoMen that I attended. The message that stuck with me was that we fight our culture, not by using its methods of anger and conflict, but with the beatitudes and corporal and spiritual works of mercy. The beatitudes are given in Matthew 5, 1-12, and are worth contemplating. How can I be merciful, be a peacemaker, pure in heart? Should I be afraid of being persecuted for standing up for what's right? What if people insult or slander or mistreat me because I stand for what God teaches, and not for what the culture dictates? These are not easy things to live, are they?

In a lesson from my current Bible Study, "Lectio Peter", available on Formed, it stated that what keeps us from doing the right thing is most often FEAR or lack of trust in the Lord. We don't speak against abortion because we're afraid of what people will think. We don't give much to charity because we're afraid we won't have enough for things that we want. We don't try to volunteer or lead a project because we're afraid that we might fail. All these ideas, culture, fear, beatitudes – **they hit me between the eyes and gave me lots to ponder.** I hope that you will ponder on them, too. Thank heavens for [EWTN](#), [InfernoMen](#) and other Men's Groups, Bible Study, and the Principles of Our Order. We have beacons of light that illuminate our path, and show us how to live as godly men, not as pawns of our culture. Make use of these wonderful resources available to us.

Finally, I ask you to please consider how you might enrich your life by living the beatitudes. Maybe by helping at the Marian House soup kitchen or our food pantry? Possibly by witnessing for 40 Days for Life or at the March for Life? Or how about by praying together as a family or doing a family Bible Study? Attend Holy Hour or Adoration? Let's be bold, not men of fear. Let's put God first and not ourselves or the culture! Vivat Jesus!



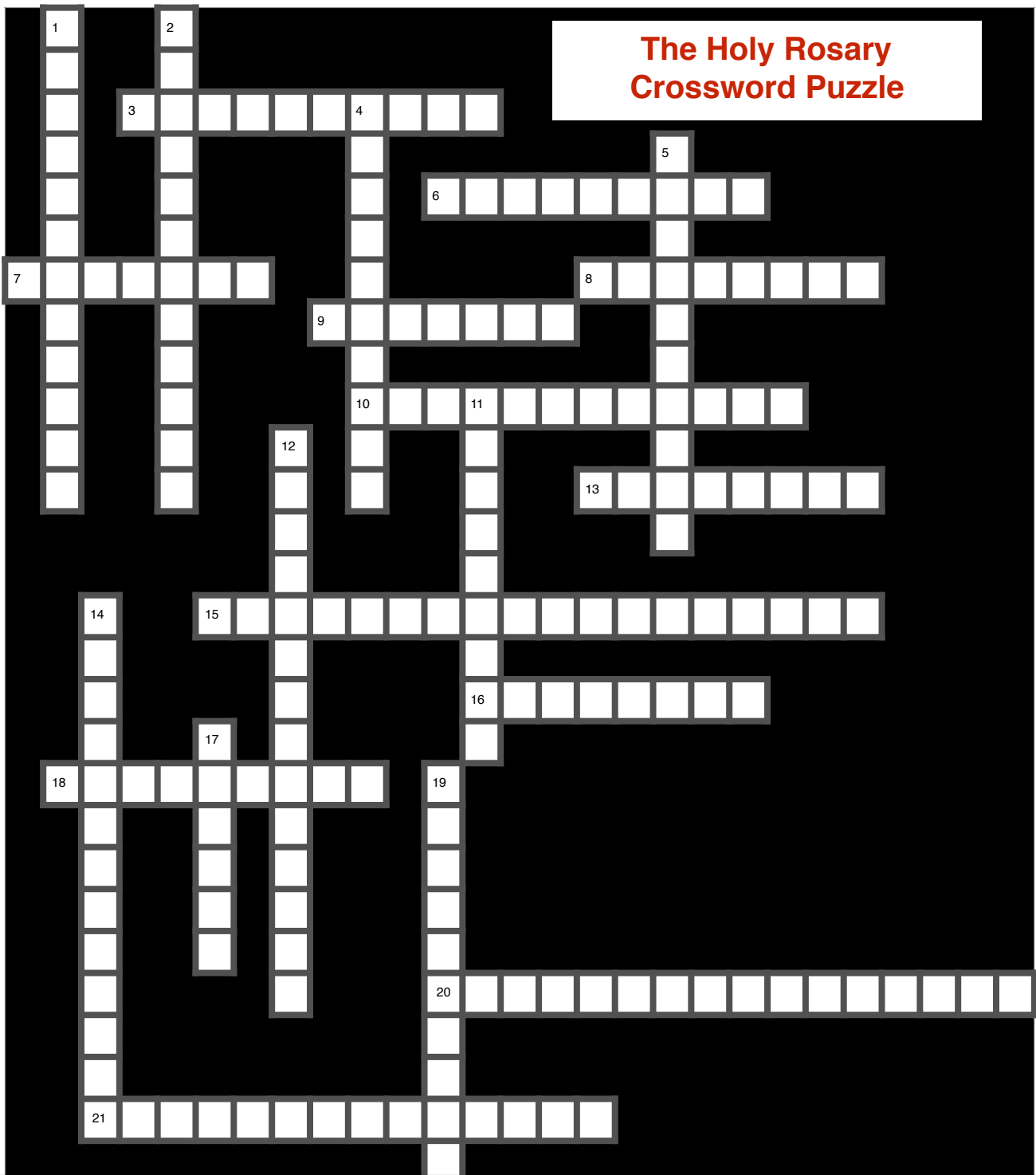
