Because of the large volume of furniture—sofas, occasional chairs, bedroom furniture, kitchen-dining room furniture, desks, etc.—some of these items by necessity will be moved from Reiter Hall to the council hall, meaning that, at least the first weekend, we will have fewer tables of the donations that have always sold from

Several members of the Ladies Auxiliary have already signed up to provide lunches for 12-20 workers. We hope others will join in. A sign-in sheet will be placed prominently in the K.C. Hall

kitchen during the first week. In the past we have enjoyed a variety of foods ranging from spaghetti to lasagna, to sloppy Joes to varied casseroles, to sandwiches and chips, to desserts. Some have even brought in treats for morning



coffee. Telephone calls soliciting help are forthcoming. If possible, please help us out.

IN the meantime, we still have time to collect other merchandise. If you have potential sale items, please let us know. Someone will come to collect them. We especially need household items like dishes, pots and pans, glassware, flatware, and linens.
