Furniture Sale, Community Outreach Program, Etc.

The July 22 Furniture Sale grossed \$2074. In addition, we have collected \$1164 since June 1 from the Antique Showroom on Malvern Avenue, who continues to sell on consignment some of our better items. Even since the July 22 sale, the store has sold for us a large Lazy-boy lounge chair for \$400, money not yet received. We have taken several nice pieces there since the Saturday sale. Thanks to **Tom Gilleran**, **Joe Van Hout**, **Dick Smith**, **Julian Post**, **Bob Kortenber**, **George Marshall**, **Jim DeGeorge**, **Ray Kukuk**, **Bob Kness**, and **Ed McManus** who moved out a lot of merchandise between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m., when the day's work came to an end. (Several of these men had also been present a day early to get organized for Saturday.) Thanks also to **Gust and Mary Turek** who came to check out our sale and just happened to bring with them a box of delicious fried chicken. That was a special meal-time treat.

Friday, the organization day, was the last of those 105-107 degree days. Fortunately, the front came through, the temperature dropped into the 80's, and the humidity was unseasonably low. We had a pleasant day to work and to add to our outreach program coffers. Customers responded well to our advertising and kept us quite busy until shortly before we closed the door.

Now we look forward to the October 13-14, 20-21 sale, hoping to have a lot of collections between now and then. Last week we collected what will be a real bargain for someone. We received a donation of an \$800 Stearns and Foster full-size mattress/box springs set that looks as if it just came from the store. Indeed, the donor says she used it just short of a month and then opted for a firmer mattress. The set she donated to our council is advertised as one that never needs to be turned. As for new donations, please keep the council in mind when you're ready to dispose of household items such as sets of dishes, glassware, flatware, cookware, decorator items, linens, and of course furniture. We also like to get books, mainly fiction, tools, art work, holiday decorations, jewelry (Costume jewelry is great!), and many other items. We discourage clothing, old luggage, telephones, and other outdated electronics.

The council Outreach Program, in addition to its regular monthly contributions to Jackson House, Eastwood Gardens of Hot Springs Housing Authority, and Christopher House (low-rent housing on Cones Road owned by the Diocese of Little Rock) provided in July several pieces of furniture to a previously homeless man who, with the help of a local church, is moving into an apartment. It also has purchased two air conditioners for a family in Eastwood Gardens. Earlier in the summer 20 air conditioning units were donated for the residents there.

Is it just me, or are men increasingly characterized in pop culture (TV, movies and advertisement) as bumbling "bozos" that "don't have a clue," aren't "cool" and are just plain stupid? The Sunday, July 9 issue of *New York Times* printed a big fat article titled "At Colleges, Women are Leaving Men in the Dust." As the *Times* explains, the Department of Education Statistics show that men, whatever race or socioeconomic group, are in a downward spiral.
