
Grand Knight's Report, continued

A number of the Knights of Columbus have been participating in the Great Adventure Bible study. The response to the study has been great, starting with the number of people. The group has consistently had 150 people. There is an obvious desire to know more of God's word. It also seems that people

have not only come but have actually learned something.

Reading the Old Testament can be an intimidating prospect. The names alone scare many people away. But sifting through the names, we come across behavior and events that are nothing less than shocking. It can be hard to keep it all in perspective given the sense of morality we are accustomed to. To imagine the shedding of blood as part of God's plan does not sit well with us. It is no wonder that many people see the God of the Old Testament in terms of fire and brimstone.

And yet that image does not capture the whole picture. It must be remembered that it was God who chose his people, and his one motivation was to share his life, to offer the life of heaven. Everything captured in the Scriptures reveals the faithfulness of God to us, to his people that he loves dearly. Understanding the Old Testament helps us realize how much everything changed because of Jesus. He is often described as a radical teacher and he was. The idea of God as a Father would have been hard to believe. The idea that Jesus was God would have been nearly impossible for a people who couldn't even speak the name of God, much less look upon his face.

The Scriptures are the word of God, speaking to us every time we take it up to read. While the stories of the Old Testament can be hard to comprehend, they are no less inspired than the New Testament. To fully appreciate the New, we need to understand the Old. In the end there is no substitute for reading the Bible. St. Jerome famously said, "Ignorance of scripture is ignorance of Christ." For those Knights in the Bible study, I hope this will be the beginning of much time with the Word of God. For all members may we be more committed to what God has to say to us through the New and the Old Testaments./ In Christ, Fr. Erik
