

#### From Our Chaplain



As the month of September gets underway, our nation celebrates Labor Day. It is a day, according to the Department of Labor, that "constitutes a yearly national tribute to the contributions workers have made to the strength, prosperity, and well-being of our country."

These are values long shared by the Catholic Church. The Catechism of the Catholic Church puts it this way: "In work, the person exercises and fulfills in part the potential inscribed in his nature (CCC2428)." Work is held up by the Church as a right and a duty for all believers. There have been many occasions in history where the Church has been a voice for the rights of workers, including the beginning of the Solidarity movement in Poland That movement spelled the beginning of the end of Soviet Communism and its attack on many human

One of the key figures in that part of history was Pope John Paul II. In 1981 he wrote an encyclical dedicated to human labor called Laborem Exercens. According to our late Holy Father, we share in the very activity of the Creator b our work. He points out that work is tied into the creation of Adam. There are some who think that work came only after Adam's sin, when God told him that the fruit of the earth would come by the "sweat of his brow." A careful reading of Genesis makes clear that work in the Garden of Eden was there from the beginning. Work was intended from the start as a way to share the creative work of God. With sin came the toil that we associate with work today. Work, like everything else, has been corrupted with sin. Labor is something that should be celebrated. While it will now involve toil, that effort can be offered to God to make us holy.

I close with the words of John Paul II. "Let the Christian who listens to the word of the living God, uniting work with prayer, know the place that his work has is not only in earthly progress but also in the development of the Kingdom of God. which we are all called through the power of the Holy Spirit and through the word of the Gospel (LE17)."
