

On November 16, Jackson House requested assistance for a family relocated to Hot Springs in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. The lady with three small children had little money and no car but had a recent job at Oaklawn Park. A crisis developed in early November when the landlord of the lady's niece with whom she and her children were living asked that they move. The apartment was too small to accommodate all those living there. The niece also has three children. So she contacted Jackson House for assistance after she found an unfurnished mobile home with an outrageous \$400 monthly rent.
