From Our Chaplain

September 5 marks the tenth anniversary of the death of Mother Theresa. It is fitting that we look back at the life of this incredible woman simply for all she accomplished, but this anniversary finds her in the news with new interest. A new book is being released that contains many of the private letters

she wrote over the years. The letters reveal a tremendous spiritual struggle that has surprised many in the media. (This information came to the Church's attention a number of years ago when the process of canonization began but went unnoticed outside Catholic media.)

In her letters Mother Theresa recorded an agony that went on for fifty years, but remained hidden to all but a few spiritual directors. Despite her remarkable charity and the evident joy in her smile, her interior life was extremely painful. In all but five weeks of those fifty years she lived in a spiritual darkness, feeling abandoned by God and totally separated from him. To quote from a letter addressed to Jesus and preserved by a confessor: "Where is my faith-even deep down...there is nothing but emptiness and darkness."

The letters have garnered attention in the media because there is much confusion about how to react to them. Those few who have long been detractors of her work see it as confirmation of their criticism. Those who were impressed by her but only at a superficial level wonder if such doubt weakens her witness. Those who understand her Catholic faith grow in admiration upon learning the depth of her faith that persevered despite nearly overwhelming doubt.

In her own life Mother Theresa came to understand and accept her struggle with time and guidance. Eventually she embraced what is known as the "dark night of the soul" and was able to see the hand of God, even if only in her mind. She wrote, "I accept not in my feelings—but with my will, the Will of God-I accept His will." Other saints have had similar experiences but none report the duration that she experienced.

Mother Theresa has long been held up as a heroic witness to our faith. During her life it was her level of charity that pushed many to be more charitable. In her death we are beginning to see the true character of a saint. She was much more than a social worker. She was a woman absolutely committed to God, and even with doubts that most cannot imagine, her faith continued. We will continue to learn from her life. At least may be respond with greater charity and truth in God, even when we struggle. Blessed Theresa of Calcutta, pray for us./Father Erik
