From Our Chaplain

As this newsletter comes to you, we are at the beginning of Holy Week. We are coming to the end of our Lenten season and celebrating the greatest mysteries in the life of Jesus. The love and power of God are revealed as Jesus lays down his life only to take it up again in the resurrection. By this paschal mystery death is defeated, sin is conquered, and the gates of heaven are opened to all who believe.

In the Catholic media at this time there is a lot of attention being given to the latest document of Pope Benedict XVI. On March 13 he released what is called an apostolic exhortation. It is a document that reflects on the discussions of the world's bishops who met in 2005 to discuss the Eucharist. This exhortation is called Sacramentum Caritatis, which means sacrament of charity.

The Holy Father connects the Eucharist to every aspect of Catholic life, and I want to share with you part of his treatment of the Eucharist and the lay faithful. "The Eucharistic sacrifice nourishes and increases within us all that we have already received at baptism, with its call to holiness, and this must be clearly evident from the way individual Christians live their lives." He makes it clear that the Eucharist is not something that only happens for an hour on Sunday, or even something only to be adored in a chapel, but is also a "lived" reality. What happens at Mass is powerful and is literally the nourishment we need to live the faith in practice.

The Holy Father says that, for the faithful, the Eucharist should "make them convincing witnesses in the workplace and in society at large." That line is particularly important for a group such as the Knights of Columbus. As Knights you are in a position to be witnesses of the Catholic faith lived well. The personal witness you give in places of business and among friends can reflect strength and a peace that comes from faith. The work that you do for the community should reflect this interior strength, a desire to be of service because of what God has given you.

God has given you nothing more incredible than the Eucharist, and these of Holy Week are days to celebrate that gift. These are days to be renewed in faith, days to be conscious of what God has done for us. God has given us his Son and we are truly blessed./ In Christ, Fr. Erik
