From Our Chaplain

The news of the past few weeks has been dominated by the tragic shooting deaths at Virginia Tech University. It is always shocking that a person is capable of such brutality toward fellow human beings. Unfortunately, history has repeated the scenario too many times and will again, but despite having seen it before it never makes sense. It is hard

to imagine what it takes to recover from such a horrific event, but I'm sure the outpouring of prayers and support from around the world helps at many levels.

In the midst of the turmoil another news items received much less attention than it would have otherwise. In a triumph for life the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the ban on partial birth abortion. While one horror gripped the nation, another came to an end Since human brutality makes no sense, it is beyond comprehension that partial birth abortion could be called a medical procedure.

While it did not dominate the news, there were many responses to the Supreme Court ruling. Some voices bewailed the decision as an unacceptable regression. Those voices need not be aired ere. One voice of interest was found in an editorial of the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette: "This latest ruling from a narrowly divided court is no great landmark victory for life. It's just another small step away from the morally, ethically, and aesthetically repugnant. But of such small advances is civilization made.'

This seems to be an accurate assessment. The immediate effect of this ruling may not greatly affect the number of abortions, but there is hope it can be the beginning of more substantial change No doubt those who work for the causes of life will be encouraged and renewed. If the tide only begins to change, then truth and reason will win out sooner rather than later.

As Catholics we must continue our efforts in prayer and awareness. Brutality continues in the world, but as our Lord reminds he has overcome the world. This decision is reason to celebrate that at least some lives will now be saved from brutality. May such triumph continue./In Christ, Fr. Erik


