#### From Our Chaplain

This month we welcome with great joy the ordination of the seventh bishop of Little Rock, Anthony Taylor. The last two years have been a rare experience for Catholics in Arkansas as the last time we were without a bishop was during the Civil War. In the past the outgoing bishop remained while the search for a new bishop was conducted. This time we were on our own.

Certainly Msgr. Herbert did a superb job as diocesan administrator, and many in the diocese will miss his daily presence. He has a natural gift for administration that has been on display longer than expected, especially longer than he expected. But, while he has kept the work of the Church going well during these two years, the Church is not just another bureaucracy. The Church is the Body of Christ, and Christ has given shepherds to guide the Church according to a special consecration.

On June 5 we will celebrate an ordination, not just an installation. Bishop Taylor will not only assume responsibility for the working of the diocese. He will receive the sacrament of Holy Orders as something distinct from his ordination to the priesthood. To be a bishop is to be placed in Our Lord's service in a particular way, in a way impossible without the direct guidance of the Holy Spirit. The ordination of a bishop is a consecration so that the work of the Church remains the work of the Holy Spirit.

The Church teaches that only a bishop has "the fullness of the sacrament of Holy Orders" as priests are ordained to assist the bishop in the care of souls. The bishop does fill the role of ruling a diocese, but he is first and foremost entrusted with the office of sanctifying and of teaching. As a man ordained for that office his words and mere presence are guided and protected by the Holy Spirit. We can have confidence in his calling because of the simple fact that Jesus promised never to leave his Church untended. The bishop is truly the shepherd and we are grateful for his coming.

Bishop Taylor has made it clear from his first press conference that all are invited to celebrate the ordination with him. He understands the role he has to fill and that his life as Shepherd of the Church only has meaning in service to the flock. On June 5 we will gather around the shepherd watching closely the work God is doing in our midst. We pray that historic day once again renews the Church in Arkansas and that Christ continues to walk with us as he promised.
