From Our Chaplain

I would like to share with you a little bit about my recent trip to Ireland. It started out a vacation with plans for a couple of religious stops along the way. I'm grateful that it turned into more of a pilgrimage than I had expected.

On the itinerary were various tourist stops that are included in my guidebook. Many of them include ruins of buildings that didn't fully survive the march of time.. The surprise came in learning the religious significance of their past. I knew that the faith was deeply rooted in the people of Ireland and learned that the faith of people today is built solidly on ancestors who faced many challenges.

The guides who led the groups around such places as the Rock of Cashel and Skellig Michael spoke openly and with pride about the fervent faith in places that are now shells of their former existence. Often the churches faced repeated persecution and disaster. Standing amidst the ruins, I was moved to imagine the real people that stood on that ground before. Many of them are unknown saints of the Church. They will never be canonized, but their sacrifices were real. Their blood strengthened the foundation of the faith. Many stories are told of worshipping in adversity, offering food for thought in our much more relaxed practice of faith.

While the ruins of churches and monasteries dot the landscape of the Emerald Isle, new churches have been built nearby and the faith lives on. The pilgrimage included stops for brief visits in churches that offer no great architectural or historic significance but demonstrate a fervor that has continued. Those who made sacrifices of the past would not be disappointed. The connection between past and present runs deep in many people.

In the midst of a climb on a mountain made holy by the steps of St. Patrick himself, an older man was struggling to make another of his many ascents. He offered simple words of encouragement that revealed much. He said, "Wherever you go, St. Patrick will guide you." And guide he has.

The faith in Ireland today faces new challenges. In the absence of outside persecutors the threat is indifference, made worse by a materialism that works more subtly but is no less destructive. It is a challenge faced in much of Europe, even more acutely than in the United States, but in Ireland the progress is slower. Traditional practice of the faith is found in every place.

For so many of Irish descent in this country there is much to be proud of. Through the intercession of St. Patrick and the Irish saints we pray that the missionary spirit will continue to draw souls to the heart of Christ and his Church.
