

Catholic faith, and in our history there are many examples of the transforming power of the Church Jesus himself founded. When men and women live the life of the Church in faithfulness, the world around them is transformed by the power of Christ at work in them. A Catholic is called to offer a different way, to put into practice a life that offers hope even while remaining honest about the challenges that often surround us. By allowing the truth of the gospel to transform our own lives, we have more to offer family and society.

Knights of Columbus is a group dedicated to working for the mission of the Church. The book is filled with examples of fellow Knights who have done so in heroic ways. Their witness is meant to inspire and challenge. More can be done than we sometimes think possible.

Each chapter concludes with a series of questions meant to provoke reflection and discussion. Each personal response will more fully bring about the civilization of love. I encourage each of our Knights to read through the book and focus on the areas that apply to his situation. Consider well the discussion questions. September is Life Insurance
Awareness Month. To help educate
consumers about the need for and value

the Life Insurance Market Research
Association (LIMRA) has published the
following five facts. These statistics are
