

## **From Our Chaplain**

October is Respect Life month and that seems to take on a particular significance in an election year. I recently read an article about the work of Knights of Columbus for pro-life.

In both Canada and the United States, groups of Knights have started an ad campaign with a simple

but direct message. On billboards and in pamphlets you will read: "A People of Life and for Life—Vote Pro-Life." The pro-life message remains as necessary as ever. At times it can be difficult to maintain the voice in a world that prefers not to hear it, but the fact remains that thousands of babies are killed every year in this country. No other issue in an election deals with the threat to life itself that abortion does. Without the right to come into this world, no other right matters.

The Church has long taught that part of Christian duty is to be faithful citizens. We should take seriously our role in the public life of our country, but our role must be formed by widereaching values. We have responsibility for the common good of our entire society, and we should avoid thinking only of what affects us personally. Mother Teresa said it well to a prominent group of politicians at the National Prayer Breakfast in 1994, 'Any country that accepts abortion is not teaching its people to love, but to use any violence to get what they want. This is why the greatest destroyer of love and peace is abortion." More than once she repeated the idea that abortion is the greatest destroyer of peace in the world. In the midst of war today those words still ring true. When the bishops of the United States treat the issue of voting, they put it in terms of conscience. The Church has always been clear about the obligation of a Catholic to form the conscience. Some have misunderstood this concept as a kind of escape clause. The mistaken idea is that I can determine in my conscience whatever I think right and no one can object. The correct idea is that the conscience is the very voice of God that resounds in the heart. God's voice cannot be coerced but it can be ignored. In prayers and study we arrive at a point where the conscience can be trusted to lead us in truth. It does take time and effort, but only then will our judgments be sound.

When it comes to the dignity of human life, there can be only one conclusion. I am grateful that Knights of Columbus is voicing that conclusion in terms of our duty this election year. 'A People of Life and for Life—Vote Pro-Life."/In Christ, Fr. Erik
