# **Knights Assist with Christmas Baskets to Needy Families**

Ouch! I know. It's hard to believe, isn't it? Seems like just yesterday.


But it's coming and coming fast. And that's actually the good news. Let me share with you some tidbits that may be of interest.

### From Our Chaplain



"The grace of God our Savior has appeared to all" (Tit 2:11). That was the scripture passage that formed the basis for the Christmas reflection of Pope Benedict for this year. Using a remarkable 64 different languages that included Icelandic for the first time, the message of the Savior's birth echoed across the world. In the annual greeting titled Urbi et Orbi

(to the Church and the world), the Holy Father pointed out that the grace of God is no longer hidden.

In all its life-changing power, the grace of God appears in previously unimaginable ways. A child in a manger appears like every other child, and yet is the long-awaited Messiah that captures the hopes of countless generations. It is for this reason that Christmas stretches beyond a day into a season, and hopefully as you read this you have not yet spoken of Christmas that *was* but as Christmas that offers continued grace.

The emphasis of the Holy Father with his Christmas message is that this grace is offered to all. He speaks the message in many languages to capture the universal nature of the message. Regardless of the divisions that exist in the world for race or language or religion, the promise of the Christ Child exists for all. Those few who visited the stable in Bethlehem represent God's promise to all peoples.

Of course the reality in much of the world is anything but peace. In many places war has become the routine, and it can seem there is no hope for those caught in the cycle. Yet that reality existed even as the child came to this world and continued even as he preached his message of salvation leading to the cross. Pope Benedict knows well this reality in the lives of so many people but does not lose sight of the greater reality, and so he says, "That is why Christmas is a feast of light. Not like the full daylight which illumines everything but a glimmer beginning in the night and spreading out from a precise point in the universe from the stable of Bethlehem, where the divine Christ was born."

As I write, the very place of that event has descended into war once again, and through it all we are called to look to a greater reality past the violence. There are many reasons given for the conflicts that make the news and political realities hard to comprehend. But through the complexities that surround conflict remain basic human flaws. Even such a source as the *New York Times* recognizes the significance of human failure as it quoted from the Pope's address, "If people look only to their own interests, our world will certainly fall apart."

The words of the Holy Father speak to a certain optimism that comes with a new year. As many people look to new resolutions and try to capture a sense of hope for the future, the message of Christ's coming is of greatest importance. No resolution that seeks only self interest is worth pursuing. Instead we look to the Child in the manger as 2009 gets underway. "May his coming to us not be in vain! Let us seek Jesus, let us be drawn to his light which dispels sadness and fear from every human heart."/In Christ, Fr. Erik

retirement checks at the end of their careers, but more employers are ending their plans or halting future benefit accruals. Those at greatest risk include boomers in their late 40's and early 50's who are still at least a decade from retirement but too old to save enough to make up the difference in their pension benefits.

An August 2005 survey by Pricewater-houseCoopers showed that nearly half of companies that expect to change their pension plans in the next year are considering freezing benefits for all employees. More than a third that offered pensions have already pared back these benefits over the last three years.

"This will definitely be a problem for baby boomers," says Karen Friedman at the Pension Rights Center. "You've been at a company under the plan and worked for years with that expectation, and then it's taken away.
