The suggestion was overwhelmingly approved by a council vote. At a fitting time we hope to have the building blessed. We also plan to have new signs for both Reiter Hall and Spirit Hall.



I have recently spoken with some of the local knights and scheduled a day on which our council Iturba Percefull can receive the Silver Rose that is part of an international program for Knights of Columbus. I want to write today about this program.

I have always been impressed with the work the KCs do with pro-life activities at the national level. The approach of the organization is well thought out and comprehensive. There are four primary areas where effort is given: education, prayer, public policy, and financial contributions. The Silver Rose program accomplishes goals in both education and Newton & Linda White prayer. This is the description given for this effort: "The Silver Rose program features a sculpted silver rose carried by Knights from Canada through the United States to Mexico, bringing the Paul & Flo Bachmann Culture of Life message on its journey. The silver rose is received at councils and parishes along its way, and masses and prayer services are offered. Special border ceremonies with Fourth Degree honor guards are held when the rose is transferred from one state to another. The Silver Rose program is a Joe & Betty Harrison sign of the Order's unity on life issues."

The ideas behind the program are good, and we are privileged to be part of it on September 18. Of course, the real success of the stopover in Hot Springs will be measured by the goals set out in the above description. I see two points in particular: the formation of a Culture of Life and the unity of the Order on life issues. Pro-life issues are the kind that cause many to look the other way. They are always controversial and the answers are never easy as they affect people in the most personal of ways. And yet we cannot look the other way. Each of us is affected directly or indirectly even if we don't like to acknowledge it.

Pope John Paul II coined the term Culture of Life to oppose a prevailing attitude that threatens to devalue the most basic good of life itself. Knights of Columbus has responded to the call to help change hearts and minds and protect the right that is the foundation of every other right. This month we have a chance to do our part in helping to shape the culture in which we live. By prayer and education hearts can be changed and our very society improved. This month it is the responsibility of each of us. Please make plans to attend and invite others so that our voices are heard and we are not accused of simply looking the other way./In Christ, Fr. Field Agent's Insurance Notes

September is Life Insurance Awareness Month. To help educate consumers about the need for and value of adequate life insurance protection, the Life Insurance Market Research Association (LIMRA) has published the following five facts. These statistics are certainly worth considering.

Fact 1: Nearly three-fourths of North Americans agree that life insurance is the best way to protect against premature death of the primary wage earner.

Fact 2: Twenty-four million households have no life insurance protection at all. Almost one-third of adults have no life insurance protection.

Fact 3: Forty-four percent of all households either don't own life insurance and believe they should, or own life insurance and believe they need more. Among those that already own some life insurance, 40 percent believe they don't have enough.

Fact 4: One-fourth of primary wager earners feel they do not have a plan in place to provide a decent standard of living for their family if they die tomorrow. Twelve percent of families would immediately have trouble meeting everyday living
