



From Our Chaplain



As was announced last Sunday, I will be leaving Hot Springs to become the pastor of Holy Souls in Little Rock. That means this will be my last article for Knight Shift. It is difficult to make that transition, but we don't get to choose the circumstances of our lives. I can say that I feel a great

deal of freedom in this process because of my vow of obedience.

Obedience is a virtue often misunderstood and under appreciated in our day, but I am grateful that is a key part of priestly life. While there is sadness at leaving the home that Hot Springs has become, I spend no time worrying if it is the right thing. I have been asked by my bishop, and I trust in the guidance of the Holy Spirit. While this change happens without the normal time of transition and that poses some difficulty, the Holy Spirit is up to every challenge. I ask for your prayers for me and for all affected, for good or for worse, by this change.

The people of Holy Souls have been going through a difficult time. The pain is real and wide-reaching. It is made more difficult because all the information cannot be given. The problem of alcohol has been named, and with that comes further consequences. It is natural that people want to know more, but we should reflect on the good we are seeking. My knowledge of more does not necessarily help anyone involved, and my actions without all of the information can make matters worse. And so. I again ask for your prayers. As Catholics we are truly brothers and sisters in Christ, and we are called to support each other. We should always work for the good of the whole Church.

The timing of such a change is rarely good, but we are in the days of Lent and that can help us to find the right perspective. During these holy forty days we are called on to look with the eyes of faith at every part of life. These are days in which we focus on walking with Christ and that walk sometimes includes carrying the cross. But that cross leads to resurrection for Christ and for all those joined to him. This is our goal in the face of every obstacle.

I have enjoyed writing this column for your newsletter. I have regretted that I could not be more directly involved in the work of the council but have felt this chance to write gives me more connection. It has been a kind of signpost each month to get an e-mail from Jim Lockwood reminding me ever so gently that the deadline has once again arrived. The few minutes I am able to spend reflecting on what to write helps me keep my life in the Church in perspective. I am able to slow down for a moment and take account of where we are in the life of Christ and his Church. It helps me to appreciate the beauty of the liturgical calendar and the seasons of celebration. We are never far from the life of Christ if we take the time to look for him. We are blessed indeed with the richness of life in the Catholic Church.

I close by saying, "Thank you." I appreciate the support you have shown me and am grateful for the work you have done for our parishes. These have been good years, and I pray the good work you continue to do will help you each to grow in faith and love./In Christ, Fr. Erik


