From Our Chaplain



Lent is a time of preparation. It is designated for the preparation of candidates for baptism and confirmation. For these candidates this season is intentionally set aside for examination, instruction, penitence and

prayer. It is a time of preparation for all the people of God. It is also a time to reflect on Christ's journey to the cross, ending at the Resurrection. Ash Wednesday and Lent began as a way for Catholics to remind themselves to repent of their sins in a manner similar to how people in the Old Testament repented in sackcloth, ashes, and fasting.

Lent is a time for penitence and discipline It is the time for mourning Christ's suffering and his death. It is also a time to reflect on his ultimate victory. Personally, however, selfexamination is crucial during the Lenten season. An individual's response to the call for purposeful reflection on one's need for God is an important factor in choosing a discipline with which to actively observe Lent. For some, fasting and denial are means of self-examination; yet, fasting is not an appropriate discipline for all people.

Lent has traditionally been marked by penitential prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, all norms used by Jews in their preparation for the festival. The Sermon on the Mount specially mentions prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. During Lent these three disciplines are so important that they are closely linked. Without prayer, the other two disciplines are merely actions done out of tradition, having little meaning. Prayer is our conversation with God. It is through prayer that we have the strength to fast. It is our means of developing a closer, more intimate relationship with God. This relationship makes us so grateful for God's blessings that we eagerly give to those less fortunate than we are. Fasting is one of the most ancient actions linked to Lent. Prayer and fasting together bring us to what Lent is about: a deeper conversion. Almsgiving is simply a response by us to God, a response we've come to through prayer and fasting. Here we come to a deeper understanding that the needs of all are the responsibility of all people in the Body of Christ. Works of charity and the promotion of justice are integral elements of the Christian life we began when we were baptized.

As Christ fasted and prayed in the desert for forty days, we try during Lent to be mindful of Christ through the standards by which we live our lives with goals of self-giving and suffering love. With such high goals, any programmatic response may seem to fall short, yet an attempt to incorporate prayer, meditation, and useful action in the path of Christ into our lives is invaluable./Fr. Raja

The laws and rules of our Order, as well as state (Provincial) laws, specify that Knights of Columbus may accept insurance applications only from Knights of Columbus members. As a member, you may apply for insurance on **your**self, your wife, and your dependent, minor chil-

The Order's Board of Directors, however, has taken action to assure that a brother Knight's widow for a limited time maintains the right to purchase <u>additional insurance</u>. This privilege can be of great benefit and comfort to those we leave behind.

This right to apply is available only to the widows of insured members. If a member has not availed himself of our top-rated life insurance program, or purchased an annuity or long-term care policy, this benefit is not available to his widow.

But if the member was an insured member, his widow has the right to apply for additional insurance on her life as well as on the lives of the member's minor children. This right can be exercised for up to one year following the Order's receipt of proof of the insured's death.

Know two things: First, if you should die, I'll assist your widow and children in any way possible, not only with your Knights of Columbus insurance but also with any other life insurance you may have. Second, I'll provide them my best professional advice and service to assure that they continue to have adequate insurance protection. As a professional agent and a brother Knight, I have no greater responsibility.
