

Sacrament of Reconciliation Justified in Both the Bible and Divine Tradition

"The tradition of Reconciliation is deeply rooted in the life and teachings of Jesus....," writes Matthew Kelly in his book *Redis*covering Catholicism [See pages 166-167]. "I have often wondered how non-Catholic Christians are able to ignore or explain Dennis & Chris Bosch away some of these central passages. For example, what is to be said of John's account of Pentecost. 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I am sending you.' And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained.' [John 20:21-23]"

"Today, many Catholics subscribe to this Protestant-Evangelical view, and sadly, their position has been forged not only by Protestant-Evangelical propaganda, but also the writings of some Catholic theologians of the late twentieth century.

"The objection has been raised that Reconciliation (or Confession as it was known as until the late 1900s) was only instituted in 1215 at the Fourth Lateran Council, and therefore was not part of Christian tradition from the beginning. This is clearly not the case. While the earliest Christian writings such as the *Didache* from the Mike & Nancy Schnaufer, Jr. first century are not clear on the form or procedure to be used for the forgiveness of sins, Irenaeus makes it clear in his writings that the sacrament goes back to the beginning of the Church. Christian writers of the third and fourth centuries such as Origen, Cyprian, and Aphraates also make it clear that Confession is to be made to a priest, and we have no reason to believe that this was not the practice from the beginning. Writing around 244, Origen refers to the sinner who 'does not shrink from declaring his sin to a priest of the Lord' [In Leviticum Homiliae]. Seven years later Cyprian writes, Finally, of how much greater faith and more salutary fear are they who...confess to the priests of God in a straightforward manner 21 Forest Wells and in sorrow, making an open declaration of their conscience' [De Lapsis]. Writing to advise priests, Aphraates says. 'If anyone uncovers his wound before you, give him the remedy of 24 Tommy Tobin III repentance. And he that is ashamed to make known his weakness, encourage him so that he will not hide it from you. And when he 25 Scott Hrdlicka has revealed it to you, do not make it public' [Demonstrationes].

"The Fourth Lateran Council didn't invent the practice of Con- 25 Larry Nieman fession or Reconciliation, as we know it today. The Council sought only to reaffirm what had been the constant practice of Christians since the beginning, and emphasize the advantages of this practice for all men and women who desire to draw nearer to God."
