### Massive Clean-up Underway

For a year or so, Council 6419 has wanted to clean-up the forested area of council property between our buildings and Spring Street. Excessively hot weather, drought conditions, or other commitments have interfered with intentions. But not

now. On Wednesday, January 18, a team of dedicated workers gathered at the edge of the work site and began the tedious task of clearing brush, including long, vicious briar tendrils reaching far into the trees, cutting stunted trees jammed against or too close to good trees. Joe Giompoletti, showing his versatility, replaced his chef's hat with a forester's hat, climbed onto either his backhoe or his bushhog and went to work with the clearing process. (ANOTHER reason Giompoletti Hall bears his name). Don Sass, Dick Smith, Tom Gilleran, Iturba Percefull, Lenny Didier, and Jim Lockwood cut vines and small growth with loppers, gathered them up and loaded a trailer to move them to the steadily growing burn pile. The following Tuesday, January 24, the same crew plus Bill Thompson, Dennis Bosch, Leonard Buchholz, and Leonard's son-in-law Tom (who just moved with his wife to Hot Springs from Las Vegas) were on hand to continue the work. Already, we can see remarkable improvement. BUT...completion of the job is far off, and a number of work sessions must follow. #### **Death Claims Two Council Members**

First, **Earl Robbins**, age 92, died at Mercy Hospital in Hot Springs on January 8. Then, on January 20, **Father John Burkus** died at age 98.

Earl, born on June 25, 1919 in Covington, Kentucky, was a long-time resident of Hot Springs, having served in different capacities in the community. He was a city alderman for six years and a justice of the peace for more than 30 years. He was known as a fine automobile mechanic when he was operations and service manager of Market Street Garage for 20 years. Following that, he was employed by Hot Springs Public Schools as high school auto mechanics instructor, retiring in 1986. Earl was a covert to the Catholic Church. He became a Knight of Columbus in 1988, serving both the council and St. John's Church through the years. For many years he was a regular usher at St. John's 8 a.m. Mass. The Rite of Christian Burial was celebrated on January 13 at St. John's with Fr. Alan Rosenau as the celebrant and Deacon Joe Harrison as the homilist. Burial followed at Calvary Cemetery. The council extends condolence to Earl's wife of 70 years **DeDe** and to his sons and their families.

Father Burkus, following a long period of infirmity and sickness, died on January 20. Fr. Burkus was born on December 3, 1913, in Lithuania, where he was ordained a priest June 15, 1940, and where he remained until 1949 when he immigrated to the United States to work with Lithuanian communities in Pennsylvania and later in Michigan. Eventually he

served with the Diocese of El Paso, remaining there until 1975, when he retired from active ministry and relocated to Hot Springs, where there is a Lithuanian community. Father became a member of Knights of Columbus Council 6419 in 1985 and later a member of the Fourth Degree Assembly, for which he served as chaplain for several years.

#### From Father West

During February we find on our Church calendar a couple of things of great significance to us as faithful Catholics. One is a great and joyous celebration, and the other a sober and stark reminder of the fleeting reality that is our earthly life.

The second day of this month we celebrate the great Feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple. On this fortieth day following the celebration of our Lord's birth at Christmas, we recall the moment when the Blessed Mother and Saint Joseph carried the Christ Child into the Temple, that He might be formally offered by them in service to God. On this occasion, the Prophet Simeon declared the Lord to be a "light unto the Gentiles and the Glory of Israel."

But we can easily overlook another aspect to this hold day: the sadness and hardship promised to Mary. To our Blessed Mother, Simeon said, "And your heart, too, a sword shall pierce." Imagine how haunting those words must have sounded. Mary most likely began to feel in that very moment the first sharp pains of the sword of sorrow predicted for her.
