thou are dust, and to dust thou shalt return." Lent is a time of fallowness, a time of waiting in the winter chill, patiently (or not so much) looking and longing for signs that spring is really com-

Though one could easily think that winter is a time of inactivity and barrenness. I have learned an important fact that may be commonly known by the true gardeners among us. But to me, who cannot claim any such distinction, it was an ah-ha moment, a discovery. One night, as I watched HGTV (For you confirmed manly men who are more at home with ESPN or the History Channel, HGTV is the Home and Garden network), which my wife loves to watch. I learned that winter is actually a very active time for many plants. Although you can't see it from the surface, their root systems can double their size over the long winter. At the surface, it's the same old, possibly dead-looking plant, but deep inside it is renewing itself and will come back with first light of spring stronger, fuller and more beautiful than ever.

Lent is much like that. If we let it, our sojourn in the time before Easter (our spring, if you will) can also be very fruitful in our lives. It's a time when we need to let our outward activities give way to our inside and real self and take the time to refocus The evening was made complete with Irish music from on the things that are really important, those things that are rooted in the real meaning of life. We need to extend our tap roots deeper into the soil of our faith, which holds us firm and which daily nourishes us. By allowing ourselves to really enter into the season, letting our inner life find nourishment in prayer, spiritual reading and works of charity, we might just be surprised at how much we have grown over the winter.
