The list price of this book is \$27.95, but a special book program in progress at Matthew Kelly's website offers these books for widespread distribution—minimum of 500 copies-at \$2.00 each. Kelly's great concern is that large numbers of Catholics are leaving the Church, most of them young people. Some leave for other churches; some abandon church affiliation altogether. Surely we all are saddened by this all-too-common abandonment of the Church that has seen 2000 years come and go.

Kelly's mission is to reverse this mushrooming problem. But he can do so only with the help of faithful Catholics. Rediscover Catholicism, addressing the current problems headon, seeks to reclaim those Catholics who have left the Church. We all know only too well that the problem about which Kelly eloquently writes is real because it has affected our own families.

Who but God can say how successful our mission will be? But if our efforts should create even one dynamic Catholic, it would justify our present undertaking. Depending on the response to this outreach, our council conceivably could come forth with another book for distribution in the parish, possibly Kelly's more recent book, The Four Signs of a Dynamic Catholic. In the meantime, you are urged to discover Matthew Kelly's website: **DynamicCatholic.Com**. There, among other things, you'll be able to get free copies of the two books mentioned as well as Mega Church Pastor (Allen Hunt gives up his role as pastor of Atlanta's largest Methodist Church serving more than 15,000 members to become a Catholic). the only charge being a \$5.95 shipping and handling cost. You may also order multiple copies of the same titles for \$3 a copy with free shipping and handling. They could be great gifts for those you believe could benefit from reading them.

#### A Message from Seminarian George Sanders:

I watched as the tea bag settled silently into the cup of hot water. The caramel-colored flavors from the bag began to effuse the water engulfing it and appeared to swirl magically around the cup by its own will and self-motion until all had turned a bronzed hue. I grasped the bag and jiggled it a cou-

ple times and a deeper brown bellowed from the bag.

It was tea time. I smiled as I thought that if Brenda were having a cup with me, we would have to cover it, set the kitchen timer for three minutes and then wait for it to seep until we had a "proper cup of tea." I mused that since she was not here, I would be having "man tea," and in a real mug to boot, so I jiggled it once more as a salute to manhood, discarded the used tea bag, sensed the savor of a good cup and raised it to my lips...Ahhhhh.

As I enjoyed my cup (mug), the image of the tea oozing from the bag into the water impressed me. It seemed so effortless and natural, like the tea was releasing itself from the leaves to embrace the water. A few seconds before, it was dried leaves imprisoned in a bag, but when it entered the water it rushed to join it, to become one with it. "Potential because potency," St. Thomas whispered. What was latent, what was there all along became actualized when it hit the water. It was tea when it was a leaf, and it was tea when it mixed with the water. But in the latter state, something marvelous had occurred; when it met the water, the water was changed. It assumed the character of the tea. It would no longer be recognized as what it used to be, heated water but what it had become, tea. I marveled again. It had been so completely changed that it became the thing that infused it.

It is this intimate union, this communion, that we experience every time we come to the Lord's Table. Like the tea that so willingly is released when it is submerged in the water, so Christ enters us. Like the lover, he rushes to embrace us, to be a part of us, to fill every once of our being with His Presence. And we are changed by it. We can no longer call ourselves ordinary. Because He is there, we are no longer what we were. We have been changed into Him. St. Paul says that "it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me. (Gal: 2-20). In his sermon 272, St. Augustine famously said, when you come to the Eucharist, "be what you receive and receive what you are."

Sometimes I believe we come to the Table of the Lord and genuinely wonder whether this could really be so. How could a Holy God really want to be plunged into this ordinary, unworthy body? I have heard it described as the ludicrous love of God. His love for us is so extravagant that we could never be worthy of it or earn it. Like a father's love, it's unmerited. So the next time you come to the Table, remember the tea bag. As He begins to infuse your heart with Himself, ask Him to give the bag another jiggle.

## The following is the Introduction to *Rediscover Catholicism* by Matthew Kelly, described in the article on page 1 of this newsletter.

Two thousand years ago, a very small group of people captured the attention and fascinated the imaginations of the entire western world. At first they were thought to be of no consequence, the followers of a man most people considered to be nothing more than an itinerant preacher. But when this man was put to death, a dozen of his followers rose up and began telling people about his life and teachings. They began telling his story. They were uneducated men who had no social status, no money, and no worldly authority; and yet, from the very beginning, people were joining this quiet revolutionary group a hundred at a time. As their popularity soared, the prevailing authorities grew fearful of their power, just as they had been afraid of their leader. In some places, the authorities tried to put an end to this new group by randomly killing some of its members, but those chosen considered it the highest honor to die for what they believed. This only intrigued the hearts and perplexed the minds of the people even more.

This small group of people were the first Christians. They were the original followers of Jesus of Nazareth and the first members of what we know today as the Catholic Church.

As the centuries have passed, much has changed. Today, Catholicism is the largest faith community in the world with more than 1.2 billion members. In every time and place for two thousand years, the Catholic Church has fed, clothed, and housed more people in need than any other group or institution in history. The Church was responsible for the birth of both the education system and the health care system that stand as pillars in our modern society. Throughout the centuries, the Church has also been the largest benefactor of the arts, nurturing these elements of cultural life that have the ability to elevate the human heart, mind, and spirit so effortlessly to the things of God. Today, the Church is the largest landowner in the world, owning land in almost every community from the most remote and rural locations to the most sophisticated cities. In this modern day and age, the Catholic Church remains the world's premier institutional defender of human rights.

And yet, as great as our achievements may be, as good as our numbers are today, we seem unable to capture the attention and intrigue the imagination of people the way our ancestors did.

The story of Jesus Christ is the most powerful story in history and has directly or indirectly influenced every noble aspect of our modern civilization. But amidst the hustle and bustle of our daily lives, it is easy to become distracted and distance ourselves from this story. From time to time, someone comes along who reminds us of the spellbind-ing power the Gospel has when it is actually lived. There is something ultimately attractive about men and women *striving* to become the-best-version-of-themselves. It is this *striving* that we need to rediscover as a Church. We have become too comfortably a part of the modern secular culture, and this comfort has resulted in a complacency toward the life-giving words of the Gospel. Too often, we listen to these words but do not allow them to transform our hearts and our lives.

I pray with all my heart that we can collectively rediscover what it means to live a Christian life. And with this knowledge, I hope we can embrace this *striving* that causes the human person to thrive and bloom. If we can get that *striving* back, we will once again capture the attention and intrigue the imaginations of all people everywhere.
