A Message from Seminarian George Sanders: "It's All About Me....Or Maybe Not"

Frequently I hear the phrase, "It's all about me." I don't particularly like the phrase, but as a Baby-Boomer I should easily identify with it since it has been our theme song. During my early years, children somehow passed from something "that should

be seen and not heard" to the epicenter of attention. Often our acting-out even came to be thought cute.

Of course, as Christians we have come to understand that this belief is wrong. We are not the center of the universe. God is. And because of that we are supposed to be more outwardly focused rather than inwardly focused, more charitable and less selfish. But I believe that somewhere back in the shadows of our unconsciousness we are still whistling the tune, "It's all about me." And no where is this more apparent than when we find ourselves in difficulties, in sickness, in tragedy, in want and need. When we experience a misfortune in our lives—whether we are passed over for a well-deserved promotion, we find that we have a terminal illness, our life partner divorces us, or.....(You fill in the A copy will also be on hand in the office of *Giompoletti* blank), our immediate thought is something like...."Well, God must be trying to tell me something or punishing me for something I did in the past. Or when we pray for God to lead us to the magical hidden stairway out of our mess with no (apparent) answer, we feel abandoned. Trying to explain the deafening silence from the Almighty, we begin to search our hearts and souls for some reason, some lesson we need to learn, some shortcoming that deserves this punishment. We can't keep from hearing that familiar tune whistling in the dark. "It's all about me." But is it?

This may come as a total shock, Boomers, but sometimes it has very little to do with us. Not all suffering happens for the ultimate benefit or edification of the sufferer. Sometimes the good that will come from our suffering is for someone else. In the second letter to the Church at Corinth, St. Paul writes II Corinthians 1:8 "The hardships we underwent in Asia, (were) beyond our powers of endurance, so that we gave up all hope even of surviving. Yet the reason that he was suffering might surprise you. He tells the Corinthians that his sufferings and hardships were to encourage them! St. Paul understood that by enduring these trials his life would become a lesson written in flesh and blood through which the Corinthians would be able to see God's providence and in their own sembly expresses gratitude to all these as well as to Larry times of difficulty and struggle they would be encouraged to trust God. St. Paul's struggles were not "all about him."

Although sometimes the problems we are facing were fashioned by our own hands and may be the direct result of our actions, I am convinced that sometimes God gives us a particular cross to carry for Him.
