Unfortunately, the Council 6419 team of Chairman Hans Purkott, Greg Speas, Steve Libby, and Larry Martin yielded the championship trophy to the team from the Morrilton Council 5209—Matt Zimmerman, Paul Zimmerman. 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From Deacon George Sanders: The Dandelion



As the sun peered over the pine-clad mountains, its warming rays awakened the lone dandelion in the valley below. As the dandelion surveyed the quiet valley

beside the rolling stream, he raised his face toward the sky and thanked God for the grace of a new day and all the blessings that it would bring. He loved his life. Just the right amount of shade. His roots tenderly embraced the rich, black soil of an old river bed, where he never had to thirst for water and the ground was full of nutrients left by the river that used to flow through there centuries before. Life seemed perfect...until....

It was a blustery May day when the dandelion first saw the boy. There he was frolicking with his dog down by the creek. Catching tadpoles, skipping rocks, trying to grab the crawdads just so, to avoid the sharp, grasping claws that whirled frantically through the air,

trying to avenge the unexpected disturbance of his sunning slumber. But then, all of a sudden, the boy turned and fixed his gaze on the dandelion and a curious smile spread across his face. His eyes flashed with excitement as he made a bee line for the target of his boyish interest. The dandelion could only watch as the boy plucked his head and stem from the ground and—poof—in a puff he was scattered to the four winds as the boy giggled with glee.

The devastated dandelion droned to himself in dismay. Why did this happen to me? Just when everything was perfect. All the time that I spent growing and maturing, trying to live a good life, I didn't take all the moisture from the rich soil. A Message from the New Haven Supreme Office

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


