

Mike is a new seminarian for the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph is now enrolled at Holy Apostles Seminary College in Cromwell, CT. He will be discerning God's call and studying for priesthood for several years.

Mike took his 1st, 2nd, & 3rd Degrees along with Ken Stewart who obtained his 2nd & 3rd exemplification at St.



Mike has sent two e-message to us since he arrived at the seminary which have been combined into the following:

Worthy Gentlemen,

I picked up my seminarian brother Pat Puga in Cameron on Monday the 19th and, except for one small detour (some ex truck driver I am because it was all my fault, IoI), we arrived Tuesday night safe and sound. I have found it is really easy to get around here, everything I might need is close by. Fellow seminarians from our diocese Jonathan Davis, Pat Puga, Phillip Sgrignoli, Bill Fox, myself and one seminarian from Santa Fe, visited a beach for several hours the following Saturday. The formation year officially started today, Sunday August 25th.

I want to say **thank you** for welcoming me in your council and also for the going away present. That was a very nice gesture. I really had a great



time getting to know you guys and I have a feeling that regardless of what the next six years brings, I have made several lasting friends among you, so again, thank you very much for all that you have done and continue to do. I would appreciate your prayers for a special intention during September. They are always appreciated of course, but if you could say an extra Hail Mary or two for me each week until September 17th I would be, once again, very grateful

Mike sent along some of Facebook posts he has made. These are a series of "post" that are strung together.

"Well I am sorry this didn't get posted sooner, but I have had some minor difficulties getting electronically connected and setting up campus email, etc. But I did promise several of you a class schedule and a general update.

First the schedule. Every day we have morning prayers as a community. They have been at 7 Am, but it was just decided to move them to 6:45. Mass begins immediately after. Evening prayers are also as a community at 5 PM. We are expected to pray the entire Liturgy of the Hours, but only morning and evening prayers are said as a community. Mondays are my easiest day (and believe it or not, I didn't even plan it that way, it just worked out). I have Catechism I Mondays and Wednesdays from 9 - 10:15. That is my only class Mondays. Tuesdays by contrast is my longest day. Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 -10:15 I have Introduction to Scripture and from 10:30 - 11:45 I have History of Ancient Philosophy. Finally on Tuesdays only I have Compendium of Philosophy from 6:30 to 9:15 PM. Wednesdays besides Catechism I have Latin from 10:30 to 1 PM. No classes Friday, but for 3 hours in the afternoon we have work period.

Seminarians do everything for this very small school, from cleaning toilettes to computer IT. [Editor's note, [Mike's previous career was a an IT specialist for a large company in K.C. MO]

Facebook Posts made in late August:

*General update.. The drive out here didn't go TOO bad, lol. I did miss an exit and not realize it for a while, cost us about an hour total, but besides that little glitch we arrived safe and sound last Tuesday night. I say we because I gave a seminarian brother a ride out there. I don't know why I didn't take a picture of my car when it was loaded, but we definitely FILLED my Subaru Legacy with all our stuff. Six of us went down to a beach for several hours Saturday, that was fun. Orientation was informative, but really nothing noteworthy.

* The formation year officially began yesterday at

Mass. Praying in community twice per day is really powerful and a tremendous blessing. A smaller

group of us are praying night prayers together also, this is optional. Morning prayers and Evening prayers are required to be prayed in community, the other three times per day we can pray on our own.

*You saw my class schedule in the earlier post, I only had one so far obviously. That will be one that will be useful to me for the rest of my life, learning the Catechism (not just what's in it, but how to navigate it) will be very beneficial. Anyway since I am at the very beginning of this new journey I don't have a ton to say about it yet, other than it is definitely the right decision for me (late, but right) and secondly I hope I am in your prayers as you all are definitely in mine. God Bless.

Being away from home and family for any college student is a big change for any college student, especially for our seminarians. Receiving support from home is comforting and reassuring. Cards for their birthday and other occasions is important, BTW: his birthday is 2/11. Our 30 diocesan seminarians will have a Christmas holiday break and a short Easter Break.
