Grand Knight's Report Brother Knights,

May 30th is Memorial Day A day on which those who died in active military service are remembered. A True story of "Four Chaplains"

In 1943, the four young Army chaplains joined 900 raw recruits who were headed for battle in Nazioccupied Europe on the Dorchester. The chaplains were: The Rev. George Fox, a Methodist minister, who had served with distinction as a soldier during World War I; Rabbi Alexander Goode, who had written a book in 1931 forecasting the rise of Nazi Germany; the Rev. Clark Poling, a Dutch Reformed minister who left behind heart-warming letters for his family; and Father John Washington, a former street gang member who became a Catholic priest. During the voyage, the chaplains guided and reassured those on board, providing comfort to men suffering from seasickness and from fear of the battles that lay ahead. At 1 a.m., February 3, 1943, a torpedo from a German submarine ripped through the hull of the Dorchester.

and the ship began to descend rapidly into the freezing arctic waters.

In the frantic scramble for lifeboats, the four Army chaplains directed many soldiers to safety. When the life vest supply ran out, they selflessly removed their own and gave them to the soldiers, knowing that they could not possibly survive without the flotation devices. Eighteen minutes after it was hit, the Dorchester sank off the coast of Greenland. Dan Kurzman, author of No Greater Glory, a comprehensive story of the immortal chaplains, recalls the ship's final moments in the documentary: "The four men were standing arm-in-arm at the top of the boat singing hymns, as the ship disappeared beneath the waves."

In 1960, the U.S. Congress created a special Medal of Valor honoring the Four Chaplains, and their memory is preserved in a stained glass rendering in the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C.

The Spiritual Corner by Deacon John Kopcak PGK

In the Gospel of St John Jesus tells us "I am the gate for the sheep whoever does not enter the sheepfold through the gate is a thief and a robber." He goes on to tell us that the sheep follow the shepherd because they know his voice. What does it all mean?. In order to understand the significance of today's gospel it is necessary to understand the role of a Palestinian shepherd in Jesus time.. Every night the shepherds brought their sheep into a sheepfold to protect them and keep them from running away. The sheepfold was a circular stone wall with an opening in the front. At night the shepherd would sleep in that opening. If the sheep tried to leave they would have to walk over the shepherd. His presence kept them from roaming about and getting lost during the night. But more importantly if wolves tried to attack the sheep by going through the gate they would have to attack the shepherd first. So in effect the shepherd could be laying down his life for his sheep. Does that sound familiar? In Hebrew scripture God's anointed deputies were often referred to as shepherds because their role was to nurture and protect God's people. Very often they didn't feed and nurture God's people but fed on them and led them astray as in the case of the Pharisees. who taught that people were made for the law not the law for the people. That's why Jesus was condemned for helping the sick on the Sabbath. The law became more important then the people who were cured. The Pharisees were leading the people in a direction that God didn't want. They were bad shepherds. That is why Jesus is called the Good Shepherd. He protects, nurtures and lays down His life for His flock. We are taught that Jesus laid down His life to save all people so in effect all people are members of His flock. If that's the case why don't all people recognize and follow the voice of Jesus. Sheep recognized the voice of their shepherd even when they were mixed in with other flocks.. When their particular shepherd called they responded by following him. EXCEPT WHEN THEY ARE SICK. I think the same is true of people. Sickness implies weakness. It is because of human weakness that we don't always recognize the voice of Jesus. That can cause us to follow the wrong shepherd. So what does all this mean for us in today's world? I think the answer to that question lies within each of us.. Are we faithful members of God's flock? Do I always hear the voice of Jesus or does my own weakness cause me to be misled by the modern day Pharisees of SECULAR HUMANISM and **CONSUMERISM** which teach us to be self-centered, self gratifying and covet more than we actually need? As members of Christ's flock we are called to pass through His gate and follow Him by sharing in the shepherding of His flock. How can I a better shepherd to those around me. Do I reach out with understanding and compassion to the weak and the misguided SO THAT THEY MAY HEAR the loving voice of Jesus the Good Shepherd?
