For Zack Nehus it all began on May I, 1972, in Paris, Arkansas, an idyllic little German farming community. He was the second youngest in a family of nine children. In the long shadow of Subiaco Academy, Paris also is the home of Father Erik Pohlmier, former pastor of St. John's Church. Zack was just one grade behind Father Erik in St. Joseph Catholic school.

Zack is a rarity in Council 6419 first of all because he finds himself among a group of largely retired men. He is one of the council's few young men., though in the last two or three years the council has been fortunate to add membership to an increasing number from that age group.

Zack is an anomaly also because he is one of the few native Arkansans in the council and even more so because he has spent his entire life in Arkansas.

Upon graduation from the local high school, Zack enrolled in the University of Arkansas, where he would earn two degrees-a bachelor's degree in Chemical Engineering and a master's degree in Biological and Agricultural Engineering. With the study of rice being his major emphasis, he was a natural for a job with Riceland Foods in Stuttgart. Zack would live in Stuttgart and work at Riceland for ten years, from 1997 to 2007.

Unknown to Zack, there was a Stephanie Antoine living in another part of the state. But before she moved to Arkansas when she was in the 8th grade, she had spent her first years in Hutchinson, Kansas, where she was born in 1975 to present council member Dick Antoine and his wife Becky. The An-

toines relocated to Hot Springs, where Stephanie enrolled in Lakeside Schools. When she graduated from Lakeside High School, she entered Henderson State University in Arkadelphia and worked toward a Bachelor in Education degree. Upon completing that degree, she stayed at Henderson to pursue a Master's in Education. Those degrees cleared the way for her first professional job as Curriculum Coordinator in Benton Public Schools.

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From Father George Sanders: "A Bottle of Fine Wine"



Several years ago when I was on a business trip in Southern France, I was riding with a Frenchman named Jacques Thiebeaux, who wanted to make a short de-

tour on our way from Nice to Marseilles. I of course agreed, liking the idea of taking an unplanned excursion through the small villages that dotted the beautiful and rugged landscape of the Cote d'Azure on the Mediterranean Sea. After driving some narrow roads and passing a few quaint villages along the way, we turned into a small vineyard and pulled up to the barn. A large but very friendly dog, something like a sheep dog, met us as we turned off the engine and began to walk around looking for the proprietor. Shortly, a tall (at least for a Frenchman) well-tanned gentleman entered the barn. As I remember, he was around 70 years old but seemed 50ish. remembered lacque immediately and

gave him a warm handshake. Jacques stopped by there annually when he could. His vineyard was rather small by today's standards and you probably would not find his wine stocked in most wine stores, but Jacques was particularly fond of his grapes and would buy several bottles on each trip.

As we took some time to visit (you never do anything in a hurry in Southern France, especially if a bottle of wine is involved.) I marveled at how passionate the vintner was about his vineyard in particular but about life in general. It seemed he anticipated the sunrise each day when he would return to the rows of budding vines and finely tilled ground. As we walked around his barn, talking about the year's weather and growing season, our children and French politics, we made our way to his work bench, ever so slowly and methodically, as if tracing the steps of an ancient dance ritual. And then bringing our polite discussions to a close with "ah bon!" and with just the right pause to whet our feeling of anticipation as a knowing smile began to span his jovial face, he asked, Would you like to taste a bottle before you buy?" This was the moment. He reached for a bottle from his shelf, skillfully peeled back the foil and popped the cork. He poured three generous glasses of the ruby red wine and waited anxiously for Jacques' reaction. It was as if he was vicariously enjoying the experience himself as Jacques slowly swirled the wine in his glass and plunged his nose into the aroma of the vintage before pausing the appropriate time to fully imbibe its aroma and raising the glass so delicately to his lips. Then Jacques remained expressionless momentarily as if he was thoughtfully weighing ever savor and aroma flooding his nose and mouth and

had collected more than \$6000 in cash donations. That figure includes insurance for two holes in one: a five-day trip for two to Myrtle Beach and a golfing trip for two to Pebble Beach. There's also insurance for the putting competition: two week-long trips to Hawaii for two.

Hans has also collected \$5000 in prizes—not yet a prize for everyone but there are still seven weeks until the tournament. As of now there's not a prize for everyone, but we have seven weeks to go. Hans' goal is to have 30

teams of four. The course cost is around \$4000, regardless of how many golfers play. The green fee is \$85.00. Tee-time is 9:30 a.m. Please remember that the beneficiary is St. John's Catholic School. Hans is hoping to net \$8000 for St. John's. With the help of a lot of golfers, the goal is attainable.

A short distance from Magellan Golf Course is Balboa Pavilion, where lunch will be served. Once again, our trusty chef **Joe Giompoletti** will be on hand with his traveling kitchen to serve up the best barbecue in the area, including ribs.



pausing just long enough to return the feeling of anticipation. "Amazing!" Joy then exploded between us followed by the requisite detailing of the exquisite experience in colors, flavors and comparisons.

It's been over twenty years since I drank in and savored this rich experience, but the memories of every detail and sensory pleasure have never faded. In many aspects we are like the wine bottle. As Christians our sole purpose is to contain the wine of Christ. We did not tend the vines, nor did we till the soil. We did not watch over the weather and assure the appropriate food and nourishment of the grapes. We did not harvest or ferment the grapes. All we had to do was receive the previous fruit of the vine into ourselves. In fact, we were each created distinctively by the Vintner with His own design and label. Yes, we look similar to most other bottles of wine, but we have been marked, labeled, sealed with His name. It's the seal that identifies what is in us and guarantees our authenticity. But we are not our own; we were created to be shared, to be poured out for the life of the world. Remembering the scene, I believe there is no fuller joy, either in heaven or on earth, than when the True Vintner gathers others around us, pops the cork and freely shares His real joy from within us. This is the spirit of the New Evangelism in the Catholic Church so well explained in Pope Francis' Gaudium Evangelii. May we more fully comprehend His great love that fills us and find divine joy as he shares us with our world. À votre santé. Cheers.

So Martha laid the ground work, and soon Zack and Stephanie met. A dating relationship began, the biggest complication being that Zack lived in Stuttgart and Stephanie lived in Benton. But, as the saying goes, love will find a way. After dating a few months they became engaged and planned to marry in Stephanie's parents' church—the Catholic Church of St. John the Baptist in Hot Springs. Then she moved into the Administration Building as Director of Secondary Curriculum and Special Projects. Last fall, with Drew and Jay enrolled in St. John's School, Julia was also accepted into the early education class, enabling Zack to teach at the same school.

Zack has long had an interest in the genealogy of the Nehus family. Several years ago, before Stephanie came into his life, he established contact with a distant Nehus cousin in a small town in northwest Germany. Leer, Germany, is very near the Netherlands. He and his sister had talked about one day taking a trip there together. Then good fortune made that possible when his sister's husband, a physician, was going to the University of Heidelberg to a medical conference.

The three of them traveled together and he and his sister went to Leer, where they met family members and had the thrill of attending Mass at the church where their great-great-great grandparents had married around 1850 and where their son Abel, a great-great-grandfather was baptized. Zack has returned to Leer the German extended family on two other occasions, the first being with his new bride for a delayed honeymoon during Christmas and the New Year's celebration. More recently, he and Stephanie visited again but this time on a trip that took them also to Munich and Rome, where they were part of a general audience with Pope Benedict.

Regarding his three trips to the homeland, for Zack it has been enormously satisfying to establish a link to Nehus relatives, even though the rela-

tionship is distant. About Leer, he has an indelible memory of the cleanness of the village and the industrious nature of the people. The local cemetery, where he saw the gravestones of his great-great-great grandparents and that of their son Abel. According to Zack, "it looks like a huge bouquet of flowers." The locals take great pride in its upkeep.

Since transferring to Council 6419 at the time of the move to Hot Springs in 2010, Zack has become one of the council's most contributing members. At the first officer election following his transfer, he was elected treasurer and has maintained that position to the present.
