# VALLEY OF OUR LADY MONASTERY - YOUR HELP IS NEEDED

At the October Council meeting, we heard a presentation on the community of Cistercian sisters at Valley Of Our Lady Monastery in Prairie du Sac and their efforts to build a much-needed new monastery. The community, the only order of their type in the English-speaking world, has called the Madison Diocese home since 1957. They are, unfortunately, living in facilities never intended to be a permanent monastery. The buildings are showing the effects of time and are becoming increasingly unsafe and unhealthy. They also do not provide enough room for the 22 sisters there and the community's growing vocations, and the environment itself is not conducive to their monastic way of life.

The sisters have a master plan and have embarked on a campaign (For the Glory of God) to build a new monastery, still in the Diocese of Madison. The sisters realize their overall goal of \$18 million for the project is a very large one, especially for a group of cloistered nuns. So they have broken the project into two phases. They are already 50% of the way to their first phase goal of \$10-12 million, which would provide them living quarters, a temporary chapel and guest quarters, and their altar bread workshop, which would allow them to continue to support themselves through the work of their hands.

While the sisters are pleased and humbly thankful for their progress so far, they still have a long way to go. Please consider supporting the sisters with your prayers, of course, but also financially. #### MONTHLY CHALLENGE FROM SUPREME CHAPLAIN ARCHBISHOP WILLIAM E. LORI

"For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted." (Gospel for Oct. 27, Lk 18:14)

We live in the age of the selfie, in what the writer David Brooks has called the culture of "the Big Me." Such a culture constantly urges us to "exalt" ourselves, but as Christians we need to be radically different by striving for humility. This means coming to terms with our pride, our desire for "likes," approval and recognition. As Mother Teresa put it, "It is in being humble that our love becomes real, devoted and ardent." Surrounded by the message to exalt ourselves, may we instead seek to humble ourselves and demonstrate real love to others.

This month, I challenge you to kneel before a crucifix each morning and ask Christ to give you the gift of humility. I also challenge you, in this month dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, to pray the rosary (either as a council through the Faith in Action Rosary program or as an individual) for an increase in humility.

What are some ways you can grow in humility? How can you strengthen your resistance to the lure of others' praise and the sting of their criticism? Did the act of humbling yourself before Christ on the cross teach you anything about how to be humble?

#### MESSAGE FROM FIELD AGENT - THE THEME FOR OCTOBER IS "REAL LIFE STORIES"

As Thanksgiving approaches at the end of the month, I like to take stock of all the things I'm thankful for. It's easy to say family and friends, those are blessings; and we sometimes take them for granted...but how about the little things in life. It might be that smile you get from person who hands you your cup of coffee in the morning, it may be relishing the crisp air on an autumn day. It may be a simple stroll in the park marveling at God's nature abounding. Maybe the joy of helping an older neighbor with a chore. All little things to be thankful for.

When I think about helping older neighbors I often wonder just how many members have taken advantage of help that they might need as they age. Some won't be able to do the simple activities of daily living. They'll need assistance, and with our mobile society may not have a relative nearby to help.
