If necessary, use a second or third page. More information is better than not enough. Many councils are disqualified for awards because they do not provide enough information or do not complete the form correctly.

We also wish to remind all councils that the state council will give \$10.00 to every council per new or re activated member, less suspensions (net number). This amount will be credited to the council's state per capita mailed out in the fall of 2016. We encourage all councils to continue to recruit and make star council.

The State convention is only weeks away. Our Deputy Supreme Knight, Logan Ludwig has advised that he will be at our convention. Please make every effort to attend. We need all councils to register and participate. Our committee is working very hard to insure another successful convention. The Supreme Convention this year will be held in Toronto, Canada on Aug, 2, 3, 4th. More information will be available shortly.

Due to the continued reporting, posting and communication by the Regional aides, District Deputies and councils, our membership continues to grow. As of this writing, New Jersey has brought in 1509 new members. More degrees are now being held and posted on our web site.

Thank you very much for your dedication and commitment to our order. We hope to see you at our state convention in Wildwood on May 13-14.

Highlighted Program of the Month

Questions and Answers

What is New Eyes for the Needy?

We are a non-profit, volunteer organization whose purpose is to help provide better vision for the poor the world over.

What are its credentials?

New Eyes is endorsed by the American Academy of Ophthalmology, the Opticians Association of America, and the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

Who founded New Eyes?

New Eyes for the Needy was founded by the late Julia Lawrence Terry of Short Hills, New Jersey. The idea originated when she worked as a volunteer in a food depot during the Depression. Mrs. Terry noticed that many people who came for help had vision problems that glasses could solve, but they had no money. She began collecting glasses for them from her friends and the idea spread. From an initial caring act by Mrs. Terry, New Eyes has grown over the years to become a worldwide project.

Who, how and where are the needy helped?

Since 1932, New Eyes has helped nearly eight million visually impaired poor people throughout the world. Residents of the United States are given vouchers with which to purchase new prescription eyeglasses. New Eyes sends reusable donated eyeglasses to medical missions and international charitable organizations in over 25 countries around the globe in Asia, Africa, Europe, Mexico, Central and South America.

What does New Eyes ask for?

We solicit used eyeglasses and nonprescription sunglasses. In addition, we welcome contributions of watches, silver and gold jewelry (even bits and pieces such as one cuff link or a single earring), silverware and giftware, costume jewelry, dentures with gold inlays, and hearing aids. We appreciate your financial support, too!

How does New Eyes work?

Thanks to thoughtful individuals and organizations, New Eyes receives many thousands of packages every year. Processing these donated items is the responsibility of hundreds of volunteers working year round.

Reusable eyeglasses are classified and sent to medical missions and international charitable organizations for distribution to poor people overseas. Gold-framed eyeglasses and metal scrap are sold to a refinery, while jewelry and giftware are sold in our showroom in Short Hills. Proceeds from both sales are used to purchase new prescription eyeglasses for the needy in the United States.

How can you help?

New Eyes for the Needy is a particularly good service project for any size religious group, civic club, lodge, business or other organization. We can provide everything you need for such a project - posters, labels for collection boxes, sample news releases and stories for newsletter, radio and newspaper announcements. These items are also available on our website at www.neweyesforthenedy.org.

Can you give a gift as a memorial or tribute?

Yes, monetary gifts are welcome from individuals and organizations to celebrate a birthday, graduation, anniversary or in memory of someone special. We notify the individual or family and promptly acknowledge your gift. All donations are listed in the New Eyes for the Needy annual report.

His Holiness Pope Francis, has declared this a year of Mercy (and forgiveness). SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Good Day Good People,

I've received several emails recently asking to explain the **Holy Family Devotion Program**. This has previously been called the Marian Devotion Program, however the image this time is of the Holy Family. This is a beautiful print created by Giovanni Balestra and contains a Papal blessing for those participating in the prayer service. There is an image in each diocese in New Jersey, and the diocesan chairman schedules the rotation through the District Deputies in that diocese. Your District Deputy will work with your council in helping you to schedule a prayer service with your parish.

The Holy Family image travels with a briefcase containing program booklets and prayer cards (you do not have to purchase these from Supreme, we have about 100,000 prayer cards in New Jersey and we can get more). We ask that at the end of the prayer service that you collect the program booklets to be used at the next service. The prayer cards can be distributed to all present for them to take home and continue the devotion with their families. The prayer service booklet can be viewed at Supreme's website: <http://kofc.org/un/en/resources/service/church/holy-family-prayer-program-booklet-5050.pdf>, it is a beautiful program and the booklets have full color templates. At this time the programs and prayer cards are in English and Spanish, I'm not sure if they will be available Polish this year. If you are running low on supplies, contact your District Deputy. There is also a log sheet that is to be filled out with dates and location of the prayer service, this is our way of tracking how many people participate and report back to Supreme.



I have heard of one Council that has arranged with their pastor to have the Holy Family Image at each of their Masses on Father's day weekend, they will be following Carl Anderson's suggestion to renew marriage vows. Congratulations!

The Intellectual Disabilities Drive is beginning this month; hopefully all councils have their sites lined up and the volunteers scheduled. Spiritual Adoption. This is a great program designed to have your entire parish or school community pray for babies in danger of abortion. To help stop the anti-life push around the world, the late Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen encouraged the spiritual adoption of an unborn child. This is done by praying daily for nine months that one particular but unknown child's life be spared abortion and be allowed to live. We will also be running the program on the state council level. Attendees at the State Convention and Grand Knights Meeting in June will be encouraged to sign pledge cards in which they agree to adopt an unborn child and say the prayer daily, starting in September. Then in the 9th month, at the 2017 state convention, we will have a "baby shower," asking the participants to bring a baby gift to the Culture of Life table. Please consider taking part in this great program!

State Diaper Drive. As part of Mother's Day month, we will again be holding a Diaper Drive at the state convention in Wildwood. Be sure to throw a box of diapers in the trunk before you head down for the weekend, and drop it off at the Pro-Life table at the convention center. We would like to see a mountain of diapers, wipes, and formula by the close of the business session on Saturday.

You should also be planning a diaper drop at your council for the month of May. Encourage members to bring diapers and wipes to your meeting to drop off for delivery to a pregnancy care center in your area. Something to Think About

On a recent Tuesday evening, a strange thing happened; I wasn't attending a meeting! I sat down in my lounge chair and ended up watching "NCIS." The sub-plot of this episode dealt with a badly wounded serviceman dealing with PTSD and his struggle with family relations and dealing with his physical injuries. The final few minutes dealt with how music helped him deal with these issues and start his journey of rehabilitation. As a former, and now has been, professional musician, this got and held my attention. The final scene showed a group of amputee musicians who have either learned or relearned to play musical instruments, some specially designed or modified, in a program called MusicCorps.

Established in 2007, this program has produced conservatory caliber musicians who have excelled in their musical skills and healing process. This is not just another "garage band" but dedicated men and women have gone on to perform in Madison Square Garden, Grand Ole Opry and many other venues with performers like Yo-Yo Ma, Sheryl Crow and many other performing stars.

Formed in response to the crisis of returning service personnel with major injuries, a music rehabilitation program called MusicCorps was developed to help these injured veterans play music and recover their lives. This has become what the Wall Street Journal calls "revolutionary pioneering" in the field of adaptive music that has helped countless wounded warriors to learn and play an instrument as a core part of their rehabilitation.

Why do I bring this Up? No, it's not an appeal for a donation or a new Knights of Columbus program, it's just to remind and show you that there are many innovative ways that we can provide support for our injured service personnel in dealing with their service related injuries and help them on their difficult journey of rehabilitation.

Google " MusicCorps " and be amazed and inspired!

Every year, as we come to the parade season, I get calls about the Color Corps "Summer Uniform." Please, let's be totally clear about this; **THERE IS NO SUMMER UNIFORM.** Each and every time a corpsman puts on his regalia, the mandatory uniform of the day is **BLACK Tuxedo – NO EXCEPTION!**

FROM OUR WEBMASTER

Today, in preparation for the Fraternal Year 2016-2017 elections, I would like to take you on a little "Behind the Scenes" tour of the communications wing of the New Jersey State Council.

The State Directory, since before my time, was the staple of inter- and intra-communications. It was usually compiled and distributed sometime in late Fall, and remained stagnant until the following Fall, with the exception of a few addendums delivered via "snail mail". The reality was, even before the ink was dry, the State Directory was already out-of-date as we were receiving over 80 changes (e-mail addresses, physical addresses, phone numbers, etc.) each month.

Fastidious staff and officers would comb through the changes and manually update their paper directory. But not everyone was as meticulous as needed. I would receive over 150 calls or e-mails each month asking for new contact information.

When the website was upgraded to version 2.0 in 2007, the State Directory was posted on line, accessible to staff and certain officers with security level access. But again, it was somewhat stagnant with respect to rare updates.

Then came Former District Deputy John Gazis, who in 2011 with the website upgrade to version 3.0, really began an intensive project of keeping the on-line State Directory updated in virtual real time. The on-line State Directory – which is capable of downloading as an "app" – is THE most current and accurate means of communications, by, and within the State.

When key members step up and agree to serve the State Council, their Council, their Assembly or the Agency, they are asked to provide certain information (Name, Address, Phone, E-Mail, Wife's name, etc.) so that communications may flow more smoothly and seamlessly. ALL information that is provided is protected in every conceivable way, and each member who puts forth his information does so with the understanding that they may "opt-out" at any time.

Specifically, each member providing their personal details agrees to the following:

"PRIVACY NOTICE: By submitting your original registration, or accepting an officer or staff position, you agreed to receive official New Jersey State Council Knights of Columbus e-mails from webmaster@njkofc.org. Should you decide, at any time, not to receive official New Jersey State Council correspondence and notifications please send an e-mail to optout@njkofc.org and enter Unsubscribe in the subject line. Please allow 72 hours for us to process your request. Thank you."

On our part, we monitor the website and provide a number of security procedures to protect a member's privacy and we will take aggressive steps to track, and if necessary prosecute, anyone determined to be selling or buying our member's personal information – that is my "24/7" part.

For your part, if you are listed in the various directories and/or manuals, you may help us by staying current as follows:

"PLEASE: Remember to notify us if you change phone numbers, addresses, or e-mail addresses as we also update the State Directory and the mail server.

If you change your personal e-mail address, at any time during your term in office, please notify the state webmaster at [e-mail-change\(at\)njkofc.org](mailto:e-mail-change(at)njkofc.org). In the subject line, type "e-mail change". Identify yourself; your capacity within the Knights of Columbus; your council number; your old e-mail address and your new e-mail address. Allow up to 72 hours for the change to take place. Thank you."
