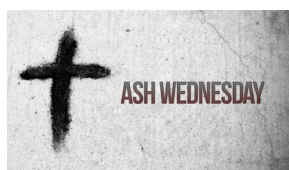

However, not all the news is pleasant. We lost a number of good knights to the Lord (both in this Council and around the State).

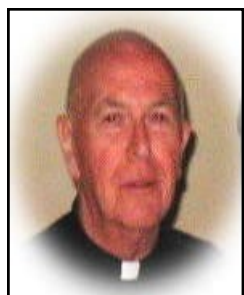

Chaplain's Message - Father Oscar Frundt



LENT 2015 BEGINS WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 18

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Season of Lent. It is a season of penance, reflection, and fasting which prepares us for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday, through which we attain redemption. It derives its name



from the practice of blessing ashes made from palm branches blessed on the previous year Palm Sunday, and placing them on the heads of participants to the accompaniment of the words "Repent, and believe in the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return". It is observed not only by Catholics but also by Lutherans, Methodists, Anglicans, and Presbyterians.

Ashes are a symbol of penance made sacramental by the blessing of the Church, and they help us develop a spirit of humility and sacrifice. The distribution of ashes comes from a ceremony of ages past. Christians who had committed grave faults performed public penance. On Ash Wednesday, the Bishop blessed the hair shirts which they were to wear during the forty days of penance, and sprinkled over them ashes made from the palms from the previous year. Then, while the faithful recited the Seven Penitential Psalms, the penitents were turned out of the church because of their sins -- just as Adam, the first man, was turned out of Paradise because of his disobedience. The penitents did not enter the church again until Holy Thursday after having won reconciliation by the toil of forty days' penance and sacramental absolution. Later, all Christians, whether public or secret penitents, came to receive ashes out of devotion. In earlier times, the distribution of ashes was followed by a penitential procession.

The ashes are made from the blessed palms used in the Palm Sunday celebration of the previous year. The ashes are christened with Holy Water and are scented by exposure to incense. While the ashes symbolize penance and contrition, they are also a reminder that God is gracious and merciful to those who call on Him with repentant hearts. His Divine mercy is of utmost importance during the season of Lent, and the Church calls on us to seek that mercy during the entire Lenten season with reflection, prayer and penance.



According to the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, Jesus Christ spent 40 days fasting in the desert, where he endured temptation by Satan. Lent originated as a mirroring of this, fasting 40 days as preparation for Easter. Every Sunday was seen as a commemoration of the Sunday of Christ's resurrection and so as a feast day on which fasting was inappropriate. Accordingly, Christians fasted from Monday to Saturday (6 days) during 6 weeks and from Wednesday to Saturday (4 days) in the preceding week, thus making up the number of 40 days of lent.

As Chaplain of the Delaware State Police I have for many years made ashes available to all troopers throughout Delaware. This has been possible with the help of many of my fellow priests and ministers. I am happy to make ashes available and know that many look forward to receiving ashes at the beginning of the Lenten season.

It is my sincere wish and prayer that all my Brother Knights and their families will have a good lent. God bless you and your families, and may God continue to bless the Knights of Columbus!

K of C LICENSE PLATES

Delaware Knights of Columbus license plates are available to any brother Knight in good standing. There are two ways to select a number. You can either call the chairman or do it on-line. Check the list, select a number then call the chairman. The chairman will send the member an approved request. The approved request is completed by the member and sent to the Department Motor Vehicle (DMV) with nominal one time charge of \$10.



When you get a KC tag you keep your present tag. The old tag must be kept in the vehicle at all times and display of either or both tags is legal. The KC tag can be put on a truck up to 3/4 ton capacity.

When you pay the \$10 fee and get a new KC plate, it will include a second expiration sticker for the KofC plate. It takes about 6 weeks to get a new tag from DMV.

When your registration expires and you go to re-register the vehicle the DMV will give you two expiration stickers. When you transfer your tags to a new vehicle the KC tag transfers at no cost. The name of the brother Knight to whom the plate is issued must be on the vehicle registration (vehicle may be co-registered with a non-knight such as a spouse).

If a member dies the tag must be returned to the DMV. Tags are not transferable and they must be returned to DMV.
