### **Chaplain's Reflection Miracle of Christmas**

Christmas is God's greatest miracle. What is a miracle? A miracle is any special showing of God's goodness. And His Son, the infant Jesus, started working miracles right from the moment he was born. There is a legend about the first miracle of the infant Jesus. It is a legend because it is not in the Gospel, but knowing how much Jesus loves us we can be pretty sure that it is true.

Two thousand years ago in Bethlehem, there was a young orphan boy named Ezekiel who was born unable to speak. Through his mouth came only ugly grunting sounds - no words. He was tongueless. Ezekiel was a wonderful little boy who worked very hard to please everyone, but people at the inn where he helped out made fun of him because he could not speak.

Ezekiel trusted in God and prayed to him every night for the gift of speech. He wanted to be able to talk, sing and play with all the other children. Every morning he woke up believing that God would one day work a miracle, but he was always disappointed.

As he wandered the hills and fields of Bethlehem, Ezekiel came upon other tongueless ones like himself. The streams would chatter, the trees would whoosh, the rains would pelt and the grasses would rustle. And graciously, they blended his unmusical noises right into their symphony. Ezekiel came to understand how God had answered his prayers in a very special way, for he could talk with all the tongueless ones. His life became filled with joy.

However, one terrible morning, the innkeeper was really mean to him and sent him out to eat with the pigs in the stable behind the inn. Later that evening, large crowds suddenly descended upon Bethlehem and the inn became very full. So Ezekiel had to work long and late hours. But the patrons were cruel and impatient with him because he could not speak.

Feeling alone, Ezekiel ran into the darkness of Bethlehem to talk to his only real friends, the tongueless ones. But on this night they did not speak back to him. The streams, the winds, the grasses, the trees and the leaves were absolutely silent. Feeling abandoned, Ezekiel cried himself to sleep in the fields.

While Ezekiel slept, a great white star rose over the city of Bethlehem. When Ezekiel returned to the inn, he saw a bright glowing radiance coming from the stable where a man, a



#### **Return Our Bar Stool**

An upholstered wooden bar stool that dates to the late 1970s was taken from the Council in early November. It is a piece of our history and belongs at the Council. Please return the stool to either the outside entrance to the building manager's office or the entrance to the Knights' Room. Leave the stool when members aren't around - before 1 p.m. any day of the week. Remain anonymous - no questions asked.

## Christmas is the season of giving, and in that spirit, here are some suggestions on how to serve others this Christmas.

- **1.The gift of food.** Call your local soup kitchen or homeless shelter and schedule a time for your family to go serve meals. If your schedule doesn't allow it, another option would be to inquire if they are low on any specific supply needs. This time of year many organizations host food drives, so their pantry may be full, but there may be other items that need to be restocked such as bandages, blankets or personal hygiene items.
- 2. The gift of your time. Although the holiday season can mean nursing homes are overwhelmed with groups that want to visit and sing Christmas carols, there are other ways that you can help. Check to see if you can visit during the residents' recreational time and play games with them, read to them or spend some time with residents who don't have regular visitors. Christmas goodies can help sweeten the time spent together as well as create conversations.
- **2. The gift of anonymous gifting.** Every church in our parishes has a giving tree. Consider taking more than one angel request and making Christmas all the more special for those in need.
- 3. The gift of belonging. Choose a child, grandparent, single mom or family who is struggling this year and purchase gifts or groceries or deliver a meal. If you don't know someone personally, you can ask local agencies and organizations that work with needy families.
- **4. The gift of comfort.** Check with your priest or Inquire at the utility company to see if you can pay the electric, gas or water bill for someone who is struggling. (Note: due to privacy factors, you may not be able to pay a specific bill, but there is often a fund to which you can donate.) You can also check with the Department of Family and Children's Services.
- **5. The gift of appreciation.** Bake a meal or treats for someone who helps you. Bake a little box of goodies for elderly neighbors. Or leave a little snack bag in the mailbox with a note for your mail carrier. Another idea is to leave a basket of snacks, soft drinks, and bottled water on the porch with a note inviting delivery people to help themselves. That's sure to be a greatly appreciated gesture during the busy holiday season.
- **6. The gift of caring**. Call your local hospital and see if you could deliver a meal or snacks and drinks if someone isn't already doing that. Some hospitals have hospitality rooms for families of seriously ill patients. Perhaps you could bring snacks to be left in those rooms
- 7. The gift of dignity. Consider making bags to give out to homeless people. Fill a gallon-size storage bag with items such as: gloves, a beanie, small juice boxes or water bottles, non-perishable ready-to-eat food items, lip balm, facial tissues, restaurant gifts cards, or prepaid phone cards. You might also consider giving blankets or a sleeping bag.

Perhaps an even better way to help the homeless community is to contact an organization like Shepherd's Table that works directly with the homeless and find out what it needs. Often, these organizations can stretch monetary donations farther than we could by purchasing in bulk or working with complementary organizations. Leave a generous tip for your server at restaurants.

- **8. The gift of youthful energy.** This one is geared toward the kids with boundless energy. Do housework or yard work for someone. Rake leaves, shovel snow, clean house or do laundry for someone who could use the extra help. You might consider a sick or elderly neighbor or a new or single parent. Obviously, you'll have to make arrangements to do housework, but yard work can be done as a complete surprise.
- **9. The gift of paying it forward.** Pay for someone's meal at a restaurant. Paying for someone's meal in a restaurant or the car behind you in the drive-thru is a fun random act of kindness any of time of year, but it's often especially appreciated at Christmas when money is tight for many families.
- **10.** The gift of warmth and appreciation. Take hand warmers and/or a hot beverage to people working in the cold. Police officers directing traffic, mail carriers, bell ringers or anyone else working out in the cold this Christmas season will appreciate a cup of hot cocoa, coffee, tea or cider.

Whether you're investing your time, financial resources or both to serve others this holiday season, you'll likely find that it's you and your family who are blessed by serving others. And that my friends, is the gift of Keeping Christ in Christmas!

Christmas is the day that Christians acknowledge as the day of the birth of Jesus over 2,000 years ago - the Son of God in the town of Bethlehem. Religious recognition is made of this everywhere in the world. What is the city of Bethlehem like today with over 20,000 citizens of mixed Muslim and Christian faiths living together?

Bethlehem today is a town of both Christian and Muslim residents 10 miles south of Jerusalem. It is in the West Bank area of Israel and under the full control of the Palestinian Authority. There is an Israeli Army checkpoint prior to entering the area, but tourists with passports are granted admission unconditionally. The center of attraction is Manger Square with The Church of the Nativity (built first in 330AD) and the adjoining Franciscan Monastery with its Church of St. Catherine (1881). Within the latter church is the Grotto of the Nativity, accessible only from within the church. It is the undisputed location of the birth of Jesus. This is the location of a Midnight Mass that draws thousands of pilgrims from around the world every year. The city has over 30 hotels and a wide variety of shops and restaurants open to everyone.

On December 25, there is a religious procession with people carrying candles from the Shepherd's Fields located about a mile East of the town. This is the area where it is felt that shepherds first saw the star in the sky. The procession ends back at Manger Square and a Mass is celebrated at The Church of the Nativity. Holiday parties and concerts take place with people mingling with strangers and enjoying the festivities.

Interesting to both Christian and Jewish people is Rachel's Tomb, located in a cemetery just outside Bethlehem. Rachel was the wife of Jacob and the mother of Joseph and Benjamin, each of whom are mentioned in the Bible. You may also view King David's Wells which were excavated in 1895. These are three great cisterns which provided water to this ancient city thousands of years ago. And King Solomon's Pools - three water reservoirs dating to 100 BC with ancient aqueducts that provided water to Jerusalem and other area towns. Pilgrims may also visit the Milk Grotto which is an area used by people of that time.

Our Christmas luncheon is on the Tuesday, December 19. It is the largest of the year and will be exceptionally special. Have you gotten your tickets from Nancy yet? Only tickets obtained prior to the date are valid. Fr. Perkins will entertain us with his humorous stories that we all enjoy. There will be raffles, prizes, many gifts and an exceptional meal. Don't forget to bring those Christmas goodies to share with everyone. DON'T MISS IT!
