Advent – Have You the Heart for It?

As we begin Advent 2011, I suggest we take our minds off the liturgical changes that we are experiencing and focus on how God is doing new things in the world; how he is breaking into the world afresh. To be attentive to these movements of the Holy Spirit we need to stay awake and to know our hearts – to be awake to the faith of our hearts.

For some the ideas 'faith' and 'heart' don't sit easily together – but they do complement each other. At times in the tradition of the church the idea of faith has been very cerebral. For St. Thomas Aquinas, as one example, faith was almost an act of the intellect; faith, he suggested, is formed in the intellect but caused by the will. Thus faith was often seen as primarily an intellectual affirmation. However to

live trusting and faith filled lives we need to feel love in our hearts not simply assert truths with our heads. If faith begins with the heart, if genuinely treasured, it will radiate outward. If we have the faith to trust that Jesus is the one who came from God, in the first coming, then it cannot be long before we also trust what Jesus taught – our heart moves us to trust God's revelation and to appropriate what Jesus taught. The revelation we love in Jesus leads us to the 'content' of His teaching.

Faith becomes difficult to sustain if the disposition of a person remains closed and the heart untouched. Equally faith becomes expansive and points out the truths we should believe when heartfelt.

Pope Benedict at World Youth Day in Madrid in August of this year said: 'faith is not the result of human effort, of human reasoning, but rather a gift of God. Faith starts with God, who opens his heart to us and invites us to share in his own divine life. Faith does not simply provide information about who Christ is; rather, it entails a personal relationship with Christ, a surrender of our whole person, with all our understanding, will and feelings, to God's self-revelation.'

This Advent the second coming of Christ is nearer. We may not know when it will occur but let us use the season to ensure he comes more fully into our lives by allowing our hearts to meet God's heart which was opened for us.

The 39th March for Life will be on January 23, 2012

As stated on the March for Life website: Late in October 1973, grassroots prolife leaders became concerned that January 22, 1974, might come and go without properly memorializing the Supreme Court's infamous abortion decisions and without petitioning Congress for redress.

No established right-to-life organization was prepared to undertake the planning, financial and operational responsibilities for a high impact prolife March on the U.S. Capitol. But, grassroots pro-lifers wanted to march! About thirty prolife veterans resolved themselves into a committee and began making plans for the first March for Life.

On January 22, 1974, the first March for Life was held on the West Steps of the Capitol. An estimated 20,000 committed prolife Americans rallied that day on behalf of our preborn brothers and sisters.

In 1974, the March for Life was incorporated as a non-profit, non-partisan, non-sectarian organization.

Our numbers have gradually risen through the years despite reduced numbers from the snow in 2000 and the terrible 9/11 attacks just months before the March 2002. These growing numbers give testimony to the increasing ranks of prolife Americans and to the importance of the March's work.

Anti-abortion 'personhood' amendment fails in Mississippi

On Nov. 8, voters in Mississippi overwhelmingly rejected the amendment 58 percent to 42 percent. Two-thirds of

Mississippians call themselves "pro-life," according to the Pew Research Center.

So how did this happen? According to Real Clear politics article posted Nov 18th, it is because Planned Parenthood spent big dollars to put doubt in people's minds about what the amendment was. As a result many people had questions about: in-vitro fertilization and (ectopic) pregnancies, where pregnancies (occur) outside the uterus and (in) the fallopian tubes. Also the amendment was not endorsed National Right to Life and the Catholic bishop of Jackson, Mississippi. This led to a lot of confusion, and hence it did not pass.

But this issue is still being fought. Florida is currently trying to get enough signatures by 2012 to get it on the ballet in 2014.

Wreaths Across America

Wreaths Across America Program at Arlington National Cemetery is being conducted on Saturday, December 10th. This is a very worthy project and the scope of the project has grown significantly this year as it is the 20th anniversary of the program.

In a nutshell, volunteers are needed to be at Arlington at 8:30 AM on December 10th for a briefing at the main entrance to the Cemetery in **front of the Women's Memorial**. That said, you should probably plan to be there <u>no later than 8:00 AM</u> to make the 8:30 AM briefing. So that we can work as a group, I would suggest (as pointed out in the notes that follow) that we meet at the 101st Airborne Division (Screaming Eagles) monument on the right as you enter the cemetery and just before getting to the Women's Memorial were we are to receive instructions.

Due to limited available parking, volunteers are **encouraged** to take the **Metro Rail** to the **Arlington Cemetery Station** on the **Blue Line**. You could also park across the bridge near the Lincoln, Vietnam, and Korea Memorials, then walk across the bridge. No formal registration or sign-up is required. You just show up at the designated time and place.

There is no dress code other than comfortable clothes that are appropriate for walking and the temperature that is forecast for that day. Everyone should wear Knights of Columbus or patriotic articles (shirts, hats, etc.).

SUPREME INFORMATION

On Nov. 18, Capt. Alfredo Fuentes, FDNY (Ret.) addressed the state deputies about the Order's new Second Responders Program, which was announced at the Supreme Convention held in Denver last August. As consultant to the supreme knight for disaster

relief, Fuentes is developing the program that will help K of C councils to effectively support their communities when faced with a disaster, whether natural or manmade.

"Disasters can only be responded to with a team effort," Fuentes said. "You are so critical for the success of this program. You will all have a part in its development."

Fuentes explained that there are already plans underway to survey members and create a database of volunteer capabilities, including identification of supplies, facilities, personal skills and experience.

The program will first be launched in the United States, and then expand to other jurisdictions. The Supreme Council will soon accept applications for a disaster response coordinator for each state, and is developing a disaster response training program with the help the University of Connecticut.

In addition to providing a critical service to communities, the Second Responders Program has the potential to attract new members, Fuentes said. "Individuals wanting to leave a mark," he said, "will be drawn to the Order's emphasis on action and charity."

Stella Maris Seafarers' Center Dedicated

On Saturday, October 16th, the Most Reverend Edwin O'Brien, Archbishop of

Baltimore, officially opened the newly renovated Stella Maris Center in the Port of Baltimore in Dundalk with a special Dedication and Ribbon Cutting ceremony. Many Knights and ladies, including State Deputy Peter Davio, State Advocate Steve Cohen, Community Activities Director John Fox, AOS Coordinator Innocent d' Almeida, Baltimore Chapter President Vince Grauso, several Grand Knights, and other Council and State representatives, were on hand to support Msgr. FitzGerald, director of the Center.

The activities began inside St Rita's Church with presentation of Colors by the Fourth Degree Color Guard, followed by a processional of the clergy led by the Color Corps. Andrew Middleton opened with welcoming remarks on behalf of the Center. All then joined in the singing of the Navy Hymn. After scripture reading by Am y Middleton and proclamation of the Gospel by Deacon John Langmead, Archbishop O'Brien delivered a beautiful Homily. Singer Lydia Beasley performed a moving hymn Ave Maris Stella || (Hail, Star of the Sea). Stella Maris Center founder, manager and Chaplain Msgr. John FitzGerald introduced dignitaries in attendance, including State Deputy Peter Davio. The inside portion of the day's events closed with a blessing by Archbishop O'Brien. Everyone, led again by the Color Corps, then processed across the street to the front of the Stella Maris Center.

After some brief remarks by Msgr. FitzGerald and a prayer reading by Baltimore Chapter President Vince Grauso, the Archbishop and Monsignor blessed the Memorial Plaque in the midst of a garden in front of the Center. The final official act of the day was the Ribbon Cutting Ceremony. Archbishop O'Brien, Msgr. FitzGerald, State Deputy Davio, and Catholic Daughters of America National Regent-elect Anne Nelson simultaneously cut a section of a ribbon stretched across the Center's entrance.

The crowd was then able to greet the Archbishop and enter the Center to inspect the results of the tremendous amount of work that

has gone into upgrading the facility and creating the new interior Chapel. The Center then treated everyone to a delicious catered lunch.

Some two thousand ships visit the Port of Baltimore each year. Their crews of mostly young men are often away from their homes without outside contact for months at a time. Sixty-five percent of these men are Catholic. The AOS provides these seafarers a break from shipboard life and a place to receive the sacraments and contact their families via email. Donations from Knights of Columbus and others provide them with gifts of clothing, religious items and reading material. Msgr. FitzGerald is very appreciative of the tremendous support he has received from the Knights since the inception of this ministry.


