

The Council celebrated a wonderful Installation of Officers on Sunday July 21, and our new Grand Knight Fred Taylor indicated his intention to focus on our Catholic faith, on the motivating force of all that we, as Knights, should be doing to spread the Kingdom of God in this world. This is building on PGK Steve Sutkowski's efforts to implement the Order's new initiative to put our "Faith in Action", to return to our roots of witnessing to our love of God and of one another through His Church, through inviting others to see the world through the lens of the Roman Catholic Church. St. John Paul II referred to the Church as "the premier student of humanity", a five-thousand year compendium of learning about and accompanying humanity, in both our temporal and spiritual natures, ministering to humanity in body and soul.

I was reminded of an incident in Boston some years ago when Cardinal Sean O'Malley was confronted by demonstrators outside Holy Cross Cathedral by those demonstrating for same-sex marriages. "You don't love us!" was their cry to the Cardinal. His response, paraphrased, was "No, I do love you. That's why I have to oppose this measure." People who lack an understanding of the reality and eternity of our lives settle too often for what they want in this world, oblivious to how the choices we make here affect the nature of our eternal lives. We have to do what we can to love those who disagree with us into at least hearing our argument. Whether they accept it or not is

on them, but they will at least have to acknowledge that hatred is not our motivation.

With the strains of "Onward, Christian Soldiers" in the background, we need to take up our special weapon, the Rosary of our Blessed Mother, and pray for the grace to love all of God's children, even when they don't want to be loved, and to be willing to suffer the slander of being "people who hate", knowing that Jesus, as the Head of His Body, suffered in order to show God's love for all of us, and so we, as His Body, should gladly suffer with Him, doing all for the glory of God. May God continue to bless us all.

LOVING THE CHURCH

(by Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori)

As we profess our faith in, and love for, the church, we share a responsibility for deep and authentic reform.

IN THE NICENE CREED, we profess: "I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church." A friend of mine recently said, "I used to say those words without giving them much thought. Now, I say to myself, 'I believe in the Lord. But do I believe in the Church?"

My friend speaks for quite a few people. Recent studies show that 37% of Catholics in the United States are seriously thinking about leaving the Church as the result of the sexual abuse crisis. This percentage is not confined to the 75% of Catholics who do not regularly attend Sunday Mass; it includes church-going Catholics. Many pastors confirm that Mass attendance has declined since the summer of 2018, along with financial support.

At a time when parishioners are rightfully angry, what does it mean to believe in the Church and to love it? Can we love the Church and at the same time insist on genuine reform? Thankfully, the answer is "yes" — but a "yes" that requires us to do some thinking and praying, because there are false ways of loving and reforming the Church.

One false way of loving the Church is to say, "I love the Church all right, but not that old corrupt institutional Church." From its earliest days, there have been people who professed love only for some invisible, spiritual Church, not the actual flesh and blood Church that came from the side of the crucified Savior. This perspective is understandable enough, yet it remains a cop out.

The Church is made up of "a divine and a human element" that coalesce to "form one complex reality" (Vatican II, Lumen Gentium, no. 8). It is the "human element" of the Church, made up of sinful human beings, which continually needs to be reformed and purified — but not discarded or made

into something other than what the Lord intended. Not surprisingly, some proposed reforms have nothing to do with the sexual abuse crisis but rather attempt to impose on the Church various ideological agendas, in none of which salvation can be found.

Please don't think this is an attempt to sanitize the depth and enormity of the sexual abuse crisis, for we need deep purification and far-reaching reform.

Good policies and procedures are a start. For example, the so-called "Dallas Charter" enacted by the U.S. bishops in 2002 has been effective. Since then, very few new cases of clergy sexual abuse have been reported. In dioceses, parishes, Catholic schools and other ministries, many safeguards are now in place to prevent abuse and/or to ensure that it is reported to civil authorities the minute it is discovered. Thanks to the Holy Father's new directive, the U.S. bishops are also putting in place new procedures by which we will be held accountable for abuse, harassment or failure to handle allegations of sexual misconduct in accord with the highest standards. Procedural reform is indeed one of the ways to love the Church and to reform and purify its visible structures.

But there is a much deeper reform that is more necessary than ever. A profound conversion on the part of the Church's shepherds is essential, but for this reform to take hold it must include all of God's people. Purifying the Church is something we do together. We have to reject moral relativism and the compromises with evil that follow in its wake. We have to turn to the Lord in prayer as never before, both as individuals and as parish communities. And with the help of the Holy Spirit by whom Jesus lives and acts in us, we should strive to change not only programs and certain structures but indeed the culture of our dioceses, parishes, homes and ministries such that they are places of encounter with the risen Lord and one another, places filled with hope and missionary zeal.

As Knights of Columbus, we speak of ourselves as "the strong right arm of the Church." Let us resolve, then, to believe in the Church and to love the Church so much that we contribute to its ongoing purification and reform.

REFLECTIONS

The Continuing Struggle for Souls (by Lawrence P. Grayson)

In January 1947, then-Monsignor Fulton J. Sheen, a professor of philosophy at The Catholic University of America, delivered a radio address titled, "Signs of Our Times," in which he issued a warning about the battle for souls and provided advice on how to respond. His commentary, a brief excerpt of which follows, is even more relevant to the highly secularized culture of today than it was to the society of seven decades ago.

"Why is it that so few realize the seriousness of our present crisis? Partly because men do not want to believe their own times are wicked, partly because it involves too much self-accusation and principally because they have no standards outside of themselves by which to measure their times. If there is no fixed concept of justice, how shall men know it is violated? Only those who live by faith really know what is happening in the world. The great masses without faith are unconscious of the

destructive processes going on...

The battle lines are already being clearly drawn and the basic issues are no longer in doubt. From now on men will divide themselves into two religions -- understood again as surrender to an absolute. The conflict of the future is between the absolute who is the God-man and the absolute which is the man-God; the God Who became man and the man who makes himself God; brothers in Christ and comrades in anti-Christ.

The anti-Christ will not be so called, otherwise he would have no followers. He will wear no red tights, nor vomit sulphur, nor carry a trident, nor wave an arrow tail as the Mephistophiles in Faust. This masquerade has helped the devil convince men that he does not exist, for he knows that he is never so strong as when men believe that he does not exist. When no man recognizes, the more power he exercises. God has defined Himself as "I am Who am" and the Devil as "I am who am not"...

His logic is simple: if there is no heaven there is no hell; if there is no hell, then there is no sin; if there is no sin, then there is no judge, and if there is no judgement then evil is good and good is evil...

How will he come in this new age to win followers to his religion? He will come disguised as the Great Humanitarian; he will talk peace, prosperity and plenty not as means to lead us to God, but as ends in themselves...[H]e will explain Guilt away psychologically as inhibited eroticism, make men shrink in shame if their fellowmen say they are not broadminded and liberal; he will be so broadminded as to identify tolerance with indifference to right and wrong, truth and error; he will spread the lie that men will never be better until they make society better and thus have selfishness to provide fuel for the next revolution; he will foster science but only to have armament makers use one marvel of science to destroy another; he will foster more divorces under the disguise that another partner is "vital"; he will increase love for love and decrease love for person; he will invoke religion to destroy religion; he will ... tell people who they should and should not marry and unmarry ...he will tempt Christians ... to sell freedom for security ... to desert the lofty pinnacles of truth where faith and reason reign, for those lower depths where the masses live on slogans and propaganda...Opinions not truths, commentators not teachers, Gallup polls not principles, nature not grace -- and...to have a new religion without a Cross, a liturgy without a world to come, a city of man without a city of God, a religion to invoke a religion, or a politics which is a religion-one that renders unto Caesar even the things that are God's...

Because the signs of our times point to a struggle between absolutes, we may expect the future to be a time of trials for two reasons: Firstly, to stop disintegration. Godlessness would go on and on if there were no catastrophes. ... Moral truth is vindicated by the ruin that follows when it has been repudiated. The chaos of our times is the strongest negative argument that could ever be advanced for Christianity.

The second reason why a crisis must come is in order to prevent a false identification of the Church and the world. Our Lord intended that those who are His followers should be different in spirit from those who were not. ... Mediocrity and compromise characterize the lives of many Christians. Many read the same novels as modern pagans, educate their children in the same godless way, listen to the same commentators who have no other standard than judging today by yesterday, and tomorrow by today, allow pagan practices such as divorce and

remarriage to creep into the family...There is no longer the conflict and opposition which is supposed to characterize us. We are influencing the world less than the world influences us...

The Church has survived other great crises in her nineteen centuries of existence and she will live to sing a requiem over the evils of the present. The Church may have its Good Fridays but these are only preludes to its Easter Sundays, for the Divine Promise shall never be made void: "... and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." ...

As Christians, we must realize that a moment of crisis is not a time of despair, but of opportunity. The more we can anticipate the doom, the more we can avoid it. Once we recognize we are under Divine Wrath, we become eligible for Divine Mercy...

Catholics ought to stir up their faith, hang a crucifix in their homes to remind them that we too have to carry a cross, gather the family together every night to recite the rosary that through corporate prayer there might be intercession for the world; go to daily Mass that the spirit of love and sacrifice might be sprinkled in our business, our social life and our duties. More heroic souls might undertake the Holy Hour daily, particularly in parishes conscious of the needs of prayers of reparation as well as petition, conducting such devotions in their churches...

[I]n the coming age there will be only one way to stop your trembling knees, and that will be to get down on them and pray. The most important problem in the world today is your soul, for that is what the struggle is about."

What would our world be like if every Catholic followed his pastoral advice? It is not too late to do so. And do so we should, for as Msgr. Sheen said, "The time is nearer than you think."

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
