CHAPLAIN'S MESSAGE



We begin a new liturgical year on December 1, beginning the Season of Preparation, the Season of Advent. Although this season used to have a penitential flavor to it, much like Lent, its nature has changed somewhat, to a state of joyous anticipation. We have an advantage that our Old Testament forebears didn't – they awaited any sign of the fulfillment of God's promises to humanity, while we have seen the first phase of that fulfillment, Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection, and we now await the coming of the fullness of that redemption, the transformation of all of creation into an Eden greater than the one God had given our first parents.

Maybe we have grown a little tired of waiting, maybe we have lost the joy of anticipation. But this is the reason for this season – to revive that expectation, to revel in the power of what has been promised, what is being fulfilled. St. Peter reminds us that Jesus is not delaying in returning for us: He is giving us time to clean up our act. But He will only wait so long.

I was thinking about how God is superabundant in His graces, how He gives us more than we could ever hope for. The abundance is visible in the universe, in the trillions of stars and planets and the dark matter that holds it all together, and, as yet, we are the only populated one of those planets. We think of how Jesus not only provided food for the hungry crowds, but He provided leftovers (the source of the custom of the abundant feasts of Thanksgivings). Our expectations are too small; maybe

we are afraid to bother God, or else can't imagine that He hasn't better things to do than to bother with our petty problems.

Unfortunately, because we have such small expectations, or are so focused on what we think we need, we leave a lot of what God wants to give us on the table, not only limiting our blessings but also limiting the opportunity to grow in our knowledge of His love for us.

As we continue our journey through Advent, as we approach the superabundant Gift of His Son's Nativity, let us keep our hearts and our eyes open. God doesn't just want a happy season that will expire, and we enter the new year like we left the last. He wants us to experience a taste of the Joy that can last us until we stand before Him in Heaven. May God grant us the grace to seek this grace, may He bless us and our families and friends with the riches of this Holy Day Season, and may He continue to bestow these blessings on us as He guides us to our true home with Him.

Council Hosts Silver Rose Ceremony

On Sunday, November 17, our Council Chaplain, Fr. Jim Boccabella, led the Council's Our Lady of Guadalupe Silver Rose Program to celebrate and honor the sanctity of life. About 20 Council members and their families attended. The challenge and intent of the Silver Rose Program is to teach the world that the life of each human being, unique and unrepeatable, begins at the moment of conception and ends by natural death and that the sanctity of life will reign in human hearts and enjoy the full protection of the law.



To accomplish this, we turn to the Blessed Virgin Mary, through whom the Word was made flesh. Through Mary, under her title of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas, we seek the grace and strength to bear witness to the reality that every human life is sacred, a gift from God.

Little Sisters Continuing Court Battle

On October 22, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit blocked recent government rules exempting religious organizations from Obamacare requirements that force employers to provide birth control, including abortifacients, as part of healthcare insurance. The ruling was in response to a lawsuit brought by 14 states attorneys general. As a result, religious groups, including the Little Sisters of the Poor, will not be exempt from the mandate in Maryland, as well as in California, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Minnesota, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, and the District of Columbia. This ruling was made in spite of the fact that the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in favor of religious exemptions for the Little Sisters in 2016. An appeal no doubt will be made to the Supreme Court.

Pro-Life Issues at the Next Maryland General Assembly Session

The 441st Maryland General Assembly will convene on January 8 and run through April 6, 2020. A number of pro-life issues that were considered but defeated last year are expected be reintroduced. Among these are the legalization of physician-assisted suicide, a proposed constitutional amendment on abortion, and the criminalization of human trafficking.

Proponents of legalizing physician-assisted suicide have begun to organize again ahead of the 2020 session, and it is expected that, for the fifth time in six years, these groups will try again to push their agenda through Maryland.

The late House Speaker Michael Busch worked to pass a legislatively-referred amendment to Maryland's constitution that would have established abortion as a so-called "right" in the state. If passed by the Assembly, the bill would put on the next election ballot a question asking voters to ratify or reject the change. It is expected that this effort also will be reintroduced in the coming session.

The Maryland Catholic Conference worked with allies during the 2019 session to defeat these efforts and will do so again in the coming session. REFLECTIONS

Christmas, A Celebration of Family

Christmas is a nostalgic time that evokes feelings of joy, serenity, love, and a desire for family gatherings. Songs like "I'll be Home for Christmas" and "It's a Wonderful Time of the Year" arouse memories of holidays past celebrated in the warmth and love of family life. Now more than half a century since their release, these emotive songs are still seasonal standards.

The true beauty of Christmas, however, is more than sentimental reminiscences. Its essence is religious, centered on the celebration and meaning of God becoming man. Churches will be beautifully decorated, prominently displaying a crèche with statues representing the infant Jesus and those who were with him at his birth in Bethlehem. People will attend Mass and join in hymns praising God. In spite of the secular influences that shape our daily lives, Christmas helps us experience the wonder and comfort of God's presence.

We are very familiar with the story of Our Lord's birth, especially as related in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke: the angel's announcement to Mary, her fiat, the angel's visit to Joseph, the census, the couple's trip to Bethlehem, the rejection at the inn, finding room in the stable, the angelic hosts, the guiding star, the shepherds and wise men, and most of all the babe lying in the manger wrapped in swaddling clothes. Yet, the images, as beautiful as they are, are almost too well-known so that we do not fully appreciate the thoughts and meanings they present.

That Holy Night was the beginning of the redemption of man. Without his birth, there would be no Resurrection and the gates of heaven would still be closed to us. On that first Christmas, the "Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us." God had come to earth in the person of Jesus Christ. He assumed a human nature, with all of the joys and agonies, trials and tribulations, thoughts and emotions, sufferings and death that are innate to man.

People saw Jesus, heard him, spoke with him, ate with him, and touched him. He had parents and relatives, mingled with neighbors, practiced a religion, learned a trade, worked, and finally assumed his public mission to teach, gather followers, suffer and die on a Cross. These are human experiences to which we can relate. Because of this birth, God was no longer an unseen, unknown divinity that was beyond our comprehension. Now he was a personal God.

The narrative about Christmas is not only about Our Lord, as central as he is, but about family. Mary accepted motherhood with her fiat to the angel's announcement. Joseph took her as his wife. They traveled to Bethlehem as a couple, as a family. He negotiated a place to stay and was present as Mary gave birth. Joseph likely arranged the straw in the manger, and Mary wrapped the child in swaddling clothes. She fed, dressed and nurtured him. On the eighth day, they had him circumcised and, on the fortieth, presented him in the temple in obedience to Jewish law.

Mary may have held her Son when she and Joseph welcomed the Magi. Soon after that visit, the family fled to Egypt to protect the child from Herod's persecution. Upon the tyrant's death, they returned to Nazareth, where in the love of his earthly family, "the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him." (Lk 2:40)

In those years, Mary reared Jesus, while Joseph taught the boy a trade and worked to support them. They experienced the same delights and griefs of typical families. After one of their annual trips to Jerusalem to celebrate the feast of Passover, the boy was missing. Mary and Joseph searched for three days before locating him in the temple. Mary said, "Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety." Would not any loving parent have had the same worries, and had the same relief upon finding him? Jesus then returned with them "to Nazareth and was obedient to them, and his mother kept all of these things in her heart." (Lk 2:48-51)

From a theological perspective, Christmas brings forth an even deeper tenet of family, for God himself has a familial nature. As Pope John Paul II expressed it: "God in his deepest mystery is not a solitude, but a family, since he has in himself fatherhood, sonship, and the essence of family, which is love."

Thus, the human family, being centered in love, is a reflection of the nature of God. It is love for one another than binds a family together. It is God's love for us that allows us repeatedly to receive his forgiveness for our sins and his grace for our salvation. It is through love that parents sacrifice their pleasure and wellbeing for their children. It is for love that Jesus died on the Cross for our sins.

Pope Benedict XVI, in his Angelus Address on December 27, 2009, expressed this relationship between God and family as:

"God had chosen to reveal himself by being born into a human family and the human family thus became an icon of God! God is the Trinity, he is a communion of love; so is the family despite all of the differences that exist between the Mystery of God and his human creature, an expression that reflects the unfathomable Mystery of God as Love...The human family, in a certain sense, is an icon of the Trinity because of its interpersonal love and the fruitfulness of this love."

Do not limit your reflection on this consequential birth which linked heaven and earth to December 25. Live everyday as a preparation for Christ's coming. Spend time each week in Eucharistic Adoration, go to Confession, attend Mass more frequently, meditate on the liturgical readings, and make the Rosary a frequent family prayer. If you cannot pray with your family, pray for them. As Fr. Patrick Payton stressed, "The family that prays together stays together."

Each time you say the Hail Mary, think of the

Archangel Gabriel's salutation to Mary, "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with thee," and the invitation to her to become the mother of God. Meditate upon this event and on the birth that followed. Be thankful for the great gift we received through the birth of Jesus.

May you and your family have a very Blessed and Merry Christmas!

Maryland's KofC Ultrasound Program

Save lives and help women choose life by giving them the opportunity to view their unborn children on ultrasound machines at pro-life pregnancy centers. This initiative is funded by Knights of Columbus state and local councils with matching grants from the Supreme Council's Culture of Life Fund.

The Knights of Columbus works together as an organization to purchase ultrasound machines for qualifying pregnancy centers. After the state and/or local council raises 50% of the cost, the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council will provide the other 50% to complete funding for purchase of an ultrasound. Or, if the council raises 100% of the cost of a vehicle outfitted to serve as a mobile medical unit for a pregnancy center, the Supreme Council will provide 100% of the funds for an ultrasound machine to be used in that vehicle.

In Maryland, the KofC has donated 23 ultrasound machines to Pregnancy Care Centers throughout the state. Several councils are working with other PCCs to raise funds and prepare applications to receive ultrasound units. The State Ultrasound Program, however, needs additional funds to meet all requests. 
