

We say goodbye to chocolate or our favorite adult beverage or whatever guilty pleasure in which we indulge; we forego meat on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays during Lent and, if we're healthy enough, wave bye-bye to three full meals on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday; we sacrifice part of our Friday afternoons or evenings for the Stations of the Cross. 

Life is under serious attack in Maryland. There are two issues currently before the Maryland General Assembly that not only violate Catholic teachings but threaten the lives of our youngest and oldest people.

PHYSICIAN ASSISTED SUICIDE

The Richard E Israel and Roger "Pip" Moyer End-of – Life Option Act is currently being considered by the House of Delegates (HB399) and by the State Senate (SB311). Similar bills have been defeated three times in the past, but the pro-death lobby has successfully had it introduced for a fourth time. Two hearings have been scheduled for the bill: on Friday, February 15, the House Judicial Committee will hear the bill, and on Tuesday, February 19, the Senate Judiciary Proceedings committee will hear the bill.

Compassion & Choices, once known as the Hemlock Society, is a national pro-euthanasia organization. On January 29, it organized over 150 supporters, volunteers and staff, who canvassed the halls of the Assembly, lobbying to gain support for the bill.

The Maryland Catholic Conference, which is the legislative arm of the bishops in Maryland, is working with the Maryland Against Physician Assisted Suicide Coalition to defeat the end of life bill.

ABORTION

Maryland House Speaker Michael Busch, on February 8, introduced legislation (HB1031) that would make abortion a constitutional "right" in Maryland. Thus, even if Roe v. Wade is ever overturned, abortion would continue to be legal in Maryland and no state law could curtail it. If the proposed amendment is approved by the Assembly, it would be a ballot issue for Maryland voters in 2020. The Maryland Catholic Conference opposes the bill

It begins at St. Mary's parish at 109 Duke of Gloucester St. A Youth Rally will be held at 4:30PM, followed by a simultaneous Catholic Mass and a Protestant Prayer Service at 5:15PM. The March to Lawyer's Mall will start at 6:30PM, with the Rally at 7:00PM. A complimentary Chick-fil-A dinner will then be available at St. Mary's parish school. The speakers at the Rally include: Ryan Bomberger (Radiance Foundation) and Kelly Stauffer (Silent No More Awareness Campaign). Jonny Brenns, an American Idol Finalist, will provide musical entertainment. For more information, go to https://www.mdmarchforlife.com

Fast and pray at least one day a week for the remainder of the General Assembly's session (it ends April 8) that these bills are defeated. It would be a fine Lenten intention.

REFLECTIONS

If Catholics were Catholics (by Lawrence P. Grayson)

"All the evils of the world are due to lukewarm Catholics," said Pope St. Pius V. While the events of the past several weeks demonstrate the truth of this statement, it may be more accurate to say they are due to apostatizing Catholics, that is, to those who abandon, reject or stray from the tenets of their faith.

With actions in several states to legalize late-term abortion, the Born Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act was recently introduced in the U.S. Congress. The bill would not restrict a woman's ability to have an abortion nor affect any health care she may require. Rather, it states that if a child is born alive following an abortion – and is now an independent human being outside of its mother's womb -- that it be given the same degree of medical care to preserve its life and health as would be given to any other newborn.

The bill faced severe opposition. First, Patty Murray, a Catholic, blocked a vote in the Senate. Then, under the leadership of Speaker Nancy Pelosi, a Catholic, a vote on the measure was blocked seven times in the House of Representatives. When a vote finally was taken in the Senate on February 25 to break a filibuster, it was defeated with 10 Catholics voting against the bill.

One of those Catholics was Sen. Tim Kaine of Virginia, who was quickly criticized by Bishop Barry C. Knestout of the Diocese of Richmond and Arlington Bishop Michael F. Burbidge. They said that the outcome was "appalling and beyond comprehension," and that they were "outraged" that the state's two senators "voted against this critical lifesaving legislation."

These are not the only high-profile political office holders who profess to be Catholic, while opposing the Church's teachings. They are only the latest ones who have taken prominent action.

New York Governor Andrew Cuomo, a professed Catholic, recently signed The Reproductive Health Act into law, which allows abortions to be performed throughout a woman's entire pregnancy, permits non-physicians to perform them, and removes all criminal penalties for the procedure. In a display of arrogance, Cuomo signed the act on January 22, the anniversary of the enactment of Roe v. Wade, and celebrated by having the World Trade Center bathed in pink lights. Rhode Island Governor Gina Raimondo, who identifies as Catholic, is supporting an abortion bill similar to that of New York, which recently was introduced into the state's House of Delegates.

In Maryland, where abortion is already legal throughout a woman's pregnancy, the speaker of the state's House of Delegates, Michael Busch, introduced a bill to enshrine abortion as a woman's right in the state constitution, which would preclude any laws to restrict abortion from being passed in the future. Busch is a cradle Catholic who left the faith a few years ago. With strong public opposition, Busch withdrew the bill on February 23, but said he would reintroduce it next year when the reaction to the New York law diminishes.

In Virginia, Delegate Kathy Tran, a proclaimed Catholic, introduced a bill to allow abortion, even, she said, when a woman is in labor and about to give birth. The state governor, a non-Catholic and pediatric neurologist, commenting on the bill, said that if a "severely deformed or otherwise nonviable" child was delivered "a discussion would ensue between the physicians and the mother" to consider possible termination options. Hence, even infanticide would be allowed as a medical option under a bill proposed by a Catholic.

But this is no less draconian than a child who survives a failed abortion, is not given medical care and allowed to die. Abortion is a violent and brutal act, conducted by people who are willing to kill children, not only in the womb, but increasingly after being delivered alive.

Pope Francis recently said, "Last century, the whole world was scandalized by what the Nazis did to purify the race. Today, we do the same thing but with white gloves." How has humanity become so degraded that children in the womb are routinely killed and treated as disposable? How can physicians who have taken the Hippocratic Oath to do no harm ignore the cries of a newborn infant who needs their attention? How have mothers gotten to the point where the quality of their lives is more important than life itself for their children?

Nancy Pelosi typifies the attitude of too many Catholic politicians. In an interview a few years ago, she stated: "I grant the Church where they are on abortion. That's where they are, that's where they have to be. But my faith isn't about what their position is."

Sen. Tim Kaine expressed a similar view, stating: "I've taken a position which is quite common among Catholics. I've got a personal feeling about abortion, but the right role for government is to let women make their own decisions." This attitude of misguided toleration that too many Catholic politicians express is embraced because it imposes no obligation on them to publicly live the faith, and does not interfere with their drive for political success.

Supreme Knight Carl Anderson recently wrote, "I do not see how it is possible to build a culture of life in America as long as our elected officials harden their hearts to the cries of unborn children." The way forward is clear.

Pope Francis in his exhortation, Gaudete et Exsultate, stated, "Our defense of the innocent unborn needs to be clear, firm and passionate, for at stake is the dignity of a human life, which is always sacred."

Responding to that call, Carl Anderson declared: "You will not see a reed bending here...On this issue [of life] we will not yield. We will never give in. The Knights of Columbus will never abandon the field." Neither should any faithful Catholic.

IT'S MORE THAN A TOOTSIE ROLL (by Andrew Fowler)



When you see Knights in yellow vests that read "Helping People with Intellectual Disabilities," you should smile. When these Knights are holding their bright cans and collecting donations around town, they are helping to recognize the dignity of every person.

For every donation, each donor is offered a piece of candy by the Knight present, most commonly a Tootsie Roll. Because of these little gifts of appreciation, the "Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities" is frequently referred to as the "Tootsie Roll Drive." It is a popular and successful fundraiser conducted by Knights of Columbus councils.

Supreme Council's headquarters in New Haven, Conn. is often referred to as the "Tootsie Roll building" by locals because of its round columns and brown color, but the Knights actually have no official ties to Tootsie Roll Industries. And of course, the campaign, which stretches back decades, is about more than just candy — it is about serving those with intellectual and physical disabilities.

Councils' participation in this campaign as well as many other fund-raising endeavors last year contributed \$185 million and volunteered over 75 million hours last year helping various causes.

Through their "Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities" drives, Knights from Maine raised over \$95,000, Fr. Maurice R. Daly Council 6076 from Spartanburg, S.C. donated \$12,000 raised and Wally Kullman Council 14479 from Conifer, Colo. brought \$10,000. These are just a few of the many councils that hold drives.

The Knights of Columbus not only conducts the "Tootsie Roll Drives" in their efforts to help people with intellectual and physical disabilities, but has also partnered with the Special Olympics since its founding along with other programs.

This month, Mary Help of Christians Council 11804 donated over \$5,000 to the Hope Services Day Programs in Watsonville, Ca., completing a six-week effort at five local churches. Hope Services' manager, Mauna Loa Morris, said the funds the Knights provided "means that we can do more activities in the community," in an article published by the Register Pajaronian.

Earlier this year, Knights from St. George Council 3934 raised more than \$6,000 for the Fulton County Rehabilitation Center in Canton, IL. Meanwhile, Fr. Harold M. Wren Council 3963 from Billerica, Mass. presented a \$17,000 check to the Massachusetts Knights of Columbus Tootsie Roll Charities Fund, becoming the top fundraiser in the state for the ninth consecutive year.

St. Frances Cabrini Council 9679 helped the Yupcaipa-Calimesa Joint Unified School District, raising \$3,200 for children with special needs. As one school teacher told the News Mirror, "This will help them learn those skills to help them become independent at one point."

After receiving a donation from Holyoke Council 3519, directors at the Dragon's Wagon Preschool in Holyoke, Colo. told the Holyoke Enterprise, "The Knights of Columbus are so generous every year...This donation will benefit all of the preschool, including special needs students."

Some councils conduct the drives annually, including Annunciata Council 8759 from Devil Hills, N.C. On January 21, the Knights distributed checks worth \$24,100 in total to special education teachers in the area and the Special Olympics to be used for classrooms and events, respectively. In the past 30 years, the council has raised over \$400,000 through their "Tootsie Roll Drives."

"We are answering needs for those who are often treated harshly by society and often ignored or worse," said Dennis Zegan, grand knight of Council 8759. "In many schools, Special Needs Programs are often low on school districts' budgets and local Special Olympics are always looking for funds to meet the financial needs to participate in their many programs."

So, the next time you see a Knight in a yellow vest asking for donations outside a grocery store, and you receive a Tootsie Roll, remember it's more than a "Tootsie Roll Drive." It's a chance to provide people with intellectual and physical disabilities more resources to live a happy life.
