



The Gabriel Project




The Gabriel Project assists needy women in crisis pregnancies in Montgomery County. Women volunteers (especially bilingual, Spanish-speaking women) are needed to stay in touch with client mothers. This work includes keeping in touch with them via phone or e-mail during their pregnancy, bringing them needed items such as diapers, baby clothes, etc., that are provided by the Gabriel Project, and praying for them. The average time commitment would be approximately one– four hours per month (or less). Men are needed to pick up donations once or twice per month. Daily prayer supporters are also needed. A TRUE KNIGHT FOR TODAY (by Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson)



THE HEROIC WITNESS OF KENDRICK CASTILLO DEMONSTRATES THE FULLNESS OF A LIFE LIVED FOR OTHERS.

THERE ARE THOSE who say we don't have heroes anymore. Kendrick Castillo proves them wrong.

One day last May, Kendrick woke up as if it were any other day. An 18-year old young man, he went through his normal morning routine, packing his backpack and heading to school in a suburb of Denver. It was an exciting time for him. As a high school senior, he looked forward to his graduation only days away and the promising life that lay before him.

But on that Tuesday afternoon, everything changed. After lunch, as Kendrick sat at his desk, a troubled student entered his classroom and pulled out a gun. In that instant, Kendrick made his decision. He charged the assailant.

Kendrick gave his fellow classmates the precious seconds they needed to hide or escape, before he was shot. But while he courageously saved lives, he selflessly gave up his own. In Kendrick Castillo, a life was tragically lost but a true hero was born.

As a nation, we mourn Kendrick's death, even as we celebrate his courage. As an organization, the Knights of Columbus is especially moved by his example of selfless sacrifice. His father, a member of the Knights, has said that his son "wanted to be a Knight of Columbus because he wanted to help not only people, but his community."

Kendrick Castillo did exactly that. A faithful Catholic to the end, he lived and died according to the teaching of Jesus Christ: "Greater love has no man than this, that he lay down his life for his friends" (Jn 15:13).

In a better world, Kendrick Castillo would still be with us. That Tuesday would have gone like any other ' no shooting, no grief, no resulting search for answers. Sadly, that is not the world we live in. Ours is marred with sin and strife and suffering. But that doesn't mean we have no hope. Heroes give us hope. There have always been and there will always be those who inspire us with their selfless actions. Some, like Kendrick Castillo, have given up their lives for the sake of others. Others are still among us, living their lives for others, in ways big and small.

To find them, we must know where to look. Some think of heroes as having supernatural powers, only to be found in comic books or movies, and in the mythic tales of ancient Greece and Rome. Others associate heroes with celebrities ' great athletes, talented artists, the beautiful, the wealthy, the powerful, and so on. Yet true heroism has a different face.

Heroism lives in ordinary people who do extraordinary things. They practice the timeless principles of courage, truthfulness, humility and self-sacrifice. Like Kendrick Castillo, they put the interests of others ahead of themselves, even if it costs them everything.

If we look around, we'll see that plenty of people still embody these characteristics in their daily lives. They are often unknown or unacknowledged because they don't seek publicity. They also come from unexpected places and their heroism emerges at unforeseen times.

One of the most inspiring aspects of serving as supreme knight has been meeting so many brother Knights who are true everyday heroes — heroes who sacrifice to advance our principles of charity, unity and fraternity.

A famous 14th-century treatise on knighthood advises Christian knights to be men of integrity and devotion, for as the writer observes, "they are in danger every day, and at the moment when they think themselves to be the most secure, it is then that they may suddenly have to undertake demanding and dangerous adventures."

The integrity of the knight included the commitment to defend those in danger who could not defend themselves and the courage not to recoil in the face of danger.

We are told that Kendrick Castillo wanted to join the Knights of Columbus and so to be more like us. My sincere hope is that because of his example, our brother Knights will want to be more like him.

REFLECTIONS

A Papal View of Socialism (by Lawrence P. Grayson)

Almost a century ago, many influential Americans became enamored with the socialistic programs being developed in Europe and wanted to apply them in this country. In the 1920s, Benito Mussolini was favorably depicted on the cover of Time magazine and the efficiency he achieved through government control of Italy's economy was extolled on the pages of Forbes. About the same time, delegations of union leaders, academics and journalists traveled to Russia to tour collective farms, government-run factories and massive infrastructure projects being promoted by Joseph Stalin. A decade later, the totalitarian ambitions of these socialistic leaders would become evident in Fascism and Communism. Today, Americans are once again expressing favor toward socialism. A May 2019 Gallup poll found that 43% of the people think socialism would be good for the country, although 51% think it would be bad. This is significantly more positive than a 1942 Roper poll in which 25% of Americans thought socialism would be "good" for the country and 40% thought it would be "bad"; the remainder at the time had no opinion.

In contrast to this favorable shift, every pope, from Pius IX in 1849 through Benedict XVI has opposed socialism. Pope Pius XI, in his encyclical Quadragesimo Anno, went so far as to say that socialism is "irreconcilable with true Christianity," and thus "no one can be at the same time a good Catholic and a true socialist."

What is it that merits such consistent and emphatic papal rebuke?

Socialism refers to state ownership of the means of production, distribution, and exchange of wealth exercised through the government and its officials. It aims for economic justice and the general welfare of all by having people contribute according to their ability and to receive benefits according to their needs. This worthy though idealistic goal has been tried many times and failed repeatedly.

Under socialism, government officials develop rules and regulation that dictate how others can or cannot operate, and thus impose their judgement for that of the individual. As a result, it discourages personal initiative while introducing state control.

From the perspective of Catholic doctrine, socialism has several significant flaws. Two of the most fundamental are its view of the person and its treatment of private property.

Socialism treats people as groups, not individuals. Pope John Paul II, in Centesimus Annus, described this error as "anthropological in nature. Socialism considers the individual person simply as an element, a molecule within the social organism, so that the good of the individual is completely subordinated to the functioning of the socio-economic mechanism."

The collective nature of socialism violates an individual's freedom to decide matters that lie within that person's competence and reason. It usurps a person's natural, God-given rights, which are inalienable, and replaces them with class privileges, whether based on economics, race, color, gender or, more recently, sexual identity. In radical attempts to promote equality among classes, it fosters an unequal treatment of groups, bestowing benefits on some but not others.

Socialism also denies a man's natural law right to private property and calls for redistributing wealth by taking from the rich to give to the poor. It matters little whether the state directly confiscates a person's property or imposes overly high taxation; either way, an injustice is committed by denying a person his or her due. One congressional representative recently suggested a marginal income tax rate of 70 percent on the top earners, while another said rates could be "as high as 90 percent." As Pope Leo XIII wrote in Rerum Novarum: "The State would therefore be unjust and cruel if under the name of taxation it were to deprive the private owner of more than is fair."

As a philosophical construct, socialism substitutes government-provided security for personal freedom, state paternalism for self-initiative, government mandates for individual responsibility, and communal directives for personal conscience. In the extreme, socialism tends toward totalitarianism, for when people pursue their own interests in opposition to the state's aims, the power of the government is often used to equalize the inequalities. As Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen wrote, "If the sheep will not of themselves run together in the unity of the sheepfold, then dogs must be sent barking at their heels."

Some may argue that today's trend toward socialism in America is not totalitarian but democratic. Socialism in any form, however, whether presented as "democratic socialism," or "moderate socialism," or even "Christian socialism," conflicts with Catholic teaching. Pope John XXIII stated in Mater et Magistra that "no Catholic could subscribe even to moderate Socialism."

While Americans have become more favorable toward socialism, they do not appear to know what it is. A September 2018 Gallup poll found that only 17% of Americans understand it as government ownership of the nation's means of production – its traditional meaning and the one that excited the thought leaders of the 1920s. In contrast, 23% view it as equality in rights and benefits, while another 10% as free social services such as medical care for all. The remaining half of the populace either have no opinion (23%), or a smattering of ideas such as getting along with people, social media, political liberalism, restrictions on freedom, or a modified form of communism.

If Americans have such a wide diversity of ideas of what socialism means, how can so many intelligently say socialism would be good for the country? Without clarity of vision, how can the nation progress?

Catholic social doctrine, with its emphasis on human freedom, charity and love of neighbor, provides a way forward between socialism in its many guises and unfettered capitalism. The Church emphasizes the dual aspects of the right to own and the duty to share. The human person should use his God-given talents to the fullest and assist others with the fruits of his accomplishments.

Pope Francis speaks often about the Church's social responsibilities. Although he has not rejected socialism, neither has he adopted it. Rather, in a recent letter addressed to young economists and entrepreneurs around the world, he proposed a new and different type of economic system: "one that brings life not death, one that is inclusive and not exclusive, humane and not dehumanizing, one that cares for the environment and does not despoil it."

Pope Benedict XVI, in Deus Caritas Est, presents an approach to these lofty goals. "We do not need a State", he wrote, "which regulates and controls everything, but a State which, in accordance with the principle of subsidiarity, generously acknowledges and supports initiatives arising from the different social forces and combines spontaneity with closeness to those in need.
