


Chaplain Thoughts...

"Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." by Rev. Roy E. Campbell, Jr.

Have you watched the quiz show Jeopardy? Have you noticed the expressions of the contestants when they get, what seems like an obvious question wrong? You can almost feel them wanting another chance to give the correct answer. Growing up, I used to hear my Godmother say, "Don't be a Doubting Thomas." I had no idea what that meant, or where the expression came from. Well, in today's Gospel, Thomas doubts that the Lord is truly risen. Not only is his Lord truly risen, but He will give Thomas another chance to believe.

Earlier in John's Gospel, as Jesus prepared to return to Judea, to raise His friend Lazarus from the dead, His disciples warned Him of the Jews' intention to kill Him. Thomas did not doubt what Jesus could do, and was full of confidence when he said, "Let us also go to die with him." Yet, today Thomas is away when our Lord first appears to the other Apostles.


Thomas' confidence seems rooted in what he knows, what he has seen. Thomas is full of false confidence, and lacking faith, because he doubted that Jesus had risen from the dead, when his fellow Apostles told him that Jesus had appeared to them. Thomas doubted his faith, because he had not seen Jesus, himself. "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail marks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."




When Jesus appeared to the Apostles again, He brought His lost sheep, Thomas back to His flock when He said, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas again believed saying, "My Lord and my God!"

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday and Jesus calls us not to be like "Doubting Thomas." If we believe in the miracles He did in the Scriptures, then we should believe in the mercy of His miracles (big & small) that He performs in our lives today. When we have doubt, Jesus says to us, do not be unbelieving, but believe in my Divine Mercy. We take advantage of His Divine Mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. When we leave that Sacrament, we believe that we have received God's mercy.

This Holy Year of Mercy reminds that God not only wants us to receive His mercy, but to also show mercy to others. In fact, we have to forgive in order to be forgiven! Jesus taught us that in The Lord's Prayer, "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." Let us always be willing to forgive, as God is always willing to forgive us.

1. Make the Sign of the Cross 2. Pray an Our Father, Hail Mary and The Apostles' Creed 3. On the Our Father beads say: Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world. 4. On the Hail Mary beads say: For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world. 5. Repeat for the five decades. 6. Conclude by repeating this prayer 3 times: Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.



Supreme Knight's Message

Strengthening Catholic Family Life by Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson



In my column last month, I related a part of the conversation the supreme chaplain and I had with Pope Francis regarding our Order's new emphasis on strengthening Catholic family life.

During the last fraternal year, we implemented a new family life program titled Building the Domestic Church: The Family Fully Alive. Each month, it providers prayers, Scripture readings and meditations for families on different aspects

of the domestic church and recommends charitable activities that councils can sponsor. At last August's Supreme Convention, we began our 17th Orderwide rosary-based pilgrim icon prayer program — this year dedicated to the Oly Family.

Then, at the midyear State Deputies meeting, I announced an important new initiative: Building the Domestic Church While

Strengthening Our Parish. It encourages councils to sponsor programs promoting Catholic family life while integrating their activities more closely into the life of their parish.

Councils Can Strengthen Catholic Family Life Through Our Prayer Program And **Consecration To The Holy Family**

Last month, I asked that the opening Mass at all state conventions this year include an act of family consecration to the Holy Family. This should become an essential part of our family life programs, and should move from state convention Masses to the parishes where our local councils are based.

The response of Pope Francis and of many bishops and priests to these programs has been greatly encouraging, and I now take this opportunity to announce another expansion of our initiative.

Our Holy Family Prayer Program has met with such success that we should take it to a new level. I have asked our State Deputies and State Chaplains to continue our Holy Family Prayer Program in local parishes, but also to select one Saturday this October to offer the program as a diocesan-wide event, and to invite all Catholic families.

The diocesan-wide event should retain the rosary, papal meditations on family life, and the litany to the Holy Family that is already a part of the parish-based prayer program. But it should be expanded to include recitation of the new act of family consecration to the Holy Family and solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

State councils should begin now to make preparations for this diocesan-wide Holy Family Prayer Program. State chaplains should also assist in selecting a suitable parish in each diocese and in coordinating the event with the local bishop.

Recently, Pope Francis reminded us that the Church continues to propose marriage "not as an ideal only for a few" but as "a reality that can be experienced by all the baptized faithful."

This is precisely the idea of our program. Every family can benefit, and every family should be invited to participate.

One of the great lessons of the recent World Meeting of Families

in Philadelphia was that millions of families can be helped by coming together in solidarity with and for each other.

What is also necessary for

an effective evangelization of family life is for Catholic families to realize that the principles of charity, unity and fraternity apply also to them as families. This is one of the keys to understanding the family as a "domestic church."

There is no Catholic organization better positioned today to assist in the renewal of family life than the Knights of Columbus. But the realization of this goal will require the renewed dedication of our local councils.

A renewal of Catholic family life can begin with a simple plan: the consecration of millions of Catholic families to the Holy Family and their dedication to living as a domestic church within their parish communities.

The Knights of Columbus can begin to make this happen. With the intercession of Our Lady of Guadalupe and our venerable founder, Father McGivney, let us begin!

Ronald Reagan's First Inaugural Address On January 20, 1981

Each one of those markers (At Arlington National Cemetery) is a monument to the lands of hero I spoke of earlier. Their lives ended in places called Belleau Wood. The Argonne, Omaha Beach, Salemo and halfway around the world on Guadalcanal, Tarawa Pork Chop Hill, the Chosin Reservoir, and in a hundred rice paddies and jungles of a place called Vietnam.

Under one such marker lies a young man—Martin Treptow—who left his job in a small town barber shop in 1917 to go to France with the famed Rainbow Division. There, on the western front, he was killed trying to carry a message between battalions under heavy artillery fire.

We are told that on his body was found a diary. On the flyleaf under the heading, "My Pledge," he had written these words: "America must win this war. Therefore, I will work, I will save, I will sacrifice. I will endure, I will fight cheerfully and do my utmost, as if the issue of the whole struggle depended on me alone."

The crisis we are facing today does not require of us the kind of sacrifice that Martin Treptow and so many thousands of others were called upon to make. It does require, however, our best effort, and our willingness to believe in ourselves and to believe in our capacity to perform great deeds, to believe that together, with God's help, we can and will resolve the problems which now confront us.

And, after all, why shouldn't we believe that?

We are Americans. God bless you, and thank you.


For these three remaining months of this fraternal year, we will focus in accomplishing other things that will make the transition from my administration into the incoming administration go smoothly.

JAMES C. FLETCHER, JR. (May 20, 1934 - June 28, 1994) was born to James Sr. and Marguerite Fletcher and was the eldest of nine children. He attended the Bowie Demonstration School, Fletcherstown School, Lincoln Elementary, Armstrong Senior High School, Howard University and the American University. Mr. Fletcher served four years in the United State Air Force. After his service in the military, he began a career with the Federal Government as a Computer Specialist and retired as a Management Information Specialist.

Since the early 1960's until his death, Mr. Fletcher was active in community service in Prince George's County. He was the Chairman of the Glenarden Recreation Council and President of the Civic Association. He was the Ward I Councilman for 9-years prior to becoming Mayor of Glenarden, MD. He served three terms as Mayor and ran successfully for the Prince George's County Council in 1990 and was about to announce his bid for re-election. Mr. Fletcher's passions were commu-

nity development, balanced affordable housing, economic empowerment and revitalization. He served as Chairman of the Public Safety and Health Committee and the Prince George's Board of Services, a member of the County Council's Fiscal Policy and Government Operations Committee, the Legislative Committee, and the Prince George's Board of Social Services.

Other memberships include the Prince George's Municipal Association and the Public Safety Committee of the Metropolitan Council of Governments. He chaired the Prince George's County Substance Abuse Council and co-chaired the County's Revitalization Task Force. He was the past president of the Prince George's Municipal Association and former member of the Board of Directors of the Maryland Municipal League. Mr. Fletcher also had membership in the Maryland Association of Counties and the National Association of Counties. He was also a member of the American Legion, Glenarden Post #275.

Mr. Fletcher was a devoted parishioner of St. Joseph Catholic Church. He served as an usher, a moderator of the youth ministry and was on the Board of Directors of the Catholic Youth Organization. He was also a member of the Men's Club.

Mr. Fletcher was a devoted family man. He married Vernell Hammett and they and their two eldest children settled in Glenarden, Maryland in 1962. He was always available for whomever needed him. His constituents and friends knew that they always had someone who would listen and care.

Jim was first a Christian and second a philanthropist. Whether with his family, or in a professional setting, Mr. Fletcher loved people. Next to God, he loved people second. People were his most important business.



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REFLECTIONS Lawrence P. Grayson No Greater Love

It was the sixth hour on the 14th of Nisan in the Hebrew year 3790 – in the future, under the Gregorian calendar, it would be remembered as noon, Friday, April 7, 30 A.D. Large crowds were entering the walled city of Jerusalem to celebrate the Passover, which would begin at sundown. Opposing the flow of pilgrims were three men carrying wooden beams, who were accompanied by a group of Roman soldiers, Jewish high priests, a few relatives, friends, and curious onlookers. They exited the city through the Gennath Gate and struggled up a nearby rocky hill called Golgotha. At its crest were three upright timbers. Each was about six feet high and shaped so that a grooved crossbeam could be fitted on top.

Two of the men were criminals; the third was innocent and had done nothing to deserve punishment. All three were to die.

When they reached the hilltop, the soldiers disrobed Jesus, the innocent one, and tossed him to the ground. They placed the lumber under his neck and extended his arms. The executioner quickly drove a long, square nail though each wrist into the beam. Four soldiers lifted the wooden bar, raising the condemned man from the ground, and placed it on the upright. One of his feet was placed over the other and both nailed to the vertical beam. A sign with his name and charge against him was affixed over his head. The same procedure was followed for the other two prisoners.

The bright noon sky began to darken. The crucified men were in intense agony as their lives slowly ebbed away. By one o'clock, most of the curious had left. Jesus raised his eyes toward heaven and cried out in a loud voice, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." This petition was meant not only for those who condemned, persecuted and crucified him, but for all of humanity – for those through the ages whom he came to save, but who receive him not; for those who hear the Word, profess to believe it, but prefer a congenial life, without self-restraint, sacrifice or mortification; for those who want Christ's religion without the Cross. The appeal was an act of supreme love. Jesus, the Son of God, as then-Father Joseph Ratzinger said, "loves us not because *we* are good, but because *he* is good." If we are to be followers of Christ, we must love in the same way.

The word "love" is overly used in our language and as a result the concept of love, as exhibited by Our Lord, is poorly understood. It is used in place of enjoy, as in "I love sailing." It is used to denote erotic attraction and filial affection, as well as a profound attachment and deep concern for the well-being of another person. This last meaning for love is a willful, rather than emotional, act which recognizes that every human being has an inherent dignity as a creature made in the image and likeness of God. That is the type of love, which the Greek's called *agape*, that is demanded of Christians. In contrast to other-centered, sacrificial love, so much of what is done and approved of in today's society is the result of its self-focused antithesis. Contraception uses another person for one's immediate pleasure. Pornography satisfies one's own erotic desires. Cohabitation involves no binding commitment to another. Abortion sacrifices a child for freedom for oneself. Euthanasia purposely destroys a God-given life and the value it is meant to provide, often to eliminate pain or a burden.

Today, too few people are willing to make the commitment and sacrifice required for Christ-like love. Too few professed Catholics truly live according to the teachings and example of Christ, even if they abide by obligatory devotions. Their faith does not affect their ideas, attitudes, priorities, decisions and actions. As a body, they are indistinguishable from the general populace.

They relegate their faith to an occasional Mass – only 24 percent attend weekly -- and the rest of the time exhibit a practical agnosticism, living as if God has no effect on their lives. They willing ignore and even deny Church teachings, and have so compartmentalized their minds that they can say, "I am personally opposed to abortion (or ..., you name the evil), but will not prevent others from having one. This disposition is palatable because it imposes no obligation on the individual to publicly live the faith, to make the sacrifices that faith and Christ-like love demand. It does not interfere with one's drive for self-gratification and material success.

Faith is more than a set of dogmas to be acknowledged; rather it is a way of life, a way whose ends are not the temporal comforts of this world, but the fulfillment of the reason we were created -- to gain an eternity in the kingdom of God. What Catholics need is a re-evangelization of their beliefs. They must learn once again what it means to be Catholic, to understand the timeless truth of its doctrines, to develop the moral values and commitment to live their lives in accord with the faith.

Jesus, the Son of God, came into the world to pay through suffering the ransom for man's sins. On the Cross, he fulfilled his task, the work of Redemption was complete. As three o'clock approached, he uttered, "It is finished," and soon after bowed his head and died. While thousands were beginning the ritual of Passover by spilling the blood of lambs in the temple area as an offering to God, the Lamb of God offered his blood as a sacrifice for the salvation of man.

Although the doors of heaven have been opened, we must earn the right to enter. Being a disciple of Christ requires commitment. After his Resurrection, Christ asked Peter, "Do you love me?" This is a question we all must answer, not only in words, but with deeds.



Knock

On the evening of August 21, 1879 Mary McLoughlin, the housekeeper to the parish priest of Knock, County Mayo, Ireland, was astonished to see the outside south wall of the church bathed in a mysterious light; there were three figures standing in front of the wall, which she mistook for replacements of the stone figures destroyed in a storm. She rushed through the rain to her friend Margaret Byrne's house. **V**

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After a half hour Mary decided to leave and Margaret's sister Mary agreed to walk home with her. As they passed the church they saw and amazing vision very clearly: Standing out from the gable and to the west of it appeared the Blessed Virgin, St. Joseph

and St. John. The figure of the Blessed Virgin was life-size, while the others seemed to be neither as large nor as tall. They stood a little away from the gable wall about two feet from the ground. The Virgin was erect with her eyes toward Heaven, and she was wearing a large white cloak hanging in full folds; on her head was a large crown.

Mary Byrne ran to tell her family while Mary McLoughlin gazed at the apparition. Soon a crowd gathered and all saw the apparition. The parish priest, Archdeacon Cavanaugh, did not come out, however, and his absence was a disappointment to the devout villagers. Among the witness were Patrick Hill and John Curry. As Patrick later described the scene: 'The figures were fully rounded, as if they had a body and life. They did not speak but, as we drew near, they retreated a little towards the wall.' Patrick reported that he got close enough to make out the words in the book held by the figure of St. John.

An old woman named Bridget trench drew closer to embrace the feet of the Virgin, but the figure seemed always beyond reach. Others out in the fields and some distance away saw a strange light around the church. The vision lasted for about three hours and then faded.

The next day a group of villagers went to see the priest, who accepted their report as genuine; he wrote to the diocesan Bishop of Tuam; then the Church set up a commission to interview a number of the people claiming to witness the apparition. The diocesan hierarchy was not convinced, and some members of the commission ridiculed the visionaries, alleging they were victims of a hoax perpetrated by the local Protestant constable! But the orinary people were not so skeptical, and the first pilgrimages to Knock began in 1880. Two years later Archbishop John Joseph Lynch of Toronto made a visit to the parish and claimed he had been healed by the Virgin of Knock.

The Church approved the apparition in 1971 as being quite probable, although it has never been formally stated. The Shrine at Knock is opened year round. In 1994 three life-size statues were erected of Our Lady, St. Joseph and St. John.

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
