# Chaplain Thoughts...

*"I am the resurrection and the life."* by Bishop-Elect Roy E. Campbell, Jr.



Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" Mary replied, "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe." This must also be our response to the message of our Gospel.

Jesus chose the death of Lazarus to show the power and glory of the Son

of Man. Lazarus was dead, but Jesus brought him back to life. When Lazarus came out of his tomb, he was wrapped in burial cloth. Jesus said, "Untie him and let him go." Jesus freed Lazarus from the bondage of death, to live in the new life Jesus gave him. That is why Jesus told Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live." Lazarus believed in Jesus and our Lord brought him back to life.

Jesus continued by telling Martha, "and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." Now Jesus is speaking to us and everyone who is baptized in the "Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit." We now live in the life of Christ and will never die! Do we believe this?



Lazarus died a mortal death again, and we will die a mortal death; however, through our Baptisms and our faith, we will never die a spiritual death, unless we turn away from Christ. Saint Paul says in his Letter to the Romans, "if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the spirit is alive because of righteousness."

The Pharisees entombed their sins in the darkness of their hearts, by condemning the Lord to death. Often we place our sins inside our own dark tombs, where we hope that nobody will see them, where we hope that they will not be discovered. In our dark tombs, they will only cause us more decay and emit a stench of hopelessness and depression.

The story of Lazarus teaches us that nothing can be hidden from God, no matter how grave the sins are that we have hidden in our tombs. We commit a grave, or mortal, sin through our own free choice, a choice so contrary to God's will, that it ruptures our friendship with Him. Jesus desires to approach our sins and to bring life where there is death.

Jesus is not afraid of the gravity of our sins. We must have faith and believe that light always overcomes darkness. That resurrection always conquers death. That love and forgiveness always overshadows the power of sin. Our faith in Jesus and His love for us, should lead us to say, as Martha said: "Yes, Lord. I have come to believe."

#### Supreme Knight's Message

LAST MONTH, I wrote about Martin Scorsese's remarkable film Silence, based on the historical novel of the same title by the Japanese Catholic author Shusaku Endo. Through the journey of two young Jesuits, Father Francisco Garrpe and Father Sebastião Rodrigues, Silence explores the 17th-century persecution of Christians in Japan - and the consequences of the apostasy, after torture, of Father Cristóvão Ferreira, the Jesuit provincial there.

As I wrote last month, Scorsese views his film as a sort of pilgrimage, and I encouraged those who see it to do so in the same light. Silence presents in an extraordinary way an important chapter — but only one chapter — in the long history of missionary activity and evangelization. What is missing from Silence is also worth recalling.

When news of Father Ferreira's action reached Europe, many Jesuits sought to travel to Japan not to ascertain the facts but to join those who

were suffering martyrdom. Among them was a group of Jesuits led by an Italian, Father Marcello Mastrilli. Before leaving for Japan, Father Mastrilli composed a new novena asking the intercession of St. Francis

Xavier, one of the first Jesuits, for the success of the missions and especially for those suffering overseas for the Catholic faith, that they would "live and die in the state of grace." Father Mastrilli's novena, traditionally recited in March, has come to be known as the Novena of Grace.

Father Mastrilli and his companions were captured shortly after their arrival in Japan. Horribly tortured, they suffered martyrs' deaths. Indeed, Father Mastrilli's witness, not Father Ferreira's apostasy, better represents the Jesuit mission in Japan.

A Japanese account from the time states that during the 17th century approximately 100 Jesuits died as martyrs while only five renounced their faith, after torture.

There is even evidence that toward the end of his life Father Ferreira recanted his apostasy, after which he, too, was tortured to death.

And regarding the question of whether Christianity could take root in Japan, the fact remains that when Commodore Matthew Perry entered Japan's Edo Bay in 1853 there were thousands of Japanese Christians.

Today, we see throughout parts of the Middle East, Africa and Asia the brutal persecution, torture and killing of Christians. The daily heroism of these brothers and sisters in the faith is an inspiration to their fellow Christians everywhere.

As we know, the situation is particularly acute in the Middle East, where so many Christians have been targeted for genocide and hundreds of thousands have lost virtually everything. During the past several years, the Knights of Columbus has become one of the international leaders in helping these people

- providing thousands with food, clothing, shelter and medical care.

This year, we will continue our leadership role and we will look for ways to provide even more help. The corporal works of mercy continue to be indispensable.

**Councils Can Strengthen Catholic Family Life** But we can also do more to foster a greater spiritual solidarity with Christians who are suffering. This month, we will launch a new initiative to pray for those Christians

suffering persecution. In this way, we will join a new spiritual work of mercy with our ongoing corporal works of mercy.

We are proposing a new prayer, a Novena of Grace and Solidarity (see page 15), based on the prayer of Father Mastrilli. I urge all brother Knights and their families to join in this Novena of Grace and Solidarity for persecuted Christians throughout the world March 12-20. The novena may also be prayed any time throughout the year.

In many ways, 2017 may be the decisive year in determining whether many Christian communities throughout the Middle East will continue to exist. Many Christians in the region tell me that our efforts give them renewed hope and determination.

Let us pray that, in spite of all the tribulations they face, they will remain faithful and that we will remain worthy of their trust in us. Vivat Jesus!

He also knew that if Catholic men banded together, united by charity and unity, they could strengthen their faith, their families, and their communities.

So, he established the Knights of Columbus, and with it, a "pass-the-hat" insurance system to protect the Catholic families in his parish. Over time, that system has evolved, and today we stay true to our founding mission through our multi-billion dollar, top-rated insurance program. Members in the United States and Canada have exclusive access to our insurance program and products, including life insurance, retirement annuities, long-term care insurance, and disability income insurance.

Our charitable giving and fraternal service have continued to grow too. Nearly 2 million men in over a dozen countries across the globe are proud to call themselves Knights. All human beings, from their mother's womb, belong to God who searches them and knows them, who forms them and knits them together with his own hands, who gazes on them when they are tiny shapeless embryos and already sees in them

the adults of tomorrow whose days are numbered and whose vocation is even now written in the 'book of life.' There too, when they are still in their mothers' womb—as many passages of the Bible bear witness—they are the personal objects of God's loving and fatherly providence." (Evangelium Vitae, 61).

In his 1995 Encyclical, *Evangelium Vitae*, St. John Paul II called on all Catholic faithful to bear witness to the Gospel of Life and to build the "civilization of life and love" (100). In keeping with this mission and our Order's Catholic principles of charity, unity, and fraternity, the Knights of Columbus stands strong in its conviction that every human life is a gift of God, endowed with certain inalienable rights — the first among these being the right to life. Even in the midst of difficulties and uncertainties, we believe that human life is sacred and inviolable, and ought to be defended with maximum determination. To this end, the Knights of Columbus supports policies that promote a Culture of Life and opposes legislative efforts that promote abortion, contraception, sterilization, cloning, the destruction of embryos, assisted suicide, euthanasia, unjust war, and the death penalty when there is an acceptable alternative.

One of the most effective ways in which the Knights of Columbus has promoted a Culture of Life and helped thousands of women save their children is through the Ultrasound Initiative. As of December 2016, the initiative has funded and placed 752 ultrasound machines – valued at more than \$36 million – in all 50 states, as well as in Canada, Jamaica, Guatemala and Peru.

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

On March 8, 2017, Pope Francis named Rev. Roy Edward Campbell, Jr. pastor of St. Joseph Church in Largo, Mdaryland, as an auxiliary bishop of Washington. ### <u>REFLECTIONS</u> Lawrence P. Grayson Being Catholics in Today's Society

America is in transition from being a nation in which Christian principles guide public actions to one in which religion has no place in the public square, from a country where governmental policies allow free expression of religion to one in which government can force individuals and institutions to violate Church teachings. In 1965, there were 10,600 Catholic elementary schools, the Legion of Decency, Hello Dolly on Broadway, and singer Julie Andrews; today, there are 5,200 Catholic elementary schools, the Freedom from Religion Foundation, The Vagina Monologues, and Lady Gaga. Culture, wither thou goest?

Catholics, who constitute 20 percent of the population and occupy many positions of power and influence, could fill a moral need in American society. Currently, 31.4 percent of the members of the U.S. Congress identify themselves as Catholic, as do five of the eight sitting justices of the Supreme Court, many Cabinet members and nominees, and numerous leaders in business, industry and the media. Allied with like-minded Christians, Catholics could have a significant role in returning this nation to its founding values. But it is unlikely to happen.

Since the end of World War II, Catholics have made a decisive effort to blend into the American culture and advance in society. They have been highly successful, but at the cost of subordinating their religious beliefs to the secular tenets of society. Today, their public stances on moral issues are indistinguishable from those of non-Catholics. Nay, as a group, their views are frequently more in opposition to Catholic dogma than are those of their Protestant brethren.

Sen. Tim Kaine of Virginia is a prime example. Raised as a Catholic, his votes as a senator supporting abortion earned him perfect ratings from Planned Parenthood and NARAL Pro-Choice America and a rating of zero from the National Right to Life Committee. While campaigning to be vice president in 2016, Kaine had the hubris to say that although his position in favor of same-sex marriage was "at odds with the current doctrine of the [Catholic] Church that I still attend," the Church would someday adopt his view. Several bishops soon thereafter issued statements reaffirming the Church's immutable position on marriage.

The senator's opposition to Church teaching is not unique. The 2014 Pew Religious Landscape Study found that among selfidentified Catholics, 48 percent believe that abortion should be legal in most cases; 57 percent favor same-sex marriage; and 70 percent accept homosexuality. Further, when religious liberty conflicts with LGBT demands, as experienced in wedding-related businesses, 57 percent of Catholics say the business should be required to provide services at same-sex marriages. This fraction of Catholics is higher than the 49 percent of the public-at-large.

Too many Catholics, unfortunately, do not believe the dogmas of the Faith they claim. In the Baptismal vows which are renewed each Easter and in the Apostles Creed taught in all Catholic schools and repeated each time the Rosary is prayed, one proclaims, "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, creator of heaven and earth." At every Mass, the Nicene Creed is said, expressing comparable declarations about the existence of God and heaven. Yet, the Pew study found that among Catholics only 64 percent are absolutely certain God exists, and another 27 percent are fairly certain; the remainder either are not sure or do not believe. Similarly, only 85 percent of Catholics believe in heaven and 63 percent in hell. One questions whether these people understand what they are saying or are simply parroting words.

One reason for this lack of certainty is that too many Catholics are lax in practicing their Faith. CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) data show that only 23 percent of Catholics attend Mass every Sunday; another 21 percent attend at least once a month and the remainder seldom or never attend.

It is not surprising that Catholics who regularly attend Mass believe in Church teachings in greater numbers than those who do not. Yet, even among those who faithfully attend, there is doubt about so central a dogma as the Eucharist, which the Catechism of the Catholic Church describes as "the source and summit of the Christian life." Catholic dogma holds that the Eucharist is the true presence -- body and blood, soul and divinity -- of Jesus Christ. But, according to a 2015 Knights of Columbus/Marist poll, only two-thirds of practicing Catholics (65 percent) agree with the teaching, while 64 percent of nonpracticing Catholics say the Eucharist is merely a symbol.

When such a large portion of Catholics does not believe in the most basic doctrines of the Faith, there is a significant problem in catechesis. Today, one-in-eight American adults is a former Catholic. Nearly one-third of American adults (31.7 percent) say they were raised Catholic, but only 20.8 percent still identify with the Faith. The hemorrhaging among Catholics is significant. While the total number of Catholics has held relatively steady, it is due principally to Hispanic immigration, not births or conversions. The Pew study found that for every two U.S. adults who convert to Catholicism from another religious tradition, 13 adults leave the Catholic Faith. No other religious group in the study has such a lopsided ratio of losses to gains.

Before Catholics can have a notable effect on society, they themselves must know the Faith and live according to its teachings. There is a need, even among those who faithfully attend Mass, for catechesis so that they, in turn, can teach the Faith to their children and grandchildren. Then, the faithful must evangelize among the Catholic population-at-large, before they can successfully proclaim the Faith to non-Catholics and affect society as a whole.

The task of changing society is daunting, but not unattainable. With prayer, sacrifice and living in accord with God's will, it can be done. As St. Matthew (19:26) wrote, "With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."

## Marian Title for April **Our Lady of** Knock



On the evening of August 21, 1879 Mary McLoughlin, the housekeeper to the parish priest of Knock, County Mayo, Ireland, was astonished to see the outside south wall of the church bathed in a mysterious light; there were three figures standing in front of the wall, which she mistook for replacements of the stone figures destroyed in a storm. She rushed through the rain to her friend Margaret Byrne's house. 2 2 2

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After a half hour Mary decided to leave and Margaret's sister Mary agreed to walk home with her. As they passed the church they saw and amazing vision very clearly: Standing out from the gable and to the west of it appeared the Blessed Virgin, St. Joseph

and St. John. The figure of the Blessed Virgin was life-size, while the others seemed to be neither as large nor as tall. They stood a little away from the gable wall about two feet from the ground. The Virgin was erect with her eyes toward Heaven, and she was wearing a large white cloak hanging in full folds; on her head was a large crown.

Mary Byrne ran to tell her family while Mary McLoughlin gazed at the apparition. Soon a crowd gathered and all saw the apparition. The parish priest, Archdeacon Cavanaugh, did not come out, however, and his absence was a disappointment to the devout villagers. Among the witness were Patrick Hill and John Curry. As Patrick later described the scene: 'The figures were fully rounded, as if they had a body and life. They did not speak but, as we drew near, they retreated a little towards the wall.' Patrick reported that he got close enough to make out the words in the book held by the figure of St. John.

An old woman named Bridget trench drew closer to embrace the feet of the Virgin, but the figure seemed always beyond reach. Others out in the fields and some distance away saw a strange light around the church. The vision lasted for about three hours and then faded.

The next day a group of villagers went to see the priest, who accepted their report as genuine; he wrote to the diocesan Bishop of Tuam; then the Church set up a commission to interview a number of the people claiming to witness the apparition. The diocesan hierarchy was not convinced, and some members of the commission ridiculed the visionaries, alleging they were victims of a hoax perpetrated by the local Protestant constable! But the ordinary people were not so skeptical, and the first pilgrimages to Knock began in 1880. Two years later Archbishop John Joseph Lynch of Toronto made a visit to the parish and claimed he had been healed by the Virgin of Knock.

The Church approved the apparition in 1971 as being quite probable, although it has never been formally stated. The Shrine at Knock is opened year round. In 1994 three life-size statues were erected of Our Lady, St. Joseph and St. John.

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
