































Chaplain Report

We eat but we are soon hungry again. That constant hunger was no different for the Israelites wandering in the desert than it is for us. God led them out of the slavery of Egypt and had continuously given the Israelites signs of His power. Through Moses, God told the Israelites, "Don't worry' I will take care of you. I will provide for all of your needs." Yet, as soon as they were hungry again, they forgot what God had done for them through Moses and wanted another sign.

The crowd of 5,000 kept following Jesus, because they physical hunger was fed, not because of the sign of HOW they were miraculously fed. They could not comprehend the "bigger picture." Jesus miraculously fed them as much as they wanted, showing them the sign of what H was really going to feed them with, Himself in the Eucharist. Jesus was telling the crowd what God told the Israelites through Moses, "Don't worry; I will take care of you. I will provide for all of your needs."



Earlier in John's Gospel, Jesus told the Samaritan woman at the well of the life-giving water He offered. Unlike this crowd, the Samaritan woman believed in the sign Jesus told her about and became His disciple, bringing her village to also believe in Jesus. We are called to be like the Samaritan woman, seeking Jesus for the eternal life that He gives us in the food of Eucharist.





SUPREME KNIGHT'S MESSAGE

Carl A. Anderson - Supreme Knight



The Knights of Columbus has grown to new heights in its charitable giving and volunteer hours during 2014, once again answering Pope Francis' call to reach out to those in need, Supreme Knight Carl Anderson told the state deputies and state deputy-elects in his address at the 2015 Organizational Meeting of State Deputies in New Haven.

The Knights of Columbus set a new all-time record last year for charitable donations and service hours with \$173,550,680 in donations and more than 71.5 million hours of service. The number of service hours contributed by members rose in 2014 by more than a million hours over the 2013 total, with each member donating nearly a full workweek on average.

According to the K of C's Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity for the year ending Dec. 31, 2014, donations grew by more than \$3.4 million over 2013, achieving an increase in giving for the 15th consecutive year.

"These numbers show that the Knights of Columbus has the courage to make a witness to charity and to practice fraternal outreach to those in need," Supreme Knight Anderson said.

Among its major donations in 2014, the Knights of Columbus made a gift of \$1.4 million in support of athletes who will take part in this summer's Special Olympics World Games in Los Angeles. The funds will cover the cost of transportation, housing and meals for the athletes as they travel to the games, stay there during the competition, and return home. Supreme Knight Anderson also asked state jurisdictions to step up their already strong support for Special Olympics athletes.

Another unique initiative in 2014 was the Knights of Columbus Christian Refugee Relief Fund, which has contributed \$2.6 million for humanitarian assistance to those suffering persecution and dislocation in Iraq and the surrounding region.

"It has shocked the conscience of the world that people are systematically being purged from the region where their families have lived for millennia — simply for their faith," said Mr. Anderson at the program's inception in August. "It is imperative that we stand in solidarity with them."

Gifts by the Knights of \$200,000 each were also made to the Byzantine and Latin Rite Catholic communities of war-torn Ukraine for humanitarian relief, supporting projects that feed and aid homeless children and refugees living on the streets of the capital city of Kiev.

The Knights continued to support their local communities in 2014 through such programs as the Black Friday Coats for Kids event, Food for Families and blood drives. Knights also gave assistance to such organizations as Habitat for Humanity and the American Wheelchair Mission.

During the past decade the Knights of Columbus has donated nearly \$1.55 billion to charity and 691 million hours of volunteer service in support of charitable initiatives.



Knights of Columbus to Expand Humanitarian Assistance to Suffering Middle Eastern Christians

Having already donated more than \$3 million in humanitarian aid to persecuted Christians and other religious minorities in the Middle East, the Knights of Columbus will expand its efforts even further with a national campaign to raise funds and foster awareness of the terrible suffering of Christians and others in the Middle East.

As part of the K of C effort, a new commercial on the issue will be airing nationally beginning this weekend. It can be viewed at.

The Knights will also announce additional details of its program to aid Christian refugees at its international convention being held August 4-6 in Philadelphia. In attendance will be archbishops from Iraq and Syria, where the violence against Christians has been particularly severe.

An exposé on the deafening silence of the international community on this issue was published in the July 26 edition of *The New York Times Magazine*: "Is This the End of Christianity in the Middle East?" It reported that extremist groups "are enslaving, killing and uprooting Christians, with no aid in sight."

In the article, which was featured on the magazine's cover, author Eliza Griswold reported that, "according to a Pew study, more Christians are now faced with religious persecution than at any time since their early history."

The Knights began its Christian Refugee Relief Fund in August 2014 with \$1 million in matching funds that was quickly met and exceeded by its members and the public. The humanitarian assistance provided has included new housing for those who have had to flee their homes, as well as support for medical facilities in areas flooded with Christian and other refugees.

"Christians in the Middle East are facing a dire situation – and even extinction – while the response from the international community has been woefully inadequate," said Knights of Columbus CEO Carl Anderson. "Pope Francis has urged the international community to take



action to help Christians in the Middle East, and, as an organization that has long supported victims of religious persecution, the Knights of

Columbus is responding by asking our own members, and the public at large, to help us save the lives of people who are being persecuted simply because of their Christian faith."

Those wishing to assist with the relief efforts can donate by visiting www.christiansatrisk.org or by sending

checks or money orders payable to Knights of Columbus Charities at P.O. Box 1966, New Haven, CT 06509-1966. The memo portion should indicate that the check is for Christian Refugee Relief.

One hundred percent of all donations directly supports humanitarian assistance and raising awareness for persecuted Christians and other religious minorities, especially in the Middle East. Donations are tax deductible to the extent allowed by law. Knights of Columbus Charities, Inc., is recognized by the IRS as a charitable organization under section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code.

The K of C has a long history of providing humanitarian relief and has done so following the 9/11 terrorist attacks; the 2013 typhoons in the Philippines; hurricanes Katrina and Sandy; nationwide tornadoes; flooding in Mexico; and tsunamis in Indonesia and Japan.

In the area of support for victims of religious persecution, the Knights provided humanitarian assistance and created international awareness of the persecution of the Catholic Church in Mexico throughout the 1920s.

The Knights of Columbus is the world's largest Catholic fraternal organization with nearly 1.9 million members worldwide. One of the most active charitable organizations in the United States, the Knights of Columbus donated more than \$173.5 million and 71.5 million hours of service in 2014.

There has been an on-going debate among pro-life groups about



the use of graphic images at public protests. Now images are having an effect in showing the dark side of the abortion industry. On July 13, the Center for Medical Progress released on the Internet the first of a series of videos illustrating the crassness and coldness of Planned Parenthood officials pursuing profits through the harvesting and sale of

human organs gained from abortions. The videos are the result of a three-year undercover investigation. As of today, three videos have been released with the expectation that as many as nine more will follow.

The effects have left Planned Parenthood reeling. Most of the major broadcast TV and cable news shows, as will as the progressive daily papers, have given little or no coverage to the stories. The videos, however have gotten major attention from radio talk shows, several national TV anchors, a number of Republican presidential candidates, and on social media. As a result, to-date, at least five major corporations have withdrawn their donations to Planned Parenthood, Congressional hearings have begun, several states have begun investigations of the organization in their states, and legislation has been introduced to halt the \$500 million of annual federal funding to this national abortion provider. None of this would have happened without the video images, as graphic and abhorrent as they are, of the operations of Planned Parenthood.



Stand Strong

A significant danger facing America today is that its people are losing their sense of religious values and allowing the culture of the country to be shaped by militant secularists. The results are unsurprising: abortion and same-sex marriage are legal; assisted suicide and euthanasia are gaining acceptance; pornography is rampant; and religious persecution is underway.

When secularism dominates the culture, religious freedom must be curtailed. Secularism is a belief system that is antitheistic, rooted in materialism and hedonism. It is alluring because it gives societal acceptance to unbridled human passions. It does away with distinctions of right or wrong, even treating wrong as right and right as wrong. Secularism is an idolatry in which the beliefs of the movement replace God in setting the standards of morality, of conscience, and of truth. If man genuinely believes in God and lives his life accordingly, he would be in direct and continual contradiction to the aims of secularism. Hence, secularism must necessarily oppose religion, persecute its believers, drive it from the public square, and nullify it.

Religious persecution in America has begun:

- On July 14, the courts again ruled that the Little Sisters of the Poor must agree to have contraceptive coverage provided to their female employees or face crippling fines.
- In Houston, pastors were subpoenaed to submit their sermons on sexuality to legal scrutiny.
- Christian ministers who operate a wedding chapel in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho were ordered to perform samesex weddings under threat of fines and imprisonment.
- Catholic adoption services in several states have closed rather than provide adoptions to homosexual couples.
- In New York City, Yeshiva University was sued for not providing housing to same-sex couples.
- A Methodist Camp in Ocean Grove, New Jersey, lost some of its tax-exemption because it would not allow same-sex, civil union ceremonies on its grounds.

florists and providers of wedding facilities who are being sued because they are unwilling to provide services for events that violate their consciences. Now there are threats that religious schools may lose accreditation, student aid, federal grants, and tax-exempt status, if they do not go along with the secularist agenda. And there are a growing number of bakers, photographers,

The strongest opponent to the secularist-dominated society, and the most necessary for a return to a moral order, should be the Catholic Church. Its teachings are clear. Popes have been speaking out against secularism in one form or another since at least the French Revolution. And Catholicism is the largest religious denomination in the Western world.

In America presently, the vice president, speaker and minority leaders of the House of Representatives, 31 percent of all members of Congress, six of the nine justices of the Supreme

Court, numerous media and business leaders, and almost onequarter of the population identify as Catholic. If their Faith guided their actions in public life, America would be a different country. Many who claim to be Catholic, however, give little or no thought to God and ignore the teachings of His Church in their daily lives.

Those who are militantly secularist are a very small minority of the population. But there are many, many Catholics who provide societal support for secularist ideas and actions. These are fellow travelers, although they may not consider themselves so. The politician who says his religious convictions will not affect his political actions is a fellow traveler. The judge who rules according to changing societal directions rather than the letter and intent of the law is a fellow traveler. The teacher who prohibits religious expression in class assignments is a fellow traveler. The newscaster who gives equal treatment to a small number of pro-abortion protesters at a massive pro-life rally is a fellow traveler. The parent who privately objects to a school presenting LGBT lifestyles as normal but will not publically oppose it is a fellow traveler.

Christianity will not win the conflict with secularism through political activity, although the legislative and judicial processes certainly should be used. Nor will it succeed by compromise, trying to coexist in a hostile environment. The lion will not lie down with the lamb. The long-term solution is a return of America's culture to its Christian roots.

For the Church to be an effective force for societal transformation, leadership by the bishops and priests is necessary. In the American colonies, it was the clergy, speaking forcefully from their pulpits about the abuses of the British crown and the rights and duties of man, who set the stage for American independence. Similar Gospel-based leadership is needed today to decry the evils of secularism and help develop the resolve of the laity to lead their lives, publically and privately, according to the teachings of the Church. 'The Catholic laity, in turn, must become more outspoken in defending moral law, fight for the sanctity of the family, raise their children in the Faith, and exhibit a true love of God.

The immediate future will be difficult. But have hope. As the philosopher Dietrich von Hildebrand, who was a strong voice protesting Nazism, wrote, "If God permits evils...it is to test us; it is precisely our struggle against evil that God wills, even when we suffer external defeat."

The Church will agonize and there will be decreases, most likely significant, in parish membership. Those who remain true to the Faith will experience hostility, social stigma, isolation, and perhaps legal suits, fines, and even imprisonment. But the reduced Church will be a reinvigorated one, comprised of people who are willing to evangelize and live the Gospel on a daily basis

Pray for the nation. Pray for your family. Be devoted to the Rosary. Fast, attend Mass and Eucharistic Adoration regularly, and put your Faith in God. For if God is with us, who can prevail against us!



Our Lady of Czestochowa

The icon of Our Lady of Czestochowa has been intimately associated with Poland for the past six hundred years. Its history prior to its arrival in Poland is shrouded in numerous legends which trace the icon's origin to St. Luke who painted it on a cypress table top from the house of the Holy Family.

The painting displays a traditional composition well-known in the icons of Eastern Orthodoxy. The



Virgin Mary is shown as the "Hodegetria" ("One Who Shows the Way"). In it the Virgin directs attention away from herself, gesturing with her right hand toward Jesus as the source of salvation. In turn, the child extends his right hand toward the viewer in blessing while holding a book of gospels in his left hand. The icon shows the Madonna in fleur de lys robes.

The Black Madonna, another name for Our Lady of Czestochowa, is credited with miraculously saving the monastery of Jasna Gora (Bright Mount) as Queen and Protector of Poland in the cathedral of Lwow on April 1, 1656.

Another legend concerning the two scars on the Black Madonna's right cheek is that the Hussites stormed the Pauline monastery in 1430, plundering the sanctuary. Among the items stolen was the icon. After putting it in their wagon, the Hussites tried to get away but their horses refused to move. They threw the portrait down to the ground and one of the plunderers drew his sword upon the image and inflicted two deep strikes. When the robber tried to inflict a third strike, he fell to the ground and squirmed in agony until his death.

Because of the Black Madonna, Czestochowa is regarded as the most popular shrine in Poland, with many Polish Catholics making a pilgrimage there every year. Often, people will line up on the side of the road to hand provisions to the pilgrims as those who walk the distance to Czestochowa walk the entire day and have little means to get things for themselves.
