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
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# Chaplain Thoughts...

"The things you have prepared, to whom will they belong?" by Rev. Roy E. Campbell, Jr.

What are these "possessions" that Jesus is really speaking about in the Gospel parable of the rich man? It is our material, or worldly possessions! The question becomes: "Do we own our possessions; or do our possessions own us?" And, we all have "possessions" to some degree. God gave man dominion over the earth, to use His "possessions" found here on earth. It is God who provides the "possessions" found on earth, so that we can use it to take care of all the creatures and things of the earth.

Therein lays the key to Jesus' parable. God tells us to care for the creatures and things of the earth. He does not tell us that the creatures and things of the earth are "our" possessions! We are stewards of God's creation, not owners of it.

When we take what God has given us as our "own possessions," to do with as we please, and do not use them to care for those in need, then we fall into idolatry. When this happens, we have elevated our "possessions" to that of a "false god." No longer is our one, true God the primary focus of our lives, since our "possessions" have taken His place. He praised the good news of Maryland being #24 in the order in membership. He announced that we are #4 in our region for the Membership Olympics. He summarized his three points for this Fraternal Year:

For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

"The violent episodes of the past week have shocked the conscience of our country," said Supreme Knight Carl Anderson. "Through this prayer, each of us has the opportunity to help transcend hatred and violence by personally committing to the concepts of love of neighbor, peace and forgiveness that are central to an authentic embrace of Christianity. It is our hope that,

from coast to coast, those who pray this prayer will become true instruments of peace."

Supreme Chaplain, Archbishop William Lori of Baltimore, also urged people to join this prayer campaign: "During this Year of Mercy, let us pray for an end to violence and senseless killings," he said. "Through our prayers and good works, may we help build a society that is merciful, just, and peaceful."



I have been to various Flea Markets and some of them were outside the continental U.S. They have their own unique style and personality. But the Knights of Columbus (KofC) at St Joseph's Catholic Church parking lot on Saturday morning has a neighborhood feel about it. Most of the vendors know each other. This Flea Market is a type of bazaar that rents space to people who want to sell merchandise. Used goods, low quality items, and high quality items such as collectibles and antiques are commonly sold.

You have some people looking for bargains and others looking for collectibles. Many markets offer fresh produce or baked goods, plants from local farms and vintage clothes. Renters of the Flea Market tables are called vendors. St. Joseph's holds their Flea Market out doors and the vendor provide their own tents and tables. Flea-Market vendors may range from families that are renting a table for the first time in order to sell a few unwanted household items. There are scouts who rove the region buying items for sale from other Garage Sales and Flea Markets.

Flea Market vending is distinguished from street vending in that the market itself, and not any other public attraction, brings in buyers. Being that I am a first timer, some of the items were a real bargain. Knights of Columbus also, provide hot dogs, hamburgers, drinks and chips. Once the Flea Market got into full swing, the traffic of people was constant and robust. All in all, the Flea Markets have been quite successful for the participating vendors, visiting public, and our council.

One of the many wonders of Fr. Aaron was the magnificent Chalice that he possessed. It was unique and beautifully crafted. It was gift from his parents in honor of his ordination. The Chalice is a story in itself and is summarized below.

# Chalice of Rev. Aaron M. Qureshi

The gift of his parents



The twelfth foundation of the heavenly city was adorned with amethyst. (Cf. Rev 21:19-20)

Purple is the color of royalty and pomp, but also of bruises and suffering. The amethyst reminds us that, like Jesus, one comes into the Kingdom only after many trials.



Around the throne are four living creatures. (Rev 4:6) The man, lion, ox and eagle are traditional signs of the four Gospels, which nourish the life of faith. (My scholarly thesis concerns the symbolism of these four creatures.)



I handed on to you what I received. (1Cor 15:3) The inscription on the bottom records that this chalice was given in 1903 as a gift to Msgr. William McDonald, pastor (1890-1917†) of St. Francis de Sales Church in Geneva, New York. (My classmate Rev. Peter van Lieshout had a recent assignment there.) Msgr. McDonald's associate, Rev. John Muckle, inherited the chalice and gave it to the College of New Rochelle in New York. Our faith is a precious gift from the generations that have come before.

The Kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls. (Mt 13:45) Seed pearls represent the start of the life of faith: buptism, when one inherits the Kingdom in seminal form.

# FAMILY FULLY ALIVE



In founding the Knights of Columbus, Father Michael J. McGivney sought to respond to the crisis in family life affecting Catholics in 19th-century America. As a young man he witnessed firsthand the challenges his widowed mother faced with seven children at home. Later, as a priest he confronted on a daily basis the problems affecting the families of his parish community due to poverty, violence, alcoholism, immigration, anti-Catholic prejudice and discrimination.

Father McGivney's vision for family life was not simply that each family might find financial and material aid. He understood that holiness is the calling of all baptized Christians. And, seeing as his two brothers followed him into the priest-hood, we can understand how truly important the "sanctuary of the home" was to the McGivney family.

His family was a living example of what the Second Vatican Council later taught — that each man, woman and child is called to holiness through proclaiming the Gospel and communicating the divine gift of love through the activities of their daily lives.

When Christian families respond in this way to the design of the Creator, they become a "domestic Church" that, as Pope Paul VI explained, mirrors "the various aspects of the entire Church."

- Are beneficiary forms current?
- Have you discussed with your spouse and children what services you expect to receive when you have difficulty performing the activities of daily living or develop dementia?

These are questions worth asking and answering *NOW*. Be prepared, rather than being surprised.

# A World in Need of God

The world is awash in blood, and no nation is excluded. Since the beginning of this year, radical Islamic terrorists have conducted 1,300 attacks in 50 countries, killing or injuring over 25,000 people. Mass killings in the guise of warped religiosity are as likely to occur in Istanbul, Baghdad, Damascus or Jakarta, as they are in Paris, Brussels, Nice or New York.

In the beginning years of this century alone, uncountable millions of people have been shot, starved, bombed, beheaded, dismembered, or otherwise killed. Military units are fighting in Afghanistan and Iraq, Ukraine and South Sudan, Yemen and Burundi, as well as many other nations. Christians in the Middle East are being driven from their ancestral homelands almost to the point of genocide. Women and children in Nigeria have been systematically kidnapped and raped, while their men were slaughtered. Schools, hospitals and churches are not immune from attack – in many instances they are the targets. Entire populations are fleeing to become undesired refugees in other countries, while untold numbers die in the flight. Individual and small groups of terrorists are willing to become "martyrs" in order to kill innocent bystanders. And the killing is not limited to brutal, public acts, but includes the "genteel, socially-acceptable" destruction of human life through abortion, and increasingly through euthanasia and assisted-suicide.

Archbishop Charles Chaput crystalized the root cause of this monumental violence when, in an address in 2010, he stated: "God has never been more absent from the Western mind than he is today. Additionally, we live in an age when... [there is] a basic confusion about what – if anything at all – it means to be 'human'."

In the world at present, there are two dominant cultural systems with radically different worldviews that are colliding: Western secularity and Islamic religiosity.

The West, which has been linked to Christianity for two millennia, has considered God to be the ultimate guarantor of political life and the one who set the norms for its conduct. But this relationship has and continues to change. Western nations today treat religion and belief in God as private matters that have no role in the public arena where the shared will of the people is formed. The results are not nontheocratic governments in which the state and church are separate, allowing many religions to exist and exercise their missions in freedom. Rather, the governments are becoming secularistic, restricting the public expression of any recognized faith and replacing it with an anti-theism of atheistic secularism. In the absence of God, and unfettered by religious values and unchanging moral principles, politics is replacing religion. The state is assuming the ownership of life -- how it will be begun, how it will be lived, and how it will be ended.

Past attempts to shape human affairs without consideration of God have led to dreadful consequences for humanity. In the twentieth century, the world experienced the rise of two great atheistic philosophies: National Socialism with its dogma that the future lay with the purity of the race; and Communism which divinized the power of the collective over the individual based on a synthesis arising from the clash of opposing groups or interests. The results were the annihilation of hundreds of millions of people who were of the wrong race or who opposed the devaluation of man.

Countering Western secularism is Islamic fundamentalism which promotes a religious fervor against the godlessness of Western society. The current resurgence of Islam is due to a conviction that it can offer a solid moral foundation for the life of the people, a basis that is no longer being provided in the West. Among many Islamic adherents, however, religious directives have lost their orientation, resulting in a perverse fanaticism that is brutal, blind and unrelenting. Europe and America seem to have lost the moral conviction to defeat this fanaticism, despite their continuing political, military and economic power.

How do individual Catholic Americans react to the profound secularism in their country and its worldwide effects? Most are indifferent, as long as it does not affect them personally. Oh, they may express interest in the events of the day or indignation at the latest atrocities, but they go no further. Jaded by materialism and a drive for wealth, prestige and pleasure, they have organized their public and private lives in a totally temporal way. The result is a crisis of faith. God has become an after-thought, with one's conscience, no matter how ill-formed, becoming the standard for personal behavior. Too many Catholics now lead their lives as if God does not exist, while others make a perfunctory commitment to religion just in case He does.

Reversing this widespread secularism will not be easy. The world is brutal and indifferent, but is not too dissimilar from the one in which Our Lord sent the Apostles to evangelize. He said to them, "[D]o not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. But rather be afraid of him who is able to destroy both body and soul in hell." (Mt 10:28).

America, and indeed the world, must be re-evangelized. God must be brought back into public consideration. As Knights, let us lead by example. Pray to Our Lord for He never fails His people. Listen for His voice in your life. Detach yourself from the allure of the world, and with faith say the simple proclamation, "Jesus, I trust in You!" In the closing months of this Jubilee Year of Mercy, make the Rosary, the Chaplet, Eucharistic Adoration and frequent attendance at Mass the means to enable you to personally experience the love of our merciful Savior and become His instrument to change our society.





# Marian Title for August

# Our Lady of Czestochowa

The icon of Our Lady of Czestochowa has been intimately associated with Poland for the past six hundred years. Its history prior to its arrival in Poland is shrouded in numerous legends which trace the icon's origin to St. Luke who painted it on a cypress table top from the house of the Holy Family.

The painting displays a traditional composition well-known in the icons of



Eastern Orthodoxy. The Virgin Mary is shown as the "Hodegetria" ("One Who Shows the Way"). In it the Virgin directs attention away from herself, gesturing with her right hand toward Jesus as the source of salvation. In turn, the child extends his right hand toward the viewer in blessing while holding a book of gospels in his left hand. The icon shows the Madonna in fleur de lys robes.

The Black Madonna, another name for Our Lady of Czestochowa, is credited with miraculously saving the monastery of Jasna Gora (Bright Mount) as Queen and Protector of Poland in the cathedral of Lwow on April 1, 1656.

Another legend concerning the two scars on the Black Madonna's right cheek is that the Hussites stormed the Pauline monastery in 1430, plundering the sanctuary. Among the items stolen was the icon. After putting it in their wagon, the Hussites tried to get away but their horses refused to move. They threw the portrait down to the ground and one of the plunderers drew his sword upon the image and inflicted two deep strikes. When the robber tried to inflict a third strike, he fell to the ground and squirmed in agony until his death.

Because of the Black Madonna, Czestochowa is regarded as the most popular shrine in Poland, with many Polish Catholics making a pilgrimage there every year. Often, people will line up on the side of the road to hand provisions to the pilgrims as those who walk the distance to Czestochowa walk the entire day and have little means to get things for themselves.
