



Today is the *First Sunday of Advent*. The word "Advent" means "coming." We light the 1st Advent candle today, preparing for the coming of Christ, the eternal light who will pierce the darkness of the world. Just as a light gets brighter, the closer it comes to us, the Light of the World is symbolically coming closer to us and getting brighter by each additional candle that we light during the four Sundays of Advent.



The Light of the World that we prepare for is the coming of Jesus. Yet, we should also be preparing for Jesus' Second Coming. Saint Cyril wrote: "At the first coming He was wrapped in swaddling clothes in a manger. At His second coming He will be clothed in light as in a garment. In the first coming, He endured the cross, despising the same; in the second coming He will be in glory, escorted by an army of angels. We look then, beyond the first coming and await the second."

"Be watchful! You do not know when the Lord of the house is coming."

Jesus' first coming brought us salvation and with salvation, He gives us abundant grades. We must accept His graces to guide us through this life, because the time of His Second Coming will be unexpected; therefore, we must use His graces to always be prepared. Advent then is a time of expectancy along with our waiting in hope. Advent is forward looking. It is different from Lent, which is a time of reflection and examination.

Supreme Knight Carl Anderson and Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori of Baltimore addressed the Order's assem-

bled State Deputies during their first full day of meetings. The State Deputies were joined in their meetings by the State Chaplains.

Supreme Knight Anderson encouraged the Knights to find ways to do even more for the Church and for charity. "The greatest enemy we have is complacency," the Supreme Knight said. "We don't have the right to say it's good enough." Key to the Knights efforts must be evangelization in word and deed, and that evangelization must have a missionary dimension, he said.

The Supreme Knight encouraged the state leadership to be "the strong right arm of the Church" and to react quickly when bishops need or request the Order's assistance. He also encouraged further membership growth, pointing out that an increase in membership not only enabled the Order to engage in even greater acts of charity, but also provided those who join with the opportunity for growth in the faith. As part of helping member grow in the faith and evangelizing marriage and family life, the supreme knight suggested that each knight and his family should pray together each day. The Order is distributing a Prayer for the Family written by the supreme chaplain that families can say each day.

SUPREME KNIGHT'S MESSAGE



This month as we celebrate the event of Christmas, I suggest we also contemplate what we might call the process of Christmas — the series of events that began in March with the angel's Annunciation to Mary and is brought to fulfillment on December 25th with the birth of Jesus.

In his account of the Annunciation, St. Luke writes "Mary set out at that time and went as quickly as she

could to a town in the hill country of Judah" [1:39]. We also know that when Mary greeted Elizabeth "the child leapt in her womb." The prophetic ministry of John the Baptist to proclaim the coming of the Messiah actually began while John was still in Elizabeth's womb—itself an eloquent pro-life testimony. But St. Luke's account bears even more dra-

matic witness to the humanity of the unborn child. St Luke is so concerned to make a precise record of both pregnancies at the time of the Visitation that he records the Archangel Gabriel telling Mary that Elizabeth is "in her sixth month." Then St. Luke tells us that Mary's visit to Elizabeth lasted about three months. Elizabeth then gives birth to John the Baptist. In this way we understand that Mary must have left to see Elizabeth almost immediately after the Annunciation – a journey she made "as quickly as she could."

Elizabeth's words to Mary – "Why should I be honored with a visit from the mother of my Lord?" – show us that while Jesus

may be only five days old, he is the Lord. The Incarnate One who is present within Mary when she visits Elizabeth is not potentially the Messiah; he is at that very moment the Messiah.

Jesus, when he was first recognized as the Lord by Elizabeth, was at the same point in his biological development as are the thousands of embryos that have been conceived by means of in vitro fertilization and later destroyed because they are no longer wanted by their biological parents and as those thousands of embryos whose death is now sought to provide stem

cells for scientific research. Those embryos that society today willingly destroys are no less fully human than was Jesus on the day of the Visitation.

This Christmas we rejoice in a God who brings to us in Mary's child the Gospel of Life. Our Order has done much during the years to "Keep Christ in Christmas." But, the story of his life

before, as well as at his birth, is one our society desperately needs to know now.

During our Christmas celebration let us also take time in our homes and in our councils to join Mary on her pilgrimage to Elizabeth. Let us prepare to observe our 42nd Annual March for Life on January 22, 2015. And as we take this historic step to advance the pro-life cause, let us do so with the same firm hope of the one who heard from the lips of an angel that "nothing is impossible to God."

Tootsie Roll candy: "Thank You"







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Marian Title for December Our Lady of Guadalupe



On December 9, 1531 Juan Diego, a simple indigenous peasant, had a vision of a young woman while he was on a hill in the Tepeyac desert, near Mexico City. The lady told him to build a church exactly on the spot where they were standing. He told the local bishop, who asked for some proof. He went back and had the vision again. He told the lady that the bishop wanted proof, and she said "Bring the roses behind you." Turning to look, he found a rose bush growing behind him. He cut the roses, placed them in his poncho and returned to the bishop, saying he had brought proof. When he opened his poncho, instead of roses, there was an image of the young lady in the vision.

Today, the icon is displayed in the nearby Basilica of Guadalupe, now one of the most visited Catholic shrines in the world. The Virgin of Guadalupe is Mexico's most popular religious and cultural image, with the titles "Queen of Mexico, Empress of the Americas, and Patrones of the Americas."

CHRISTMAS AMIDST GROWING SECULARISM

Christmas is rapidly approaching. It is a time when, in spite of the secular influences that surround us in our daily lives, we experience the joy and peace of God's presence. The story of Our Lord's birth, however, is so familiar that we often do not appreciate the meaning and significance of the event.

This day, almost 2,000 years ago, when the "Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us," marked a turning point in human history, a new era for the human race. Without Christ's birth – and His death and resurrection 33 years later — the gates of heaven would still be closed to us. God had come to earth in the person of Jesus Christ, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. He who was the maker of the world, before whom "the pillars of the heavens tremble," took on the lowliness of man and thus exalted the dignity of humanity.

Jesus was not created as we were, with a beginning to our existence. As God, he is eternal, existing outside of time. At His birth, His divine nature united to itself a human nature through Mary. In a much lesser sense we have a similar union of two aspects to our human nature, with body and soul. One is material that will return to dust, and the other spiritual that will continue forever and be rewarded or punished for our earthly behavior.

Our Lord did not come as God in the guise of man, nor come as part God and part man, nor was His nature a mixture of the divine and the human. Rather, Jesus became truly and completely human, while remaining truly and completely God. With all of the human shortcomings He assumed, there was never any lessening of His divine nature. His actions and teachings were always those of the Son of God. This is the essence of the Incarnation, the union of two natures, the divine and the human, in a single person who exerted both. Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen, in *Life of Christ*, described this union as "not so much the conversion of the Godhead into flesh, as the taking of manhood into God" -- a privilege that not even the Angels received.

His birth changed our relationship with our Creator. God was no longer an unseen, unknown, ethereal divinity, a mystery that was beyond our comprehension. Now he was a proximate God, with a human nature and form who experienced love and sorrow, joy and friendship, suffering and death to which we could relate. Now we could develop a personal relationship with God. As Pope Benedict XVI, in *Jesus of Nazareth*, wrote: "now we know his face, now we can call upon him."

We are in this temporal life to work out our salvation so that we may merit an eternity in the kingdom of God. Jesus, through His coming, gave us the means – grace, the Eucharist, His Church – to attain that salvation.

In spite of the profound implications for mankind of Christ's birth, there are continuing movements to deemphasize the religious meaning of Christmas. First, the holy day was changed to a holiday and commercialized. It now is the norm to exchange untold numbers of greeting cards and engage in an inordinate amount of gift-giving. The shopping spree is well underway. Even before Halloween, stores began to display Christmas decorations. What once was a month-long market-

ing blitz starting at Thanksgiving is now a two-month effort to convince us to spend money on material goods.

Next, the holiday was secularized. Shortly after World War II, Christmas was often referred to as Xmas, with the presumed rationale that X stood for the Greek letter chi, the Christian symbol for Christ. While the latter is true, it deemphasized the focus on the birth of Our Lord. Major retailers had for a time – and many still do -- stopped using the word Christmas in their advertising and with their customers. Shoppers frequently hear the sterile refrain, "Seasons Greetings," as they purchase "holiday" trees. Crèches were replaced with displays of winter scenes, sleighs, trees, bells, birds, Santa Clauses, and about anything other than a reminder of what occurred in Bethlehem 2000 years ago.

Even the focus on Santa Claus, gift-giving and Xmas was not enough. More recently, in the guise of tolerance and inclusiveness in our increasingly multiculturally-sensitive society, there are efforts to eliminate all references to Christ. Christmas programs and traditional carols that refer to God are removed from school programs, while students have a winter break. Nativity scenes are banned from city halls and shopping malls. The Board of Education of Montgomery County recently eliminated all references to religious holidays from the school calendar, while some schools even stay away from the use of red and green colors in this season lest they evoke a recollection of Christmas. The same Christ Child who could find no place in the public inn is now being expunged from public memory.

The silencing of Christmas is more than just being concerned about the sensitivities of non-Christians. It is a step toward suppressing those moral beliefs that stand for the protection of the unborn, the sanctity of life at all stages, the inviolability of tradition marriage. There can be no further accommodation without an annihilation of Catholic identity, a loss of religious freedom, and a denigration of societal mores based on virtue and morality.

Let us not be hesitant to express our religious beliefs and celebrate our traditions. We must not allow secular forces to remove God from the culture and thus to preclude His public recognition from the experiences of our children and grandchildren. While celebrating the birth of Christ is a sign of faith in God, it also is a public recognition that we and this nation owe our existence to God.

In the days ahead, let us display a crèche in our homes and yards, patronize retailers who recognize Christmas, send religious greeting cards, promote seasonal songs that praise God, and prepare ourselves spiritually -- say the rosary, spend time in Eucharistic Adoration, go to Confession, meditate on the liturgical readings -- so that when we go to Mass on Christmas Day, we can be truly joyous about the birth of our Lord.

May Jesus continue to live in our hearts, our society, and in the world. Merry Christmas!


ADVENT WREATH



The Advent Wreath, which has German origins, is probably the most recognized Advent custom. It is a wreath made of evergreens that is bound to a circle of wire. It symbolizes the many years that we have awaited His second and final coming. The wreath holds four equally spaced candles, the three purple ones lit on the "penitential" Sundays and a pink one for Gaudete, the joyful third Sunday in Advent.

The Advent Wreath is a Christian tradition that symbolizes the passage of the four weeks of Advent. It is a circular candle holder that typically holds five candles. During the season of Advent one candle of the wreath is lit each Sunday until all of the candle are lit, the four candle is lit on Christmas Day.

Traditionally, each of the four candles on an Advent Wreath has their own meaning. The first Sunday of Advent symbolizes *Hope* with the Prophet's Candle reminding us that Jesus is coming. The second Sunday of Advent symbolizes *Faith* with the Bethlehem Candle reminding us of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem. The third Sunday of Advent symbolizes *Joy* with the Shepherd's Candle reminding us of the Joy the world experienced at the coming birth of Jesus. The fourth Sunday symbolizes *Peace* with the Angel's Candle reminding us of the message of the angels: "*Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men*."
