




Chaplain Thoughts...

"Your redemption is at hand" by Rev. Roy E. Campbell, Jr.



BE PREPARED, for He is coming! This is Advent's message to us and to the world. The word advent means "the arrival of a notable person or thing." That person is the Word of God made flesh in Jesus Christ. God is fulfilling His promise, as we heard in our reading from Jeremiah. "The days are coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and Judah."

However, Advent also means the Second Coming of Christ, as King and judge of all. We also heard in our reading from Jeremiah, "he shall do what is right and just in the land. In those days Judah shall be safe and Jerusalem shall dwell secure; this is what they shall call her: 'The LORD our justice.'" Jeremiah lived during Israel's exile in Babylon. The Israelites may have thought that he spoke of their earthly Jerusalem, but we know that our Lord of justice will bring us the safety of the New Jerusalem, the kingdom of heaven.



We are called to be a part of the New Jerusalem, by staying prepared, by growing spiritually in Christ, the Light of the World. We grow in spiritually in Christ when we treat others as He does, with care and compassion. This takes away our fright of what is to come, just as it did for the martyrs who gave their lives for Christ. When we prepare for the coming of Christ, when we recognize the signs of His coming, we can stand straight, secure in our faith, our hope, and our love of God and each other, knowing that we have strived for holiness in this life, so as to receive it abundantly in eternal life.

Today, the Advent Wreath has one candle lit, the lowest on the stand. Each week of Advent we will light another candle, one level higher that the previous week. Vicki and I just returned from the State Deputies Mid-Term Meeting. It proved to be a very productive endeavor, with informative exchanges with the Supreme Director, Carl A. Anderson and his staff, as well as with my fellow State Deputies.

Supreme Knight Carl Anderson and Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori of Baltimore addressed the Order's assem-Stephen M. Cohen bled State Deputies during their first full day of meetings. The State Deputies were

joined in their meetings by the State Chaplains.

Supreme Knight Anderson encouraged the Knights to find ways to do even more for the Church and for charity. "The greatest enemy we have is complacency," the Supreme Knight said. "We don't have the right to say it's good enough." Key to the Knights efforts must be evangelization in word and deed, and that evangelization must have a missionary dimension, he said.

The Supreme Knight encouraged the state leadership to be "the strong right arm of the Church" and to react quickly when bishops need or request the Order's assistance. The Order is distributing a Prayer for the Family written by the supreme chaplain that families can say each day.

Supreme Knight's Message

The Gospel of Life by Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson



This month as we celebrate the event of Christmas, I suggest we also contemplate what we might call the process of Christmas - the series of events that began in March with the angel's Annunciation to Mary and is brought to fulfill-ment on December 25th with the birth of Jesus.

In his account of the Annunciation, St. Luke writes "Mary set out at that time and went as quickly as she could to a town in the hill country

of Judah" [1:39]. We also know that when Mary greeted Elizabeth "the child leapt in her womb." The prophetic ministry of John the Baptist to proclaim the coming of the Messiah actually began while John was still in Elizabeth's womb - itself an eloquent pro-life testimony.

But St. Luke's account bears even more dramatic witness to the humanity of the

unborn child. St Luke is so concerned to make a precise record of both pregnancies at the time of the Visitation that he records the Archangel Gabriel telling Mary that Elizabeth is "in her sixth month." Then St. Luke tells us that Mary's visit to Elizabeth lasted about three months. Elizabeth then gives birth to John the Baptist. In this way we understand that Mary must have left to see Elizabeth almost immediately after the Annunciation - a journey she made "as quickly as she could."

Elizabeth's words to Mary - "Why should I be honored with a visit from the mother of my Lord?" - show us that while Jesus may be only five days old, he is the Lord. The Incarnate One who is present within Mary when she visits Elizabeth is not potentially the Messiah; he is at that very moment the Messiah.

Jesus, when he was first recognized as the Lord by Elizabeth, was at the same point in his biological development as are the thousands of embryos that have been conceived by means of in vitro fertilization and later destroyed because they are no longer wanted by their

> biological parents and as those thousands of embryos whose death is now sought to provide stem cells for scientific research. Those embryos that society today willingly destroys are no less fully human than was Jesus on the day of the Visitation.

"This Christmas rejoice in a God who brings to us in Mary's child the Gospel of Life." This Christmas we rejoice in a God who brings to us in Mary's child the Gospel of Life. Our Order has done much during the

years to "Keep Christ in Christmas." But, the story of his life before, as well as at his birth, is one our society desperately needs to know now.

During our Christmas celebration let us also take time in our homes and in our councils to join Mary on her pilgrimage to Elizabeth. Let us prepare to observe our 42nd Annual March for Life on January 22, 2016. And as we take this historic step to advance the pro-life cause, let us do so with the same firm hope of the one who heard from the lips of an angel that "nothing is impossible to God."

The Security of Long-Term Care Insurance

Thanks to marvelous innovations in medical technology, and advances in living and working conditions, many of us will enjoy long, prosperous lives. Subsequently, many of us are left drawing from our own resources, or our family's resources to cover long-term care costs. It can be an expensive proposition just when cash resources need to be preserved for retirement. 

<u>REFLECTIONS</u> Lawrence P. Grayson CHRISTMAS - THE CANARY IN THE COAL MINE

Christmas is the single most-significant religious, historical and cultural event in world history. The Son of God assumed our human nature, came into the world, redeemed us from the guilt of our sins, and provided teachings for the way we should lead our lives. Christian beliefs, which formed the thinking and values of America's Founders, were reflected in the Declaration of Independence, in the way the government was organized, and in the nation's laws and ordinances.

As the people were of many different Christian sects, the state and religion were made separate, but complementary. Religion would form the virtue and morality of the people necessary in a republic, while the government protected the right of individuals to choose their form of religious practice and for churches to carry out their mission of worship and evangelization.

As society has evolved, it has been infected with secularism, a religious-like movement to remove all references to God from public display and consideration, and force individuals and organizations to violate their religious beliefs through government coercion. But how far has secularism eroded the religious roots of the nation? Like a canary in a coal mine, the manner in which Christmas is celebrated is a bellwether of secularism's toxicity in American society. The trend in presidential Christmas messages issued annually over the last 75 years is one prominent indicator of the change.

On Christmas Eve, 1941, with America having been plunged into war just days before, Franklin Delano Roosevelt asked: "How can we put the world aside, as men and women put the world aside in peaceful years, to rejoice in the birth of Christ?" He continued, "Looking into the days to come, I... do hereby appoint the first day of the year 1942 as a day of prayer, of asking forgiveness for our shortcomings of the past, of consecration to the tasks of the present, of asking God's help in days to come." Three years later, with war still raging, he said: "[W]e will celebrate this Christmas Day in our traditional American way -- because of its deep spiritual meaning to us; because the teachings of Christ are fundamental in our lives."

Harry Truman, in 1949, stated: "We miss the spirit of Christmas if we consider the Incarnation as an indistinct and doubtful, far-off event unrelated to our present problems. We miss the purport of Christ's birth if we do not accept it as a living link which joins us together in spirit as children of the ever-living and true God."

Dwight D. Eisenhower, in 1953, spoke of the importance of prayer: "As religious faith is the foundation of free government, so is prayer an indispensable part of that faith. Tonight, richly endowed in the good things of the earth, in the fellowship of our neighbors and the love of our families, would it not be fitting for each of us to speak in prayer to the Father of all men and women on this earth, of whatever nation, and of every race and creed -- to ask that He help us -- and teach us -- and strengthen us -- and receive our thanks."

In 1962, John F. Kennedy noted: "We mark the festival of Christmas which is the most sacred and hopeful day in our civilization. For nearly 2,000 years the message of Christmas, the message of peace and good will towards all men, has been the guiding star of our endeavors." Jimmy Carter, in 1980, spoke globally: "Together let us thank God for all the blessings He has given us and ask Him to sustain and strengthen us as individuals and as a nation. Let us also offer our prayers for those who live where there is strife, hunger, persecution, or injustice."

Ronald Reagan, in 1981, was more nationalistic: "Tonight, in millions of American homes, the glow of the Christmas tree is a reflection of the love Jesus taught us. Like the shepherds and wise men of that first Christmas, we Americans have always tried to follow a higher light, a star, if you will...At times our footsteps may have faltered, but trusting in God's help, we've never lost our way."

George W.H. Bush, in 1990, proclaimed: "[O]ur Savior's... Incarnation radically altered the course of human history by challenging men and women to live according to the will of our just and merciful Father in Heaven. Today, Christ's message of hope and redemption -- first delivered on that holy night in the City of David -- continues to bring peace and joy to millions of people around the world."

Bill Clinton, in 1995, noted that on Christmas, "we share special gifts with those we love, just as God shared His Son with us. And, in contemplating the nativity scene under the tree or in a neighbor's yard, we realize that children hold a special place in God's heart, since He sent His only Son to us as a little Child."

George W. Bush, in 2005, said: "More than 2,000 years ago, a virgin gave birth to a Son, and the God of heaven came to Earth... Each Christmas, we celebrate that first coming anew, and we rejoice in the knowledge that the God who came to Earth that night in Bethlehem is with us still and will remain with us forever."

Barack Obama has focused his annual proclamations more on our relationship with other people than with God, stating, in 2014, that the meaning of Christmas is "to love our neighbors as ourselves. To be one another's keepers. To have faith in one another, and in something better around the bend."

The changes in the tenor of these presidential messages indicate a movement from the religious to the secular. They initially focused on divine aspects of Christmas and the need for God's blessings. As time progressed, they combined the spiritual with statements of concern for others, while the most recent have omitted the sublime.

The societal toxicity of secularism is increasing, but not yet lethal. We must reinvigorate the Christian roots of the nation, and bring God back into public consciousness. The future course of this nation rests within the heart and will of each one of us. If we truly want a nation in which Christianity is respected and free, we must lead our lives according to Christian principles. Let us begin by celebrating Christmas as a religious event. As T.S. Eliot wrote, as long as the collective temperament of the people remains Christian and the nation's leaders continue to pursue the interests of the country within a Christian framework, the nation may still be considered a Christian nation. *Merry Christmas!*

Marian Title for December Our Lady of Guadalupe

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On December 9, 1531 Juan Diego, a simple indigenous peasant, had a vision of a young woman while he was on a hill in the Tepeyac desert, near Mexico City. The lady told him to build a church exactly on the spot where they were standing. He told the local bishop, who asked for some proof. He went back and had the vision again. He told the lady that the bishop wanted proof, and she said *"Bring the roses behind you."* Turning to look, he found a rose bush growing behind him. He cut the roses, placed them in his poncho and returned to the bishop, saying he had brought proof. When he opened his poncho, instead of roses, there was an image of the young lady in the vision.

Today, the icon is displayed in the nearby Basilica of Guadalupe, now one of the most visited Catholic shrines in the world. The Virgin of Guadalupe is Mexico's most popular religious and cultural image, with the titles "Queen of Mexico, Empress of the Americas, and Patrones of the Americas."
