Chaplain Thoughts...

"He taught them as one having authority.." by Bishop Roy E. Campbell, Jr.

So far in this short season of Ordinary Time, we have heard of our Lord's call to His Apostles and to us as His people to "Come, follow Me." Now that we have heard Him calling, what must we do? We must listen to Him!

Throughout salvation history since Moses, God has called His people through the message of the prophets He has sent. Now, God completes and fulfills His call, His message, through His greatest prophet, His Son, Jesus.

The people listened, because Jesus speaks to them as Moses did, with AUTHORITY! However, there is a difference between the authority that Moses spoke with, and the authority that Jesus speaks with. Jesus does not speak and act with the authority given to Him by God, as Moses did. Jesus speaks and acts on His own authority, because He is God. Jesus uses His authority to expel demons from a man whom demons possessed and controlled.

The demons knew who Jesus was and tried to say so. The demons were trying to gain a measure of control over Jesus

by saying that they knew who He really was. However, Jesus silenced them, with AUTHORITY!

The people were amazed, and left the Synagogue, spreading the news of what they had seen to everyone they met.

In some ways, each one of us can relate to that possessed man's situation. We are not possessed, but we all have sufferings and temptations that seem to have mysterious power over us, just as the devil had power over this man. Jesus came to bring new life and new hope to that man. He comes to bring new life and new hope to every human heart today, and He rejoices whenever we let Him act with authority in our lives, as He did for that possessed man.

We, like the people in the Synagogue, should tell everyone we meet what Jesus has done for us by how we live as Christians and how thankful we are for having God's love working in our lives. We call that evangelization.

A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPREME KNIGHT Carl A. Anderson - Supreme Knight



The Knights of Columbus is providing \$1.4 million to help repair and rebuild churches that were either destroyed or badly damaged in the late summer hurricanes that assaulted Texas, Florida and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

"Getting parish facilities up and running again does not just meet a practical need," said Supreme Knight Carl Anderson. "The people in the affected areas see the revival of their churches as a spiritual joy and as an important signal of recovery for the larger communities that surround these churches."

Knights of Columbus Charities raised \$3.8 million for disaster relief in the months following the hurricanes. In the immediate aftermath, more than \$720,000 was used to pay for food, water and other critical supplies. At the same time, many local Knights helped rescue neighbors stranded by rising waters and reached out to their communities in a variety of other ways.

Church repair and renovation has been a key component of Knights' relief efforts in the past. In the wake of Hurricane Katrina, which struck the New Orleans area in 2005, the K of C contributed \$6.7 million to various dioceses to help rebuild the Catholic infrastructure in the area, aiding in the repair of schools, churches and other buildings.

The Knights of Columbus has also earmarked a significant amount of money for upcoming church repair efforts in Puerto Rico. This donation will be in addition to the \$100,000 donation presented by the Order to the Archdiocese of San Juan in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria, which provided generators, food, water and other necessities to aid relief efforts.



She was declared a saint in 2000. All Catholics are called to recite the Prayer to Saint Josephine Bakhita on February 8th.

St. Josephine Bakhita, you were sold into slavery as a child and endured untold hardship and suffering. Once liberated from your physical enslavement, you found true redemption in your encounter with Christ and his Church.

REFLECTIONS Lawrence P. Grayson Marching for Pro-Life America

On January 19, some 20,000 students attended an early morning Mass and youth rally, and then joined several hundred thousand pro-life advocates on the National Mall in Washington, DC. After encouraging remarks by political and social leaders, the overwhelmingly young crowd from all over the country marched to the Supreme Court for the 45th annual time to bear witness for life at all stages.

Ever since *Roe v. Wade* legalized abortion in 1973, the pro-life movement has peacefully prayed outside of abortion clinics, counseled pregnant women, shown them ultrasound images of their children, provided free housing for mothers-to-be, stressed the alternative of adoption, exposed the depraved techniques of abortion, filmed the illegal sale of baby parts, and lobbied for laws to protect both mother and child. The results are indisputable. The number of surgical abortions has decreased dramatically. Children are being saved.

In 1996, an estimated 1.36 million children were killed in the womb; by 2015, the number had dropped to 908,000. Last year, 27 surgical abortion centers closed or stopped doing abortions, continuing a long-term trend. In 1991, there were 2,176 surgical abortion clinics in the country; today, only 490 remain. As a result, over 90 percent of the counties in the United States no longer have an abortion provider.

And very encouraging, in the past year there have been a host of federal government actions to promote the sanctity of life. On January 23, 2017, the President reinstated the Mexico City Policy, which prevents U.S. foreign aid from going to non-governmental organizations that provide or promote abortion services abroad.

Then, on the morning of the 2018 March for Life, the President announced two major pro-life policy changes. First, the Department of Health and Human Services is rescinding an Obama-era guideline that forced states to make Medicaid reimbursement payments to Planned Parenthood, rather than to local community health centers which do not perform abortions and serve more people with more health services.

Second, the Office for Civil Rights proposed a new policy to protect conscience rights and religious freedom of doctors, nurses, and other medical professionals so that they would not be coerced into participating in medical procedures, such as abortion, sterilization, or assisted suicide, that violate their consciences.

That same morning, the U.S. House of Representatives passed the *Born Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act (H.R. 4712)*, which requires, under penalty of possible criminal and civil actions, health care practitioners to provide the same standards of care, including admission to a hospital, to a child surviving an abortion as would be expected for infants who were not subjects of an abortion.

The President has called upon the Senate to pass that legislation, as well as the *Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act (H.R. 36)*, which passed the House in October 2017, and he will sign

both. The latter bill makes it a crime for any person to perform or attempt to perform an abortion on any unborn child 20 weeks or more after conception. These bills would virtually eliminate abortions nationwide after five months of pregnancy.

The recent government actions are in-line with public opinion. A Knights of Columbus-Marist poll conducted in January 2018 found that 76 percent of American adults, including 60 percent of those who identify themselves as pro-choice, want abortions restricted to the first three months or pregnancy or limited to cases of rape or incest or to save the life of the mother. This confirms a Gallop survey released at the time of last year's March for Life, which found that although there is strong support for abortion in the first trimester majorities oppose it strongly in the second and third trimesters. The majority of Americas favor significant restrictions on abortion, such as waiting periods, spousal agreement, and the consent of one parent for a minor's abortion.

The March for Life is more than an annual symbolic demonstration. As Cardinal Timothy Dolan said at the youth Mass preceding this year March, "Our elected representatives, executive and legislative, and the judiciary they appoint, need to see and hear and feel the grassroots power and sincere voices of millions...we will not give up."

The National March in Washington, DC, has spawned more than 60 sister marches in communities and states across the nation, almost all held on or near January 22, the date when the Supreme Court legalized abortion. And other countries have followed the example. Marches for life are being held in at least 20 nations on six continents, making this a global movement.

Although progress has been made in protecting the sanctity of life, there still is significant opposition from pro-abortion providers, the entertainment industry, and much of the main-stream media. Marching alone will not win the battle for life.

Lila Rose, founder of Live Action, when asked a few years ago to advise a first-time attendee at the March for Life, expressed the need for continuing involvement: "If you're here, that's fantastic — but we need you tomorrow; we need you the next day; we need you on Sundays at your church; we need you at your schools standing up for life; we need you voting for life; we need you encouraging and working with your friends to make sure they're not having abortions...We need you every day, not just today."

Action also must be coupled with prayer. As the President said in his remarks at the March, "this movement can only succeed with the heart and the soul and the prayer of the people." With prayer, fasting, wide-spread public involvement, and trust in God, America will be a land that protects life from conception until natural death.
