CHAPLAIN'S THOUGHTS

Joseph and Mary were devout Jews, living by the laws of their faith. Joseph was a carpenter, a man who worked to provide for his family. Joseph was not a wealthy man, for when he took Jesus to the Temple to be circumcised and Mary to be purified he offered the sacrifice of two turtledoves or a pair of pigeons, allowed only for those who could not afford a lamb. There, they met Simeon,



the holy man who foretold the great things that would come about, because of this new born baby. Mary realized from Simeon's words, how great her suffering would be, in bearing witness to her Son's sacrifice to redeem mankind.

We hear a lot in Scripture about Mary, but not much about Jesus' human foster father. Joseph revealed in his humanity the unique role of fathers to proclaim God's truth by word and deed. His paradoxical situation of "foster father to Jesus" draws attention to the truth about fatherhood, which is more than a mere fact of biological generation. A man is a father most when he invests himself in the spiritual and moral formation of his children. Joseph was keenly aware, as every father should be, that he served as the representative of God the Father.

"The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom."

Joseph's life reminds us that a home or community is not built on power and possessions but goodness; not on riches and wealth, but on faith, fidelity, purity and mutual love. Joseph took Jesus and Mary to their new home in Nazareth as a family firmly bonded in love and respect for each other, and obedience to the will of God. The family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph is the family described in our readings from St. Paul's letter to the Colossians and in the Book of Sirach; for children to respect their parents and for everyone to love each other as the Lord loves us.

The family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph is the family we are called to imitate. We must learn to live in our own families with the love, respect, and obedience shown in the Holy Family.

SUPREME KNIGHT'S MESSAGE

At the conclusion of a special Mass celebrated by Pope Francis in St. Peter's Basilica to mark the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Msgr. Eduardo Chavez, a Canon of the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe and brother Knight, presented the Holy Father with a silver rose. The silver rose was hand-carried from Canada, through the United States to Mexico City by Knights of Columbus as a symbol of unity in the continent of America. For more than 50 years, the Order has sponsored the Our Lady of Guadalupe Silver

Rose Program to reaffirm the Order's commitment to the sanctity of life and honor the Blessed Virgin under her title of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas.

Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, with whom Pope Francis met earlier in the day in a private audience, was also at the Mass.

The Silver Rose program began in 1960 as an initiative of the Columbian Squires, the youth program of the Knights of Columbus. In the mid-1990s, the program was adopted as a Supreme Council program which grew to encompass routes for three silver roses. Last year, five silver roses made their way across North America.




This year six silver roses traveled from Canada to Mexico to symbolize unity among the peoples in the Americas. The rose is also a symbol of the pro-life movement, which recognizes Our Lady of Guadalupe as its patroness.

The roses began their journey in Canada in May, and for six months were carried by Knights of Columbus throughout the western, central and eastern corridors of North America. The journey concluded on December 12th, the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, at the basilica bearing that

name in Mexico City. The roses were presented before an image of Our Lady.

The Silver Rose program is replete with symbolism. The seven guides carrying the roses represent the sacraments of the Catholic faith and the ways to approach God. The thorns represent all the efforts and sacrifices of the Columbian Squires and Knights of Columbus along the way. Lastly, the strong stem represents faith.

In 2001, Supreme Knight Anderson dedicated the Order to Our Lady of Guadalupe. Since that time, the Order has organized and supported numerous spiritual initiatives and academic conferences to promote devotion the Virgin of Guadalupe.



St. John Paul II took for his motto Totus Tuus, an expression of the Holy Father's entrustment of his pontificate to the Blessed Virgin Mary. The *Mater Ecclesiae* mosaic overlooks the spot in St. Peter's Square where a would-be assassin's bullet nearly took the life of the pope. St. John Paul II ordered the mosaic to be placed there in gratitude for the Blessed Mother's intercession after he survived the May 13, 1981 assassination attempt.

The mosaic was blessed by St. John Paul II on the feast of the Immaculate Conception during the 1981 Advent season.

With prayers that the Mater Ecclesiae may intercede for all the needs of the Church, the Knights of Columbus wishes everyone a blessed Christmas and a grace-filled New Year.

The Sir Knights of the Maryland and Archdiocese of Washington Districts are men wo do think about such things. Whether it be


laying wreaths at Arlington Cemetery, or simply giving a toy to a child, the men of the 4th Degree are dedicated to improving the lives of those who serve all of us.





"Longer Life is Here To Stay"

Ask anyone what is the expected life length and the answer is usually 78.5 years. This is certainly what the U.S. Census Bureau states. Thus, someone who retires at age 65 can reasonably expect to live 13 years or so. NOTE: Life expectancy now is 83. Yes, 83!

Recent industry research shows that life expectancy for a 65 year old male is actually 83. For planning purposes, it is wise to estimate that 50% of 65 year old males will live to beyond the age of 83. What plan do I have to handle emergencies and potentially declining health? What happens when I can no longer live in my home – where will I go, who will assist me?

Marian Title for January Our Lady of Hope of Pontmain

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Our Lady's visit occurred at the height of the Franco-Prussian War. Pontmain lay between the oncoming Prussian invaders and the city of Laval. With the sound of gunfire in the distance, two young brothers, Eugene and Joseph Barbadette, were pounding animal feed with their father when they saw a beautiful woman above the village church. Years later, an adult Joseph (who became a priest) recounted:

She was young and tall of stature, clad in a garment of deep blue, like balls of indigo such as laundresses use for rinsing linen. Her dress was covered

with brilliant gold stars. The sleeves were ample and long. She wore slippers of the same blue as the dress, ornamented with gold bows. On the head was a black veil half covering the forehead, concealing the hair and ears, and falling over the shoulders. Above this was a crown resembling a diadem, higher in front than elsewhere, and widening out at the sides. A red line encircled the crown at the middle. Her hands were small and extended toward us as in the 'miraculous medal.' Her face had the most exquisite delicacy and a smile of ineffable sweetness. The eyes, of unutterable tenderness, were fixed on us. Like a true mother, she seemed happier in looking at us than we in contemplating her.

A crowd gathered to pray as word quickly spread among the anxious villagers. Children saw the beautiful Lady, and gleefully pointed up to her. Adults, however, only saw 3 stars forming a triangle! As they prayed the Rosary, the children saw the garment's stars multiply until it was almost entirely gold. Next, the children saw a banner unfurl beneath the Lady. Slowly, a message appeared: "But pray, my children. God will hear you in time. My Son allows Himself to be touched." Upon hearing the message read aloud, the crowd spontaneously began the hymn "Mother of Hope." As they sang, Our Lady laughed and joined in the singing.

The children squealed with delight as her hands kept time with the music, conducting their song. When the crowd began "My Sweet Jesus," her expression changed to profound sadness and a red crucifix appeared in her hands, with the words "Jesus Christ" above it. Her eyes mournfully contemplated the cross during the hymn. As the people sang the "Ave Maris Stella," the cross vanished, and her smile returned, though with a touch of melancholy. Two small white crosses then appeared on her shoulders before Our Lady disappeared behind a cloud.

The apparition lasted for 3-hours. In that time, the people of Pontmain heard a lessening in the distant sounds of war. During the evening, the Prussians ceased their advance and, 12-days later, the war ended. Just as Our Lady promised, God heard their prayers for peace. Devotion rapidly spread under the title Our Lady of Hope of Pontmain and, in 1900 the Bishop consecrated a magnificent Cathedral commemorating the apparition. The tiny chapel over which she appeared remains nearby in its original state.

The Challenge of Being a Catholic American

Our nation was established by people who desired freedom -freedom in both their private and public lives, freedom in their
homes, churches, enterprises, and associations. They wanted a
person's conscience to be held inviolable so that individuals
could freely express themselves on political and social matters
and worship the Almighty as they choose. The genius of the
Founders lies in the basis they pronounced for that freedom.

In the England they had left, liberties and rights were granted by the king and a parliament. In the France they knew so well, liberties and rights were rooted in the will of the majority of the populace and set forth in a constitution. But views can change and constitutions altered. If a king or a parliament or a majority of the people can grant rights, they can also take them away.

In America, the Founders recognized that certain rights are inherent in the very nature of man, in the sacredness of the human psyche, independent of any state, government, or dictator. These rights are God-given and not subject to any human power. They may be infringed upon by a state, abused by a government, encroached upon by a tyrant, but they cannot be taken away.

It was made explicit in the Declaration of Independence that "all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness." On this basis, the Founders created a distinctly unique government, one valuing pre-existing rights granted by a transcendental power.

This is the core of Americanism, that man as a creature of God is free to be his own master, free in his conscience, free to pursue his ultimate end. As the Declaration of Independence further states: "to secure these Rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Consent of the Governed." Thus, government's primary purpose is to protect pre-existing rights, not to create or dispense them. Its authority to act resides in the will of the people.

A government of, by and for the people, as in the United States, requires public goodness, an ethic among the citizenry that they will govern themselves by virtuous norms so that public office will not be used for personal gain and views of the minority will be respected. Religion plays a large role in nurturing public virtue. George Washington expressed this clearly in his Farewell Address, when he warned that "reason and experience both forbid us to expect that national morality can prevail in exclusion of religious principle."

The essence of Americanism is also the foundation of Catholic social teaching: that man is made in the image and likeness of God, and as such has an innate dignity worthy of respect. As that dignity comes from God, the person has certain intrinsic rights to personal liberty, freedom of conscience, and basic economic well-being. Indeed, this understanding is common to the beliefs of all of Christianity. Americanism, as understood above, may be considered a political expression of Christian

doctrine regarding man. As such, the church and the state have distinct, but complimentary functions in promoting public virtue. The church through its teachings develops the moral character of the people, while the state is to create an environment within which the church can flourish and carry out its teaching mission.

If religion is so important to self-government, why is our nation today more anti-religious than at any time in its history? To a significant extent, it is because too many Christians – and Catholics in particular - have distanced themselves from the teachings of their Faith. They have been secularized and have diluted their religious beliefs in pursuit of worldly prosperity, acclaim and social acceptability.

When one professes to be Catholic, the person states that he ascribes to a body of dogma dating back two thousand years and lives his life by it. The Church's teachings, including those on societally-controversial matters such as abortion, euthanasia and same-sex marriage, must influence a Catholic's public posture and decisions. Without adhering to the unchanging beliefs about God, man's purpose in the world, how he should live his life, and his ultimate end, a claim to be Catholic is hollow and may indicate a cultural or social affiliation and not communion with the Church.

The lack of adherence – or lack of knowledge – to the tenets of Christianity is so widespread that we may be approaching an unexplored, perilous social condition. Pope Benedict XVI described the challenge in today's secular world, writing: "[O]ur century has been characterized by an entirely new phenomenon: the appearance of a people incapable of relating to God…our distance from God – the obscurity and dubiousness surrounding him today – is greater than ever before." If left unaddressed, the ignorance of the Faith among the laity will continue to grow, and lead to an increasing exclusion of Catholic truths from public affairs and to a decline in the values that underlie this nation. If human dignity and liberty come from God, then the loss of faith in God will lead to a loss of belief in the unalienable nature of those liberties and rights which derive from Him.

There must be a resurgence of the Faith among Catholics in America. There must be a new evangelization, an education about what it means to be Catholic. This requires an effort at every level of responsibility. The bishops as stewards of the Faith, and priests as leaders of the local parishes, must assure that the laity are appropriately educated and form proper consciences, so that they can lead lives in conformity with the Faith. Parents must improve their own knowledge and behavior so they can pass the Faith to their children. And it is the duty of all of us to take action in our public and private lives to change society for the better. A Catholic population, stoutly embracing the teachings of their Faith could have a serious leavening effect on American life.
