



Prayer of Pope Francis for the Jubilee



Pope Francis has composed a special prayer for the Jubilee Year of Mercy which will run from 8 December 2015 to 20 November 2016. In the prayer, the Holy Father entreats the Lord to make the Jubilee of Mercy a year of grace so that the Church, "with renewed enthusiasm, may bring good news to the poor, proclaim liberty to captives and the oppressed, and restore sight to the blind."

Lord Jesus Christ,

you have taught us to be merciful like the heavenly Father, and have told us that whoever sees you sees Him. Show us your face and we will be saved. Your loving gaze freed Zacchaeus and Matthew from being enslaved by money; the adulteress and Magdalene from seeking happiness only in created things; made Peter weep after his betrayal, and assured Paradise to the repentant thief. Let us hear, as if addressed to each one of us, the words that you spoke to the Samaritan woman: "If you knew the gift of God!"

You are the visible face of the invisible Father, of the God who manifests his power above all by forgiveness and mercy: let the Church be your visible face in the word, its Lord risen and glorified. You willed that your ministers would also be clothed in weakness in order that they may feel compassion for those in ignorance and error: let everyone who approaches them feel sought after, loved, and forgiven by God.

Send your Spirit and consecrate every one of us with its anointing, so that the Jubilee of Mercy may be a year of grace from the Lord, and your Church, with renewed enthusiasm, may bring good news to the poor, proclaim liberty to captives and the oppressed, and restore sight to the blind.

We ask this through the intercession of Mary, Mother of Mercy, you who live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. Amen.

Chaplain Report

Chaplain Thoughts...

"His parents found Jesus sitting in the midst of the teachers." by Rev. Roy E. Campbell, Jr.

Most of us grew up, or are growing up, in a family with both parents, and maybe a sister, or brother, or two, or more. How important is it to grow up in a family? We cannot place a value on the family into which we were born.

Our reading from the Book of Sirach, a wisdom book from the Old Testament, tells us of the graces and benefits that come to children in families, who honor their fathers and mothers. He calls on children to respect their parents, and by extension, everyone in their family. He tells us to take care of our parents and to show them only kindness in their old age.

The Book of Sirach is telling us that honoring and respecting our parents and our families is living Christ's Second Great Commandment of love, to love our neighbor as ourselves. It also tells us what we accomplish for ourselves, in God's eyes, by showing our love for Him when we do good works for others. These words, written 2,200 years ago, hold true today.

St. Paul echoes this message in his Letter to the Colossians, telling members of a family how they should treat each other. Husbands must love their wives as they do their own bodies, as Christ does for His Body, the Church. Joseph protected and provided for Jesus and Mary. He named Jesus, taught Him how to pray, how to work, how to be a man.



When their 12-year-old child stayed behind in the Temple we are told Joseph, along with Mary, searched with great anxiety for three days for Him. They were looking for God, in Mary's Son, Jesus. Jesus had His priorities in order. He was being obedient to His Father in heaven, first. However, when Mary and Joseph found Him, to take Him home with them, Luke's Gospel tells us that Jesus was obedient to His earthly family.

Do we look for God, searching sometimes all our lives to find Him? Jesus told Mary and Joseph, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" God, the Father wants each of us to be His house, the temple where Jesus can be found. When Jesus can be found in us, we bring Him to the home where our family lives.

Each of us wrestles with identity issues, while at the same time embracing responsibilities toward our family. Every parent wrestles with freedom issues for their child, while at the same time cooperating with God, trusting that their child is being protected. Let us pray for all families this weekend, that this balance may be found, so that as families, we will always grow spiritually and in our trust in God, finding Jesus in *"His Father's house."*



Supreme Knight's Message

Building the Domestic Church by Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson



In founding the Knights of Columbus Father Michael J. McGivney sought to respond to the crisis in family life affecting Catholics in 19th century America. As a young man he witnessed firsthand the challenges his widowed mother faced with seven children at home. Later, as a priest he confronted on a daily basis the problems affecting the families of his parish community due to poverty, violence, alcoholism, immigration, anti-Catholic prejudice and discrimination.

Fr. McGivney's vision for family life was not simply that each family might find financial and material aid. He understood that holiness is the calling of all baptized Christians. And, seeing as his two brothers followed him into the priesthood, we can understand how truly important the "sanctuary of the home" was to the McGivney family.

His family was a living example of what the Second Vatican Council later taught, that each man, woman and child is called to holiness through proclaiming the Gospel and communicating the divine gift of love through the activities of their daily lives.

When Christian families respond in this way to the design of the Creator, they become a "domestic Church" that, as Pope Paul VI explained, mirrors "the various aspects of the entire Church."

Since the Second Vatican Council, and especially during the pontificate of St. John Paul II, it has become clear that the family is "the way of the Church." In one sense this obviously means that the family is the object of the Church's evangelization efforts.

But the Christian family too has its own indispensable mission. As St. John Paul II wrote in *Familiaris Consortio*, "The family has the mission to guard, reveal and communicate love." This mission is at the heart of the "community of life and love" that begins with the married couple in the sacrament of matrimony.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us, "Conjugal love involves a totality, in which all the elements of the person enter ... It aims at a deeply personal unity, a unity that, beyond union in one flesh leads to forming one heart and soul."

In other words, sacramental marriage involves not just an agreement between the spouses but a radical transformation of the spouses.

As Pope Benedict XVI wrote in *Deus Caritas Est*, "marriage based on an exclusive and definitive love becomes the icon of the relationship between God and his people and vice versa. God's way of loving becomes the measure of human love." In this way the witness of husband and wife within the daily life of the family can guard, reveal and communicate love as they make their own the gifts of marriage — unity, indissolubility, faithfulness and openness to new life.

A recent Vatican document on the role and mission of the family has stated, "the family needs to be re-discovered as the essential agent in the work of evangelization." It also pointed to the necessity to better understand the "missionary dimension of the family as a domestic church."

These observations echo those of St. John Paul II who said in 1979 during his meeting with the Latin American bishops that "in the future, evangelization will depend largely on the domestic church."

Clearly, the role of the family in the work of evangelization is not primarily a matter of programs, projects or strategies. These all have their place, but they are secondary. Their place is to be at the service of what is essential the love between a husband and wife which, sanctified through the love of Christ, radiates to each member of their family.

The family as "domestic church" as a place of encounter with Christ within the community of a particular Christian family — a place where each member of the family has an important role.

In other words, the "mission" of the family in the task of evangelization is to be what it is called to be - that is, to live its daily life as a Christian family or as St. John Paul II said so often, "Families become what you are!"

The family's mission to "guard, reveal and communicate love" like the parish community - does not exist in an ideal place. The truth and beauty of the family remains to be communicated to every Christian family, even those that are fragile, wounded or broken. These families too may read the words of St. Paul with confidence: "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" (Rom 8:35) And they may find in that confidence a path of hope and healing.

During his visit to the Philippines, Pope Francis cited the need for "holy and loving families to protect the beauty and truth of the family in God's plan and to be an example for other families."

Building the Domestic Church is one concrete way that the Knights of Columbus, in solidarity with Pope Francis, can offer "holy and loving families" for the Church's mission of evangelization in our time.

Jubilee Year of Mercy Logo

he logo and the motto together provide a fitting summary of what the Jubilee Year is all about. The motto *Merciful Like the Father* (taken from the Gospel of Luke, 6:36) serves as an invitation to follow the merciful example of the Father who asks us not to judge or condemn but to forgive and to give love and forgiveness without measure (cfr. Lk 6:37-38). The logo - the work of Jesuit Father Marko I, Rupnik - presents a small *summa theologiae* of the theme of mercy. In fact, it represents an image quite important to the early Church: that of the Son having taken upon his shoulders the lost soul demonstrating that it is the love of Christ that brings to completion the mystery of his incarnation culminating in redemption.

The logo has been designed in such a way so as to express the profound way in which the Good Shepherd touches the flesh of humanity and does so with a love with the power to change one's life. One particular feature worthy of note is that while the Good Shepherd, in his great mercy, takes humanity upon himself, his eyes are merged with those of man. Christ sees with the eyes of Adam, and Adam with the eyes of Christ. Every person discovers in Christ, the new Adam, one's own humanity and the future that lies ahead, con templating, in his gaze, the love of the Father.

The scene is captured within the so called *mandoria* (the shape of an almond), a figure quite important in early and medieval iconography, for it calls to mind the two natures of Christ, divine and human. The three concentric ovals, with colors progressively lighter as we move outward, suggest the movement of Christ who carries humanity out of the night of sin and death. Conversely, the depth of the darker color suggests the impenetrability of the love of the Father who forgives all.

<u>REFLECTIONS</u> Lawrence P. Grayson Justice and Mercy, Complementary Virtues

Justice and mercy, which are perfectly blended in God, are necessary for a fair and harmonious society. Justice creates order and adherence to obligations. It assures that all obtain what they are due, whether that be the good they have earned or the punishment they have warranted. It is impartial and objective. Without mercy, however, justice can be insensitive and harsh. How many of us truly want complete and pure justice for all, including ourselves? Have we not failed more often than we like to admit in our obligations, in our relations with others? Are we not all flawed? Are we not all sinners? Everyone needs God's forgiveness.

Mercy, in contrast, is compassion for the failings and difficulties of others. It is understanding, patient and forbearing, even if it makes our own life more difficult. Mercy forgives other's offenses and the punishment that may be due, and gives offenders a chance to repent and to reform their lives. In this broken world, to which we with our fallen natures contribute, mercy makes relationships possible.

Mercy without justice, however, is entitlement. Without accountability and a fear of punishment, would we not repeat our offenses, especially if they brought pleasure or material gain? True mercy is more than simply forgiveness, for it requires a response. We must reform our lives and heed the words of Our Lord in the Gospel of St. John, when He said to the woman who was to be stoned for adultery, "Go, and sin no more."

God is just and we will be judged accordingly. As stated in the Book of Revelation: "I saw the dead, great and small alike, standing in front of his throne while the books lay open. And another book was opened, which is the book of life, and the dead were judged from what was written in the books, as their deeds deserved."

As presented in Scripture, God does pass judgement and inflicts chastisement when the sins of mankind deserve it. But he tempers his justice with mercy. When Adam and Eve disobeyed God, they were banished from Paradise, but were given a second chance through toil and repentance on earth. When wickedness was widespread throughout the world, God brought the flood as a punishment, but was merciful to the righteous Noah in having him build an ark so that he and his family would be saved. When God was about to destroy Sodom and Gomorrah, he showed mercy in having an angel tell Lot to take his wife and daughters and flee the city.

Presently, abominations abound throughout the world. They violate God's laws as written into our nature and defy the teachings of His Church. Abortion, pornography, sex outside of marriage, homosexual behavior, gender redefinition, same-sex marriage, euthanasia, and other atrocities against human life and dignity are daring God to release His justice. God has been patient, but He is just. Evil matters. Sin matters. We should not expect His mercy without repentance.

God will inflict punishment, but does so unwillingly. As recorded in St. Faustina's *Diary*, Our Lord told her:

"I do not wish to punish aching mankind, but I desire to heal it, pressing it to My Merciful Heart. I use punishment when they themselves force Me to do so; My hand is reluctant to take hold of the sword of justice. Before the Day of Justice, I am sending the Day of Mercy."

In 2000, Pope John Paul II, concerned about the future of mankind, consecrated the world to Divine Mercy. He declared a jubilee year to emphasize God's love for us and ask for the forgiveness of sins, and established the Feast of Devine Mercy to be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter.

With continuing serious problems in the world, especially, as Pope Francis stated, the "widespread and insensitive mentality" toward the sacredness of human life, the pontiff has proclaimed this year a Jubilee of Mercy. It began on December 8, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, and extends through November 20, the Feast of Christ the King. The pope wants to provide "all believers a true moment of encounter with the mercy of God."

"The tragedy of abortion is experienced by some with a superficial awareness," said the pope, "as if not realizing the extreme harm that such an act entails." Many women believe that "they have no other option" but to have an abortion. "I have met so many women who bear in their heart the scar of this agonizing and painful decision," the pope continued. When such a woman has repented and seeks absolution in the sacrament of confession, "the forgiveness of God cannot be denied." The pontiff has granted, during this Year of Mercy, all priests the authority, normally reserved only to bishops, to absolve women who confess to having had an abortion and who, with a contrite heart, seek forgiveness.

The pope also has granted indulgences for remission of the punishment for sin to those who during the year cross the threshold of the Holy Door at the Vatican or in their local diocese, confess their sins, receive the Eucharist and pray for the pope's intentions. The pontiff asked "the Church in this Jubilee Year to rediscover the richness encompassed by the spiritual and corporal works of mercy."

Today, our request, both as individuals and as a community of believes, for God's mercy is essential. Our Lord told St Faustina, "mankind will not have peace until it turns with trust to My mercy," and added, "He who refuses to pass through the door of My mercy must pass through the door of My judgement." Our Lord has asked that people pray the chaplet of Divine Mercy for, "This prayer will serve to appease My wrath." The directive is clear; the response desired is prescribed; the time is right. Say the chaplet daily, pass through the designated Holy Doors in the diocese, and express your gratitude for God's forbearance and mercy.

Marian Title for January Our Lady of Hope of Pontmain

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Our Lady's visit occurred at the height of the Franco-Prussian War. Pontmain lay between the oncoming Prussian invaders and the city of Laval. With the sound of gunfire in the distance, two young brothers, Eugene and Joseph Barbadette, were pounding animal feed with their father when they saw a beautiful woman above the village church. Years later, an adult Joseph (who became a priest) recounted: ~ ~

She was young and tall of stature, clad in a garment of deep blue, like balls of indigo such as laundresses use for rinsing linen. Her dress was covered with brilliant gold stars. The sleeves slippers of the same blue as the dress

were ample and long. She wore slippers of the same blue as the dress, ornamented with gold bows. On the head was a black veil half covering the forehead, concealing the hair and ears, and falling over the shoulders. Above this was a crown resembling a diadem, higher in front than elsewhere, and widening out at the sides. A red line encircled the crown at the middle. Her hands were small and extended toward us as in the 'miraculous medal.' Her face had the most exquisite delicacy and a smile of ineffable sweetness. The eyes, of unutterable tenderness, were fixed on us. Like a true mother, she seemed happier in looking at us than we in contemplating her.

A crowd gathered to pray as word quickly spread among the anxious villagers. Children saw the beautiful Lady, and gleefully pointed up to her. Adults, however, only saw 3 stars forming a triangle! As they prayed the Rosary, the children saw the garment's stars multiply until it was almost entirely gold. Next, the children saw a banner unfurl beneath the Lady. Slowly, a message appeared: "But pray, my children. God will hear you in time. My Son allows Himself to be touched." Upon hearing the message read aloud, the crowd spontaneously began the hymn "Mother of Hope." As they sang, Our Lady laughed and joined in the singing.

The children squealed with delight as her hands kept time with the music, conducting their song. When the crowd began "My Sweet Jesus," her expression changed to profound sadness and a red crucifix appeared in her hands, with the words "Jesus Christ" above it. Her eyes mournfully contemplated the cross during the hymn. As the people sang the "Ave Maris Stella," the cross vanished, and her smile returned, though with a touch of melancholy. Two small white crosses then appeared on her shoulders before Our Lady disappeared behind a cloud.

The apparition lasted for 3-hours. In that time, the people of Pontmain heard a lessening in the distant sounds of war. During the evening, the Prussians ceased their advance and, 12-days later, the war ended. Just as Our Lady promised, God heard their prayers for peace. Devotion rapidly spread under the title Our Lady of Hope of Pontmain and, in 1900 the Bishop consecrated a magnificent Cathedral commemorating the apparition. The tiny chapel over which she appeared remains nearby in its orig-

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
