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
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Chaplain Thoughts...



Supreme Knight's Message

Stop The Genocide by Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson



The United States must act not only to help stop the genocide of Christians and others now taking place in the Middle East, but also to prevent its recurrence and ensure the future of the affected communities, according to testimony offered to members of Congress by Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, head of the Knights of Columbus.

"Their future affects not only the fates of Christianity and other minority religions in Iraq and

Syria," said Anderson, testifying before Congress' Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission on April 19. "It also implicates the national security of the United States."

In the wake of Secretary of State John Kerry's March 17 declara-

tion that a genocide is taking place, Anderson, whose organization produced a nearly 300-page report for the State Department on the ongoing genocide, recommended

that U.S. policymakers follow up on the designation by focusing on five key areas.

First, as lands are liberated, he said, proper planning must be in place to assist those evicted by ISIS and those who will flee the military actions that liberate lands under its control. Genocide victims who wish to return to their home areas should be helped to do so.

Second, Anderson argued that genocide survivors who wish to come to the United States must not be put at the back of the line. Of the 1,366 Syrian refugees admitted to this country in 2016, fewer than 3 percent came from the groups targeted for genocide.

"It is wrong to exclude those who faced genocide — often on the basis of bureaucratic oversight," said Anderson.

In his third recommendation for policymakers, Anderson said Christians and other minorities who wish to remain in Iraq and Syria should also be able to do so.

"The United States cannot help defeat ISIS without defeating its genocidal antecedents — the malignant idea that discrimination and second-class status are the lot of religious minorities, and that those who offend Islam, whether Muslim or non-Muslim, must be eliminated," he said.

"If [Christians and other religious minorities] disappear, pluralism and stability leave with them," said Anderson. "Iraq and Syria will at best become unstable majoritarian tyrannies.'

Talking about his fourth point, Anderson said that American legal

concepts of equal protecof the press and assembly, and the free exercise of religion are critical to achieving real pluralism in the region. He pointed

out that such principles are also contained in the United Nation's Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

"Finally, we must help create the interpersonal relationships that bind society together," Anderson said as part of his fifth insight. He cited Northern Ireland and South Africa as places where deep divisions gave way to peaceful reconciliation. According to Anderson, a spirit of forgiveness already articulated by the Christians of the Middle East could form the basis for a commission of reconciliation and mercy.

"Peace, equality and stability, rather than religious terrorism and genocide, can be the legacy of these countries and of our involvement there," he said. "Our leadership can help these societies, the Middle East and the security of the American people."

MASTER'S LOG REPORT John F. Winfrey - Master Archdiocese of Washington District

Properly Honoring our Veterans this Veterans Day: The armistice (cessation of hostilities) between the Allies and Germany in WWI (then 'The Great War') took place on November 11, 1918 - at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. Since that time, beginning with the declaration by President Woodrow Wilson in 1919, Armistice Day (now Veterans Day) has been celebrated each November 11th beginning at 11 A.M. The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades and public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 A.M.

The United States Congress officially recognized the end of World War I when it passed a Concurrent Resolution on June 4, 1926, and Armistice Day was created as a legal holiday by an Act of Congress on May 13, 1938. On June 1st, 1954 President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed Public Law 380 renaming the day Veterans Day, a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

The Department of Veterans' Affairs points out that many people confuse Memorial Day and Veterans Day. Memorial Day is a day for remembering and honoring military personnel who died in the service of their country, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle. While those who died are also remembered, Veterans Day is the day set aside to thank and honor ALL those who served honorably in the military - in wartime or peacetime. In fact, **Veterans Day is largely intended to thank LIVING veterans for their service**, to acknowledge that their contributions to our national security are appreciated, and to underscore the fact that all those who served - not only those who died - have sacrificed and done their duty.

As Catholic American Citizens and Knights of Columbus, we should seek prayers of thanksgiving for our Veterans - and attendance at Mass is a particularly great way to honor those who have served. Prayers of healing for those who have suffered service-related injuries - whether visible, catastrophic, or invisible, is a particular charism of the Knights of Columbus' 4th Degree - especially through our <u>Warriors to Lourdes</u> Program. Be sure to take time out of your day - particularly at 11 A.M. - to remember those who have fought and to thank those who have served our nation in uniform and who now live with us as fellow civilians and citizens.

The Archdiocese of Washington *Birthing and Care Program* provides assistance and resources to women in difficult pregnancy situations. Help is available when challenges such as unemployment, lack of health insurance, immigration status, financial difficulties or the fear of telling the baby's father or loved one about the pregnancy make it difficult for a

woman to choose life for her unborn child.

The Birthing and Care Program provides emotional and spiritual support, crisis pregnancy information, help with prenatal care, labor, and delivery services, information and referral to various programs such as Medicaid, WIC, mother and baby classes, and post abortion information and referrals. The center is located at 4700 Berwyn House Road, Suite 240, College Park, Maryland 20740, telephone 301-441-1472.

The St. Joseph Women's Ministry has incorporated the Gabriel Network into their outreach program. St. Joseph has become part of a network of churches and other organizations inspired by Christ to offer service to women and families in our community challenged with a crisis pregnancy.

The Gabriel Network is an alternative for women who choose life over abortion. Motivated by the belief that "Nothing is Impossible with God" (Luke 1:37); Angel Friends (volunteers) work alongside pregnant mothers and provide practical, emotional and spiritual support. These volunteers develop Christcentered relationships with mothers through selfless giving that reaches beyond a mothers' pregnancy. The volunteers provide clients with transportation to doctors' appointments, social services, the grocery store, etc. The network will even assist pregnant women in their educational goals with tutoring, scholarships, tuition, books, software and childcare assistance. 

<u>REFLECTIONS</u> Lawrence P. Grayson Catholics and Their Coats of Many Colors

"I am Catholic." How easy it is to make that claim. Today, one in four people in the United States does so. Among these are individuals who have achieved prominence in all areas of national life, including business, the professions, the media, education, and governance. Currently, the nation's Vice President, 164 of the 535 members of Congress, including the Speaker and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, five of the eight current Justices of the Supreme Court, and 11 of the 34 individuals President Obama has appointed to serve in his Cabinet claim Catholicism as their religion.

With the degree of influence that follows from this preeminence, Catholic teachings should be having a significant effect on the culture, policies and laws of this nation. But they are not. Abortion is widespread, same-sex marriage is legal, assisted suicide is gaining acceptance, pornography is rampant, and freedom of religion – especially Christianity – is being curtailed.

Why is this so? The answer is plain. Too many self-proclaimed Catholics do not practice the faith. They do not live their lives according to the precepts of the religion they profess, and they certainly do not let the faith affect their drive for material success. They have melded into the secularist American culture so completely that their views on moral issues and their behaviors, public and private, are indistinguishable from the population-atlarge.

Of the 82 million self-identified Catholics, only 68 million are members of a parish, and of these only 24 percent attend Mass at least weekly, according to data from Georgetown University's Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate. People who do not practice the religion will not shape their behavior according to its dogmas.

Although there is no formal splitting of Catholicism into sects, as has occurred in Protestantism and Judaism, there are wide divergences in beliefs and practices among people who call themselves Catholic. There are those who may be termed "Culturalists." They typically have been born into the faith and practiced it during their formative years. At some point, however, they stopped going to church and believing in its teachings. These people have ceased to be Catholic. They call themselves Catholic because they have found no other religion to take its place and find the Catholic label as acceptable as any.

Then, there are those who may be viewed as "Pragmatists." They relegate their faith to an occasional Mass and the rest of the time exhibit a practical atheism, living as if God has no effect on their lives. They are willing to ignore and even deny the Church's teachings, and have so compartmentalized their minds that they can say they are personally opposed to a moral evil, but will not prohibit others from engaging in it. This misguided toleration is embraced because it imposes no obligation on the individual to publicly live the faith. The ideas, attitudes, choices, decisions and actions of these cafeteria Catholics, as well as the way they set priorities for living, are indistinguishable from the general populace. A third group are "Progressives," who advocate a practical faith responsive to the modern world. They treat Church doctrines and moral precepts as guidelines to be used flexibly depending on the individual's conscience and circumstances. Issues of peace and justice dominate their thinking, and they are much more concerned about the temporal rather than the spiritual needs of others. While frequently involved in the church's social ministries, many of these people are willing to adapt dogma to fit pastoral concerns and are accepting of women's ordination, married clergy, and same-sex unions.

Then, there are the "Adherents." Loyal to the magisterial teachings of the Church and to the authority of the pope, they accept the principles of the Second Vatican Council, but are not satisfied with the way they have been implemented. While welcoming customary devotions, they want the Mass, whether in the Ordinary or Extraordinary Form, to be celebrated with reverence and solemnity, and would like the faith to be presented in ways that relate to their own lives. Upholding traditional Catholic teaching in faith and morals, they defend traditional marriages, are pro-life at all stages, for all people in all conditions, and support priestly celibacy and an all-male priesthood.

With such a wide diversity of beliefs and commitment to the faith, it is easy to see why Catholics are not a major force in shaping the culture of the nation. Archbishop John Ireland, a leading prelate of his day, perceived the potential and the challenge for Catholics, when in 1889 he said: "[I]f great things are not done by Catholics in America, the fault lies surely with themselves – not the republic." Today, it is clear that Catholics are failing both the republic and themselves. They are forsaking the nation in not bringing the virtues taught by their religion to bear on issues of public concern. They are faithless to themselves because in their consuming drive for material success, they are abandoning fundamental precepts of their faith.

If Catholics are to change the secular culture of America, they must first become well-informed in their faith and then fully live by its teachings. True religious faith is more than a set of dogmas to be accepted; rather it is a way of life, a way whose ends are not the temporal comforts of this world, but the gaining of an eternity in the kingdom of God. It rejects the main messages of American culture: that the primary object of human effort is material gain; that success means the accumulation of power and wealth; that the world is all about us.

What Catholicism in America needs is a re-evangelization to the faith. Catholics must relearn its teachings, understand the timeless truth of its doctrines, and develop the moral values and commitment to live their lives in accord with the faith. What is needed is a massive catechization of existing Catholics, followed by an evangelization of the nation.

Every journey begins with a first step. The re-evangelization can begin with the Knights of Columbus. It could begin with your council. With you. Take the first step; pray the rosary; and with Mary at your side, there is no telling what the results might be.


