

Chaplain Thoughts...

"Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit"

Picture a grapevine. The vine grows and has branches growing out from it. What do you suppose the vine grower would do when he checks this vine and finds that there are branches that appear dead, because they are not bearing fruit? These branches have ceased to receive nourishment from the vine, so they no longer live in the vine and can no longer bear fruit. He will cut them off since they have become useless to him.

Now the vine grower turns his attention to the branches that are bearing fruit. The branches that are bearing fruit willing receive nourishment from the vine, using that nourishment to produce fruit. The fruit of these branches will be more branches attached to and living in the nourishment of the vine. He lovingly trims or "prunes" them so that they get more nourishment and can bear even more fruit.



God the Father is the vine grower, Jesus is the vine and we are the branches. The Father will "prune" us to bear even more fruit, as long as we willingly receive nourishment from Jesus, the vine. The fruit that we must bear is bringing others to Christ. We bear that fruit by living as Jesus, our vine, lives. We are called to a life growing in holiness, because we willingly receive the nourishment of Jesus' love and grace. Our heavenly Father will "prune" us to increase our capacity to receive that love and grace. Then we will be able to bear more fruit as the Father commands, which is to lead more souls to Christ by the love and care we give them.

The Father's command is this: "Believe in the name of His Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as He commanded us."

"Children, let us love not in word or speech, but in deed and truth."

'THE HOLY SPIRIT PUT THIS DESIRE IN MY SOUL!

As an adolescent, I was fortunate enough to meet our order's founder, Mother Martha María Ramírez Mora. She helped me see the Word of God as a living Word, addressed personally to me. I began to regularly read the Good News, pray the rosary, visit the Blessed Sacrament, receive daily Communion and practice acts of service. One day in the presence of the Holy Eucharist, I felt the desire to belong to Christ forever and to work only for him. Proper spiritual direction helped me to understand that the Holy Spirit had put this desire in the deepest part of my soul and that it was a treasure. Feast of the Annunciation





Today is very personal for me, one of my favorite solemnities on the liturgical calendar. My priesthood ordination card has the famous image of the Annunciation, a 15th century fresco by Fra Angelico. Today serves as a reminder for me of what grounds my priesthood—saying YES to God and only doing his will. I even used the citation from Hebrews, which is taken from today's Psalm 40, as one of the quotes on my card, which says "Behold, I come to

do your will."

This great feast presents us a unique opportunity to reflect on the two great mysteries of our faith—the Paschal Mystery and the Incarnation. There's something more we should take away from this solemnity being celebrated AFTER Easter (actual date of commemoration is March 25th—9 months before Christmas). Usually we celebrate the conception or the announcement of a birth BEFORE the death. BUT We have just finished the octave of Easter, celebrating the paschal mystery-the passion, death, and glorious resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ (followed by the Ascension—closes it out). This is the **CULMINATION** of the Father's plan of salvation for all of humanity. With the Annunciation TODAY—Mary's unequivocal AND unambiguous, bold YES to God-we celebrate the BEGINNING of the Father's plan of salvation. This is the precise moment in time when heaven joins earth, where the Divine Source of pure love encounters the human fountain of perfect acceptance, in the Daughter of Zion, purified through centuries of waiting and expectation, as foretold in the words of the prophet Isaiah. With Mary's confident YES, the Word has taken human flesh, and EVERYTHING has been created anew. We can extend our joy in the Easter season another day because Mary said YES!

In keeping these 2 mysteries juxtaposed—the conception and the culmination, the start and the finish—what becomes central to both is the presence of the **BODY**. The "body has been prepared by God," through the power of the Holy Spirit. Two bodies—the body of the

Virgin Mary—as the perfect vessel for the God to be born, AND the Body of Jesus Christ, the body conceived in the womb of the Virgin Mary. Both bodies represent God's promise, his preeminent sign, his covenant with us of "Emmanuel"—that God is with us—that the divine power has definitely broken into our material world and wedded himself to humanity. It is a body like our own—it senses, feels, moves, grows, and also one that lived, breathed, and walked this very earth like every other human being. This body is also the perfect sacrifice, the oblation willingly and obediently offered on the cross, that consecrated each of us and represents the hope of humanity.

The connection between these 2 mysteries—the mystery of the Incarnation, Paschal Mystery—can be drawn out more because of obedience. Jesus was able to offer his body as a sacrifice to the Father in obedience because of what happened at the Annunciation. The Annunciation was not only the **PRECURSOR** but also the **PROLOGUE** to the Paschal Mystery. Jesus' humble and obedient submission to the will of the Father was learned from his Mother, who humbly and obediently offered her will to that of the Father, and in so doing, conceived in her womb the body that was to save the human race. We must do the same with our bodies: ensure that our bodies are able to receive God (like Mary) and make an offering of our bodies (like Jesus).

So, on this special of feast days, we celebrate the Paschal Mystery, as we do at every mass, receiving the BODY OF CHRIST that has been prepared and offered for us in the Eucharist. We should likewise begin each day recalling the Annunciation and the mystery of the Incarnation with our daily FIAT. Receiving body of our Lord in the Eucharist, our spiritual food, gives us the graces to respond completely with a YES to God, humbly and obediently submitting ourselves and our bodies to his Word and becoming instruments of his will. When we do this, we follow the example of both Mary and Jesus Christ, and we can say confidently, boldly every day, without hesitation, along with the Psalmist, "Here I am Lord; I come to do your will."

SUPREME KNIGHT'S MESSAGE

Carl A. Anderson - Supreme Knight

St. Joseph's Humble, Decisive Witness Speaks Volumes To Our Culture Today



As Catholic fathers, one of our main responsibilities is to pass on the faith to our children. We do this best by living the faith in an engaging way and by attending Mass with our family. But we also need to teach our kids the basics of the faith at a young age and make sure their Catholic knowledge grows as they do.

In teaching about Jesus and Mary, a summary of Gospel stories and a review of the mysteries of the rosary provide an excellent primer. What can we say about St. Joseph, the husband of Mary and adoptive father of Jesus, who has no words recorded in the Bible? In our online age in which every stray thought can be texted or tweeted, we can present Joseph as a model for our times — a man of action who goes against the tides and trends of the world. As we approach St. Joseph's feast day March 19th, con-

sider these five "countercultural" qualities of Joseph that can be instructive to our children, as well as to us.

Attentive. Our kids are bombarded by distracting media, yet they long for peace of heart and mind. As Pope Francis has observed, Joseph was "constantly attentive to God" and responded with courage to heavenly messengers who told him to put aside the opinion of others. St. John Paul II also said that because of his attentiveness, Joseph had the "power of making great decisions." Our children, too, can do great things with St. Joseph at their side.

Humble. Social media, as forums for idealized personas and perfect images, are not noted for fostering humility. With a little guidance, our children can see through the online posturing and appreciate the value of honesty, the foundation of humility. Setting aside his own plans in order to follow God's will, Joseph "lowers himself and takes this great responsibility upon his shoulders," explains Pope Francis. St. Joseph teaches us that humility does not mean passivity. Rather, his hidden life was defined by integrity and strength.

Protective. Our kids can feel vulnerable amid what Pope Francis calls a "throwaway culture," which does not respect the dignity of the human person — especially the unborn, the poor, the elderly, the sick and others on the periphery. In the face of harmful influences such as cyberbullying and online pornography, we should appeal to our children's desire for protection. St. Joseph was the guardian, or *custos*, of Jesus, and he is now the patron of the universal Church. As a father, show your children that you stand strong with Joseph.

Hardworking. Although life today is vastly different than in the time of St. Joseph, the demands of hard work are still essentially the same. "Work was the daily expression of love in the life of the family of Nazareth," wrote St. John Paul II. While our virtual age seeks pleasure first and is quick to demean or outsource menial labor, Joseph the carpenter rolls up his sleeves and reveals the dignity of human work. He is an example of someone who knows that hard work can be its own reward.

Loving. Our world is filled with distorted images of love that can cause our children great harm and heartache. Joseph is an antidote. Love for him was not red hearts and arrows but self-giving for the good of others. He also expressed a "tenderness," notes Pope Francis, a "strength of spirit and a capacity for concern, for compassion, for genuine openness to others, for love." Through St. Joseph, your kids can learn the true nature of love that is rooted in his care for Mary and Jesus.

Presenting St. Joseph with these countercultural virtues, we fathers should seek to imitate him in our own lives. That will be a win for our children, our families and ourselves.

Brothers, the month of May is upon us and during this month in the tradition of the Catholic church, we honor our Blessed Mother Mary, the Queen of the Knights. We honor her for her role as the Mother of our Lord Jesus Christ and for her role as Mother of the church. Here at St. Joseph, The Lady of Grace Sodality with assistance from the Knights will hold a May procession and Crowning of all the Statues of Mary in the church before and during the 11:00 Mass on May 6. Council members in council uniform and Color Corps members are encouraged to attend and actively participate.

During this month, please make sure to pray devotionals to Mary and to pray the rosary every day. Most of us will often ask why we pray or should pray the Most Holy Rosary. The Holy Rosary is simply the Psalter of the Blessed Virgin Mary and a request for her intercession as our Virgin Queen and Mother. When she appeared to St. Dominic in the 13th century, she gave specific instructions on how to pray her Psalter, even though Psalters had been in use before. "Human life is sacred and inviolable at every moment of existence, including the initial phase which precedes birth. All human beings, from their mother's womb, belong to God who searches them and knows them, who forms them and knits them together with his own hands, who gazes on them when they are tiny shapeless embryos and already sees in them the adults of tomorrow whose days are numbered and whose vocation is even now written in the 'book of life.' There too, when they are still in their mothers' womb—as many passages of the Bible bear wit-ness—they are the personal objects of God's loving and fatherly providence." (Evangelium Vitae, 61).

In his 1995 Encyclical, Evangelium Vitae, St. John Paul II called on all Catholic faithful to bear witness to the Gospel of Life and to build the "civilization of life and love" (100). In keeping with this mission and our Order's Catholic principles of charity, unity, and fraternity, the Knights of Columbus stands strong in its conviction that every human life is a gift of God, endowed with certain inalienable rights — the first among these being the right to life. Even in the midst of difficulties and uncertainties, we believe that human life is sacred and inviolable, and ought to be defended with maxi-mum determination. To this end, the Knights of Columbus supports policies that promote a Culture of Life and opposes legislative efforts that promote abortion, contraception, sterilization, cloning, the destruction of embryos, assisted suicide, euthanasia, unjust war, and the death penalty when there is an acceptable alternative.

To date, the Maryland State Council has donated 20 ultrasound machines to pregnancy care centers throughout the state. For each machine, the State Council contributes about \$25,000 that is matched by funds from the Knights of Columbus Supreme Headquarters. The program needs funds. Several councils and districts are planning to hold or have held fundraisers specifically for the Ultrasound Project. I would like for Fletcher Council to participate in this program and have a Ultrasound machine installed at a medical facility in the Largo, Maryland area.







The Devil In Our Lives

"The Christian life is a constant battle... against the devil, the prince of evil," Pope Francis stated in his recent apostolic exhortation, *Gaudete et Exultate*. In this call for holiness, the pope warns that in our struggle against evil in today's world "we should not think of the devil as a myth, a representation, a symbol, a figure of speech or an idea." Rather, the devil is "a personal being who assails

Within the past few months, a U.S. Senator, a movie star, a us." Francis cites Pope Paul VI, who described the devil as "a living spiritual being, perverted and perverting. A terrible reality, mysterious and frightful."

Yet, regardless of the papal declaration, a recent Gallup poll found that 27 percent of adults living in the America do not believe in the devil and another 12 percent are not sure if he exists. If people dismiss the existence of the devil, they are not prepared to resist him and, as the pope says, "he takes advantage of it to destroy our lives, our families and our communities."

If the devil exists, where is his influence seen in America today? Almost everywhere. Immorality continues to infiltrate and dominate great segments of society. The nation is awash in pornography, contraception, casual sex, cohabitation, and abortion, and we are inundated with licentious television shows, movies and art. Marriage has been redefined, homosexual behavior is acceptable, gender is becoming a choice, euthanasia is growing, and sexual abusers and predators seem to abound in all walks of life.

Hollywood mogul, a late-night television host, and a prominent newscaster were among many others accused of sexually harass-Each summer, thousands of people attend the Burning Man Festival in Nevada's Black Rock Desert, where they can express themselves without bound, including engaging in orgies of "love in all forms." In late October 2017, the National Park Service withdrew its initial approval for the placement of a 45-foot tall statue of a nude woman on the National Mall; the reason given was that it would likely damage the Mall's turf and soil – nothing was said about the statue's appropriateness for the millions of children and families who visit the site annually. In March, the Los Angeles City Council reached an agreement to permanently maintain the Playboy Mansion, the legendary venue for hedonistic parties, debauchery, and gatherings of self-indulgent celebrities. With even monuments being created to depravity, the moral culture of America is becoming reminiscent of that of ancient Rome.

While many people do not believe in the devil, there are others who worship him. For the past two Christmas seasons, a teacher in Boca Raton, Florida, has put up a large Satanic pentagram in a public park near a crèche. It was accompanied with quotes like: "In Satan We Trust" and "One Nation Under Anti-Christ." In January 2017, when the time came to remove the display, a group of Satanists carried the pentagram to the Nativity scene chanting "Hail Satan!" Last October, a group of devilworshippers demanded that the Boston City Council allow them to perform a Satanic invocation at a council meeting. The request was denied only on the grounds that Satanism is not a recognized religion.

The march toward moral licentiousness across the nation is relentless. Its supporters are fiercely determined to impose their agenda on everyone, regardless of the religious beliefs and traditional moral principles of others. Its opponents, in contrast, are too tolerant, too complacent, for it is easier to ignore an evil than to confront it. Many people take a position such as: as long as it doesn't affect me, I really don't care what others do; or, we should be tolerant of others and not judge their actions; or, I am only one person, there is nothing I can do.

But each accommodation of a moral wrong makes it easier to allow an even greater evil. The acceptance of sexual freedom was followed by the consent of homosexual behavior, which led to same-sex unions and then gay marriage. Now there are calls to decriminalize and recognize polygamy. As each incursion on traditional morality is given legal status or accepted by society, the intense pressure of public opinion and accusations of bigotry and unlawful discrimination are being brought to bear against those who wish to maintain orthodox religious beliefs and practices.

While man's fallen nature and personal choices should not be dismissed for their effect on the state of morality in the world today, neither should the influence of malevolent spiritual beings. Yes, the devil is real. In driving God from public consciousness, America is creating a culture without absolute standards of right or wrong, decency or indecency, moral or immoral. It is becoming a society that condones casual sex; that no longer values families as the bedrock of society; that treats pregnancy as an impediment; that considers persons with physical or mental impairments and the very elderly as dispensable.

People who believe in God cannot be complacent while the forces of libertine progressivism overwhelm society, whether one considers these advances the result of societal narcissism or satanic influence. While action to change society is necessary, alone it will not be effective. To combat evil, prayer is essential.

Pope Francis, in *Gaudete et Exultate*, presents a way to proceed: "For this spiritual combat, we can count on the powerful weapons that the Lord has given us: faith-filled prayer, meditation on the word of God, the celebration of Mass, Eucharistic adoration, sacramental Reconciliation, works of charity, community life, missionary outreach." And we should not ignore Mary, Mother of God. In a January homily, the pope said that where Mary is "the devil does not enter... Let's make the Mother the guest of our daily life... Let's entrust all to her every day."
